Whenever possible, exposure is given to significant issues and problems faced by the Rochester, Monroe County and Western New York area. There is no charge to air the PSAs.

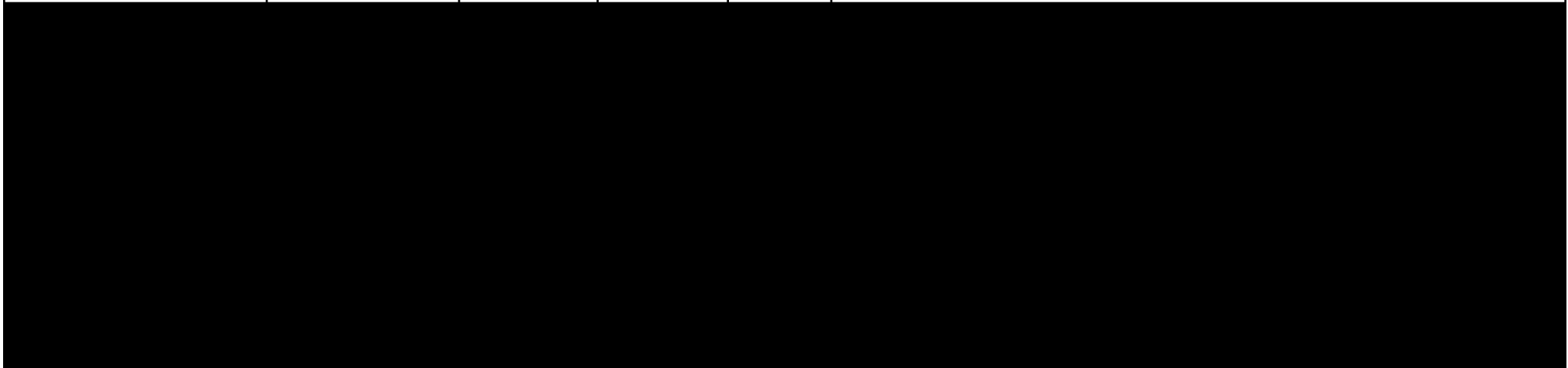
