1. To give us a little background, please tell us a bit about the Wilderness Society. What is its mission and history? What are its goals? What are its major accomplishments over the ~~past~~ ^{several} years?
2. We've been hearing a lot recently about Trump's threats to diminish public national monuments. Earlier this year, in an executive order, he ordered a "review" of 27 national monuments. Can you tell us what that would include? What sorts of monuments are at risk? How much land is threatened?
3. You have said, "In signing this order, Trump is effectively saying that nothing is off the table, including the sacrifice of some of our most sacred parks and historic sites to pay back his fossil fuel-backed allies in Congress." What has Trump said about his intention in targeting these monuments?
4. How does this executive order stand in the face of the Antiquities Act? Can you tell us a bit more about the Antiquities Act and the protections it provides for national monuments? Who has used the Antiquities Act? What sort of legal standing does it have? Does the president have a legal right to make this order?
5. What kind of support does the Antiquities Act have in Congress?

We'll take a short break and come back and talk about the status of the review, what land is in immediate danger, what citizens' responses to that are, and what the Wilderness Society is doing about that. We're speaking to Dan Hartinger, **deputy director of parks and public lands defense at The Wilderness Society and the National Monuments Campaign Manager**. 6. What has been the public reaction to efforts to shrink the authority of the Antiquities Act? What are the concerns about the consequences of reducing National Monuments?
7. What has The Wilderness Society discovered about the economic impact of reducing the monuments?
8. On December 4, Trump issued a proclamation reducing the Bears Ears National Monument by about a million acres. Did I read that right? From 1.35 acres? Describe the Bears Ears National Monument in Southern Utah for us? What will be the overall impact of reducing this Monument?
9. In response, we read on your website, "Earthjustice is representing nine conservation organizations in a suit charging that the president violated the 1906 Antiquities Act and the U.S. Constitution by eviscerating the monument. The unprecedented act leaves rare archaeological sites and stunning wildlands without protection from looting, prospecting, oil and gas drilling, uranium mining, or off-road vehicle damage. Bears Ears was decimated by more than 1 million acres. The Natural Resources Defense Council and Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance are co-plaintiffs in the case, represented by counsel from those organizations." Can you tell us more about the lawsuit? What are some of the other environmental organizations involved? How will the suit be litigated? Can there be any prospecting/mining/drilling activity in this region while the lawsuit is being litigated?
10. We read that Grand Staircase-Escalante is also in danger. Is that a part of this suit? Is Trump likely to make any other proclamations soon? How does Interior Secretary Zinke fit into this picture? Are there other Monuments that are immediately at risk?
11. How can people help?

Our guest tonight has been Dan Hartinger, deputy director of parks and public lands defense at The Wilderness Society and the National Monuments Campaign Manager. Thank you so much for joining us tonight, and thanks to you and the Wilderness Society for the great work you do. 

Station ID: This is KZFR, 90.1, FM, Chico, listener supported community radio for the Sacramento Valley, the Foothills, and Beyond. Up next, Ecotopia. Tonight we'll be discussing ways of protecting Northern California's water supply and quality.

Music #1: Theme

Steve: This is Ecotopia on KZFR, exploring ecosystems, environmental, social, technological. I'm Stephen Tchudi. Tonight we'll be talking with Barbara Vlamis, Executive Director of AquAlliance which "exists to defend northern California waters and to challenge threats to the hydrologic health of the northern Sacramento River watershed."

Susan: I'm Susan Tchudi. First we'll talk with Barbara about recent developments in the Twin Tunnels project that would pipe water from the Sacramento River in the north to big agriculture projects in the south. In particular, we'll ask about her recent testimony ^{regarding} submitted to the Department of Water Resources and the Bureau of ~~Land Management~~ ^{Reclamation} challenging their plans, especially their failure to address the impacts of this proposed project on our watershed.

Steve: And then we'll ask her about the Sites Reservoir project that would collect so-called "surplus" water in wet years and store it west of Maxwell. While the project has some support in political and agricultural circles, Aqualliance and other groups consider it to be an unwise and possibly even foolish project.

Susan: Underwriters

Steve: The opinions expressed on Ecotopia do not necessarily express the views of KZFR, its staff, Board of Directors, volunteers, underwriters, or programmers.

We'll take a short break and be back to talk with Barbara Vlamis about the Twin Tunnels.

