HEALTH	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/19/2016	1:00 Min	A mother who lost her child is donating a cuddle cot to Nebraska Medicine. A cuddle cot is for parents who lose a newborn. The cot keeps the child's body cold so that parents have more time to grieve their loss and spend time with the child.
		11/3/2016	1:30 Min	A group of moms have started a Facebook group for people to exchange unused donated breast milk. Organizers say it's a way for moms to get breast milk if they aren't producing enough for their baby. Doctors say there are risks to using donated breast milk if the milk hasn't been tested for infections or contamination.
		12/1/2015	1:30 Min	Around 200 students and teachers at Benson High School will have to be tested for Tuberculosis after coming in contact with an infected student. The high school will hold testing clinics.
ECONOMY	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/13/2016	1:30 Min	A central Nebraska business is now growing internationally. Preferred Popcorn is going to open an office in China. The company exports its popcorn around the world to 70 countries. Company leaders say they support the Trans Pacific Partnership which makes trade deals easier so that small businesses in America can compete with anyone in the world and not the government.
		11/10/2016	1:30 Min	A new study shows that people could be paying a lot more for car insurance if they have bad credit in Nebraska. The study says that having fair or poor credit can triple your rates and that Nebraska has the fourth highest car insurance rates for those people. Credit experts say that other factors can factor into calculating the rate and that if you have poor credit you shouldn't change insurance providers until you get your credit score back up.
		12/2/2016	1:30 Min	The Labor Department says the United States added 178,000 jobs in November, bringing the unemployment rate to 4.6%. Some economists say that unemployment rate doesn't count the millions of Americans who have been out of work so long that they don't get counted in the unemployment rate. President Donald Trump says that he plans to create

				more consequences for companies who leave the United States. He is also hiring a former Wall Street insiders to his commerce and treasurer departments.
ENVIROMENT	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/3/2016	1:30 Min	People in the Caribbean are cleaning up after Hurricane Matthew swept through the area, killing three people. Parts of Haiti and the Dominican Republic have already seen up to 40 inches of rain and people on the East Coast are bracing for the hurricane.
		11/13/2016	1:30 Min	Omaha is getting high temperatures that are about 20 degrees above what's normal for November. Meteorologists say this is partially due to a jet stream pattern that's blocking air to the north from coming to the south.
		12/7/2016	1:30 Min	Mt. Crescent is starting to get ready for its winter season, but this year the business is opening later than usual. The unseasonably high temperatures have made it hard for Mt. Crescent to create snow for skiers and snowboarders. Artic air from the north is settling into Omaha this week, making perfect conditions for snow to be made.
COMMUNITY PROJECTS	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/12/2016	1:30 Min	The Council Bluffs Fire Department is now using drones to help fight fires. The drone helps firefighters get an aerial view of what is going on and it helped them determine where to attack a fire at an energy plant. The drone is mainly used for training and it can record what's going on so firefighters can review footage later. The department is also getting some thermal technology to attach to the drone.
		11/1/2016	1:30 Min	A local food pantry that has been struggling for months is now getting some much needed help thanks to a big donation from an Omaha man and his friends. He and about a dozen of his friends raised \$3200 to buy food that the Bellevue food pantry really needs.
		12/5/2016	1:30 Min	There are now more places for people to get rid of their old computers, television sets and Ipods. A year long program is kicking off to provide people with better access to recycling locations. The Consumer Technology Association says the goal is to keep electronics out of landfills. This will help save 100 dollars and put those metals and plastics back to use.

CRIME	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/17/2016	1:30 Min	This election, voters in Nebraska will be voting to keep or get rid of the death penalty. The death penalty was banned in 2015, but it could be brought back. Several sheriff's departments in the state say they support the return of the death penalty, since they have seen the worst in criminals. Others want to make the maximum sentence life in prison without parole.
		11/2/2016	3:30 Min	A man is facing murder charges after police say he ambushed and killed two Des Moines Police Officers as they sit in their squad cars. Police arrested Scott Greene. Police say he had a recent run in with police at a high school football game.
		12/13/2016	1:30 Min	A video game store is investigating a store break-in. They say a man stole games worth a several hundred dollars. Employees say social media helped them get one of the items back. The same day that the break-in happened a man returned a \$500 game to the store after he purchased it on an app that lets you buy things. The store bought the game back.
AT RISK YOUTH	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/17/2016	1:30 Min	Several states including Iowa and Nebraska are taking part in a drug take back event to help get more than 447 tons of unused or expired medications out of people's homes. They say teens abusing prescription drugs is also a growing problem. Health leaders say that substance abuse problems that have led to hospital visits have tripled over the last decade. In Iowa, officials are adding 100 drug drop off boxes across the state, doubling the number of collection sites.

		11/1/2016	1:30 Min	A mother is facing serious charges after being accused of injecting her children with heroin. Investigators say she used the drug to make her children fall asleep.
		12/13/2016	1:30 Min	Head lice are now a big issue in Iowa and Nebraska and there is also something called super lice. Bug experts say super lice can be resistant to chemicals once used to kill them and that means that over the counter products may not be able to kill them. Some doctors are now giving out prescriptions. Health experts say the lice can't be killed by cold weather.
POLITICAL	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/26/2016	1:30 Min	The Douglas County election commission is breaking records for early voting and voter registration. More than 80 thousand people have voted early or requested an early ballot and that is about four thousand more people than the Presidential Election in 2012. There is also a historic amount of registered voters due to the interest in the 2016 Presidential Election.
		11/3/2016	1:30 Min	Just one week until the Presidential Election and the Douglas County Election Commission says it has gotten a few thousand ballots that had to be rejected. Officials say voters either forget to sign their early voting envelop or filled out the oath incorrectly. The Election Commission says it has reached out to the people who messed up so they can come in to vote in person.
		12/12/2016	1:30 Min	Iowa Governor Terry Branstad is beginning the paperwork too begin the confirmation process to become the United States Ambassador to China. He says that he will remain Governor of Iowa until that happens. It could take several months before Branstad is confirmed.
EDUCATION	KPTM 9 O'CLOCK NEWS	10/3/2016	1:00 Min	The head of the Omaha Public School District, Mark Evans, announced he will be retiring at the end of the school year. The school board recently extended his contract until 2019. He said he is leaving to take care of his family. Many parents say they're shocked to hear of the announcement since Evans had been helping them deal with questions regarding the district's new sex education policy.

		11/11/2016	1:30 Min	High school students are getting involved with protests in connection with the outcome of the Presidential Election. Teachers say the protests can be seen as a teaching moment for students on their first amendment rights. More than one thousand students at Central High School ditched class to protest President Donald Trump's victory over Hillary Clinton.
		12/12/2016	1:30 Min	A child enrichment center will be closing its doors in the spring because its lease isn't getting renewed. The closure means about 50 workers will lose their jobs and parents will have to find a new place to take their children to. The daycare hopes to find a new location.
