GUEST: Stan Lee, Republican Attorney General Candidate
DATE: Saturday, October 6, 2007
TIME: 11:00-11:30 am
TOPIC: Big decisions are just ahead for Kentuckians who a month from today will go to the polls and fill statewide offices from Governor to Agriculture Commissioner. Lee is known as socially conservative, but has said he will enforce the laws of the commonwealth as written. It's a very important office, the top prosecutor in the state, the Attorney General also investigates consumer fraud and sometimes takes on big interests utility companies, drug makers, and other politicians. What does candidate Lee think of Attorney General Greg Stumbo's investigation of the Governor and would he be watching the next Governor closely – whether that's Fletcher or Beshear.

GUEST: Governor Ernie Fletcher, Republic Candidate for Re-election
DATE: Saturday, October 13, 2007
TIME: 11:00-11:30 am
TOPIC: Incumbent Ernie Fletcher is the first Republican Governor elected in more than 30 years and the first Republican ever eligible for re-election. He won his 2003 contest by 10 percentage points, but this year in a bid for 'four more years' he has trailed by double digits in the polls that have been released to the public. For a time, the Fletcher campaign talked about little else but the Governor's opposition to a proposal by democrat Steve Beshear for casino gambling. In recent weeks the Governor has been pounding immigration and Beshear's involvement in the liquidation of the failed insurance company – Kentucky Central. Beshear has returned the attacks on his ethics with criticism of Fletcher for pardoning some in his administration and invoking his 5th amendment rights in the merit hiring investigation. What plan does Governor Fletcher have to win the election and where does he want to take Kentucky over the next four years?

GUEST: Steve Beshear, Democratic Candidate for Governor
DATE: Saturday, October 20, 2007
TIME: 11:00-11:30 am
TOPIC: A former state representative, Attorney General, and Lt. Governor of Kentucky, Beshear reappeared on the political scene this year, 20 years after leaving office when he lost a 1987 bid for Governor. Casino gambling has been the issue that sharply divides the campaigns, but the two differ on a host of other issues as well. Now Beshear enjoys an advantage in fundraising and in the polls, but he knows all too well that only one poll counts and that's the one where voters have their say on November 6th. For that reason, he's on the move statewide looking for support and hoping to win the Governorship, even as incumbent Ernie Fletcher looks for ways to hold off the Beshear challenge.

TOPIC: The candidates for Governor will go head-to-head again for a Gubernatorial Debate. Those pushing for Governor Fletcher right now know they're seen as the underdogs in the polls as the race winds down. But those boosting Beshear also know that overconfidence has spelled defeat for plenty of candidates in the past – it's a challenge either way. CRIMESTOPPERS

Hosted by Miranda Combs. This segment airs during the 5:30 pm newscasts, October, November, and December 2007. It is a one-minute segment outlining a crime, how it occurred, the location of the crime, clues, and any hidden-camera footage of the suspect. A reward is offered to anyone who has information that will lead to the arrest and conviction of a suspect.

- October 2 Lexington Police are looking for two men they say have robbed at least seven Hispanic grocery stores in the past year. The suspects have become more violent, early on displaying weapon, they have now assaulted owner. This is video from a Hispanic grocery store in Lexington. Watch the bottom of the screen, the employee is hit in the face before the suspects take cash out of the register. Lexington police believe these same two men are responsible for at least seven other robberies of Hispanic grocery stores spread out all over the city for the past year. They are targeting Latino stores for a reason – generally Hispanic community gets paid in cash doesn't have bank accounts. If there's customers in the store they are robbing the customers.
- October 9 Lexington Police are looking for a man they say broke into a Uniform store, causing quite a bit of damage. Lexington Police are looking for this man – he's seen here inside the Uniform Factory Outlet on Nicholasville Road. Subject broke out the side glass door then while inside tried to get into the safe but was unsuccessful. Police say since he went straight to the safe, someone that works here may know the masked man. It's believed this person could possibly have connections to employees or former employees of the store. Police say he caused quite a mess while he was here back on July 15th, damaging not only the store's window, but the cash register and surveillance cameras.
- October 16 Lexington police are looking for a purse snatcher with an eye for fashion but need your help identifying the suspect in the surveillance pictures.
- October 23 Lexington police are looking for a serial bank robber but need your help identifying the suspect in the surveillance pictures. Generally when he comes in he uses forceful vulgar language when he demands money then backs off. So much so that police say as he left the First Federal Bank back on October 9th, he said thank you to the tellers. One of the common threads for police who believe this is the same man hiding his face from the cameras, who's hit this same bank twice before and several others in Lexington and Louisville. You can see a plastic shopping bag in this surveillance video, police say in this latest hold-up he points a black handgun at the first teller he sees and tells the teller to fill the bag up with big bills, he then goes on to the next teller, then the third. The third teller had money on the counter waiting for him.