Music #2:

Steve: You are listening to Ecotopia on KZFR, exploring ecosystems, environmental, social, and technological. With us in the studio now is Barbara Vlamis, Executive Director of AquAlliance, the organization that is *the* defender of northern California's limited water supplies. Barbara has been on the program several times before, and tonight she'll bring us information about two major proposed water projects: the Twin Tunnels and the Sites Reservoir.

--Let's start with the Twin Tunnels. Many if not all of our listeners are familiar with this project, a pet project of Governor Jerry Brown. But please review for us what the so-called "WaterFix" project would entail. What's its aim and how would it accomplish that aim? (What does the term "WaterFix"

mean and imply? What's "broken" and how are the tunnels seen as a "Fix"?)

--AquAlliance has provided leadership in opposing this project from the point of view of northern California. You recently submitted testimony for a hearing with a deadline of November 30 to the State Water Resources Conservation Board. What is the SWRCB and what power does it hold?

--Why is it important to participate in the SWRCB hearings? Are any other NorthState groups or governments participating? [AquAlliance's members include farmers, scientists, businesses, educators, and residents who have significant financial, recreational, scientific, aesthetic, educational, and conservation interests in the aquatic and terrestrial environments that rely on waters of the Sacramento River Watershed.]

--Your testimony ran some 25 pages. What are some of the key arguments that you offered?

- Tunnel capacity 15,000 cfs (38-63% of the Sac River's average annual flow)
- Groundwater depletion
- Transfers
- Subsidence
- Water quality

["The WaterFix is a clear danger to the people, flora, and fauna of the Sacramento Valley and surrounding foothills. The increased likelihood of groundwater substitution transfers under the WaterFix will deplete water tables, increase costs to groundwater dependent homes, farms, and businesses, cause more losses to rivers and streams upstream of the Twin Tunnels, mobilize polluted plumes, and negatively influence terrestrial habitat upstream and downstream of the Project. Essential water for wildlife (including special status species), refuges, recreation, tourism, and local economies that benefit from tourism in the area of origin is treated as a non-issue for this water dependent Project. Simply because the Applicants have not adequately studied, presented, or analyzed impacts from current and planned transfers, and only played lip service to modeling, albeit with a model that does not mean there are no highly probable impacts to AquAlliance's members, the general public, visitors to the Sacramento Valley, and the environment on which all life depends."]

--Can/will SWRCB stop the tunnels? What other avenues exist to stop the Tunnels? Is AquAlliance considering additional legal actions?

--What are the implications of the coming Governor's race on the Tunnels?

--What is the significance of Metropolitan Water District's decision not to fund the tunnels? Would AquAlliance's position change if the Twin tunnels were reduced to One?

This is Ecotopia on KZFR, and we are talking with Barbara Vlamis, Executive Director of AquAlliance. We'll take a short break and be back to ask Barbara about another Big Water Project, the proposed Sites Reservoir.

Susan: This is Ecotopia on KZFR, and we are talking with Barbara Vlamis, Executive Director of AquAlliance, which is a defender of northern California waters. Barbara has been a frequent guest on this program, and we are grateful to her and AquAlliance for their keeping a very sharp eye on projects that could seriously damage our watershed.

--Let's turn now to the Sites Reservoir. Again, our listeners probably have some familiarity with this project, but please fill us in on the background of the project. How big would it be? Where would water from Sites come from? What are the hydraulics? [Marc Reisner: Cadillac Desert and the engineered west.] What lessons should we have learned from previous water engineering marvels (e.g. Oroville Dam.)

--There was a public meeting held in Maxwell on December 7th. How did AquAlliance participate? What did you identify as the major problems with the Sites project? Were there property owners in attendance? If so, what were their positions?

--How would Sites be funded? There is a claim that 50% (or so) of its water would be used for environmental purposes (provided the state purchases its potential share). Are these claims valid?

--Governor Brown owns property near the proposed reservoir and intends to retire there. This was recently discussed in the 60-Minutes program December 10, 2017. What is his administration's position on Sites?

Wants a beautiful lake -

--When does the DEIS/EIR comment period end? What concerns will AA raise?

--How may the public participate or support AquAlliance? [aqualliance.net]

Thank you, Barbara Vlamis, for being with us tonight, and thank you to AquAlliance and its members for your amazing work as watchdog of northern California waters.
