CON ED STRIKE

The utility locked about 8,500 union workers out of their jobs, after failing to come to an agreement on a new contract. The fight is over their pensions, health care and pay. Various politicians are weighing in on the lockout, urging both sides to continue negotiations. Con Ed says talks are scheduled to resume at noon on Thursday.

The number of middle-skill jobs, which are most susceptible to being replaced by machines, or shipped overseas fell by 12%. But despite the recession, there was a 2% increase in personal-service jobs.
