Breast Cancer – 1 DM/ 9/20 HOLD

Women in Arkansas due for breast cancer screenings, are being encouraged to get screened. Dr. Ronda S. Henry-Tillman, a breast cancer surgeon at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences, says fewer women are getting checked since the shutdown of elective medical procedures in the early days of the pandemic.

Nearly 3,000 fewer women got screened or diagnosed for breast cancer between March and September of this year compared to the same time period last year at UAMS. According to a report in the Journal of the American Medical Association, a screening mammography reduces breast cancer mortality in some age groups by up to 35% percent.