October 30

Lexington Police are searching for a rapist. Police say two women were attacked on their way home from a downtown bar. He even made reference that his gun was quiet and that if he was to shoot them, nobody would hear the gun being fired. It was around 2:00 am on July 17th. Police say two girls left a bar in downtown Lexington walking through this parking lot on their way back to their home off South Limestone. One of the victims heard the suspect approach from behind. Police say the suspect held what was believed to be a gun to the back of one of the victims head. The suspect order the victims to drop their cell phones and ID's on to the ground. Police say he then pulled them out of the parking lot behind their home and into a grassy area. He sodomized and raped both the victims.

November 6

Lexington Police say two men took off with a woman's purse, then charged thousands of dollars on her credit cards. She placed her purse and several items into the employee area. That was on September 29th, now – take a look at these two men – police say they broke into that employee area of the Staples in Lexington, taking the employee's purse. Soon after the same date in a two-hour period credit cards were used from the victim of about \$2,000 in fraudulent charges at local Wal-Mart's and Shell Station. These are pictures captured of the men during their shopping spree. One even smiles at the camera as he walks out of the store. Police tracked them getting in and out of the Lincoln Navigator you can see outside a Shell Station. If these men look familiar to you, police want to know.

November 13

Copper thieves strike a strong of air conditioning units in Lexington. Police have their pictures, but need their names. On the surveillance video you can see the two suspects walking around parking lot, breaking down A.C. units you can see Freon coming out from the piping as they steal the copper. You can even see one of the suspect's faces as he looks right into the camera. This is video from Whitmore Properties on Red Mile Road, around 5:00 pm in the afternoon on October 12th. You can see the suspects sitting on the A.C. units looking making sure the coast is clear. But the camera caught plenty, these two men police say are responsible for more than a \$1000 in damage to the air conditioners. They wanted copper, now police want them for a felony.

November 20

Lexington police are looking for a two men they believe are breaking into cars and taking credit cards. These two men, police say broke into a car in the Hart Road area. Along with a lot of personal items taken were credit cards and debit cards. They then showed up to shop with stolen credit cards here at Meijer in Lexington. Video shows the men going up and down the aisles, loading up more than \$500 worth of items. All this happening just a short time after police say they broke into the victim's car. The detectives involved believe these individuals have done several and continue these type of thefts from vehicles and important that we catch these people.

- November 27 Nicholasville police are looking for a man they can clearly see on surveillance video, but can't find. This is a man police are trying to identify. He's walking outside the personnel finance business in Nicholasville. The time is around 5:00 am in the morning on August 27th. After walking back and forth several times, police say the suspect throws a rock through the glass doors. You can see him do it, he then reaches around through the broken glass, but police don't believe he took anything. He then takes off, leaving a lot of clean up for the Nicholasville business. If you know who this man is, police want you to call.
- December 4 Lexington police believe they're looking for the same man who burglarized the Dollar Tree on Pimlico Parkway twice, using a hammer. This is the view from inside the Dollar Tree on October 4th, it's closed, but that didn't stop this man, in fact, police believe this is the second time he's done this. They say he did the same thing the week before. In both instances, you can see a subject break out the glass door with a hammer. Police say he then starts shopping. Just items from inside Dollar Tree, nothing particular just like if you were shopping when the store was closed, just takes a bag and goes down the aisles. Then cameras catch him carefully going out the hole he created with a shopping bag in hand. Investigators believe both burglaries were committed by the same suspect
- December 11 Some Lexington residents woke up to Molotov cocktails burning in their home. That was two months ago, still police don't know who did it. The victims were asleep in their home on Tartan Drive when they heard glass smashing in living room area of the house. Police say that sound was caused by a brick then followed by two Molotov cocktails. There were two beer bottles with gas in time and a cloth wick. Police say one of the cocktails exploded inside the home causing extensive fire damage. Now, almost two months after the crime, investigators need your help, figuring one of the suspects has probably talked to someone about the incident. That person can solve this case and give those who live here some peace of mind.
- December 18 Lexington police are searching for a bank robber who may have changed his plans in the middle of his pursuit for money. This picture was captured at the Republic Bank in Brighton Place on November 28th. Just a short time later the same man, according to police shows up at the National City Bank on Sir Barton. He went up to the counter and filled out what employees believe was a deposit slip, later we discovered that was the demand note he used. He then heads up to the teller in the far corner of your screen and hands over the demand note. He demanded no dye pack, no trackers and threatened to kill them if they didn't comply within 60 seconds. The teller complied and the suspect left. You'll notice those standing around didn't even realize a robbery had just taken place. But police say this bank may not have been his first target. Here's his picture from the Republic Bank minutes earlier. Police noticed the demand note used

in the robbery was a deposit slip from the Republic Bank. Police say for reasons unknown he wrote the note here, but decided not to go through with the robbery at that location.
