New projections for the Coronavirus in Arkansas from U-A-M-S predict the state could have as many as 100-thousand active cases by late September or early October, which would more than triple the total number of cases to-date. Dr. Joe Thompson, president of the Arkansas Center for Health Improvement, says the state is—in his words—"on the edge" right now, but the situation isn't hopeless. He says what's needed is pretty straight-forward, and other parts of the world are demonstrating it…
