

Station ID: This is KZFR, 90.1, FM, Chico, listener supported community radio for the Sacramento Valley, the Foothills, and Beyond. Up next, Ecotopia, with a discussion of industrial hazards, synthetic fabrics, cellophane, and greenwashing.

Music #1: Theme

Susan: This is Ecotopia on KZFR, exploring ecosystems, environmental, social, technological. I'm Susan Tchudi. We want to extend our thanks to Tam'ra Wich'ma, Bill Mash, and Chris Nelson for minding the Ecotopian shop during our three-week absence. We really appreciate having such skilled and ecotopian minded KZFR broadcasters to cover for us.

Steve: I'm Stephen Tchudi. Tonight's program will focus on a synthetic fabric that we thought was a thing of the past: rayon, or fake silk. Although it has been replaced for many uses by other synthetic fabrics, our guest, Dr. Paul Blanc, will tell us that it's central ingredient, cellulose viscose, is still around and has a long history of damaging the health of workers who are exposed to the fumes of its primary chemical ingredient: carbon disulfide. His book is titled *Fake Silk*, and it is especially important because of its discussion of how industry and government have long engaged in coverups of dangers to workers' health.

Steve: This is Ecotopia on KZFR, and in this program we'll be looking at workplace health and safety through the lens of one of the world's oldest and most established synthetic fabrics. Our guest is Dr. Paul Blanc, who has written a book titled *Fake Silk: The Lethal History of Viscose Rayon*. He'll be telling us about the toxic effects of the chemicals used in cellulose viscose production and about some of the ways that health issues have been ignored, downplayed, and covered up for over a century.

Susan: Dr. Blanc is a professor of medicine and holds the Endowed Chair in Occupational and Environmental medicine at UC San Francisco. He also writes a blog on household hazards, and we'll ask him about some of the products in common use can make us sick. Welcome Paul Blanc.

Steve: As you write in the preface to your book, a lot of us don't know much about rayon and maybe think it went out of style and production with leisure suits in the 1970s. What is viscose rayon or fake silk and why is it of concern today?

Susan: Your book provides a lot of detail on the production of rayon. When was it invented and how long has it been around? How is it manufactured from cellulose?

Steve: What is carbon disulfide and why is it dangerous? What are some of the other ways in which it is has been used in the past—e.g. anaesthetic, insecticide, gopher extermination, chemical solvent?

Tweedle:

--You have done extensive research showing that reports of the effects carbon disulfide have been downplayed, ignored, and covered up. Please tell us that story. In the book you name names: please tell some of the companies that were involved in the cover-up of the dangers of the rayon industry.

– You devote a chapter to "wrapped up in cellophane." What are the connections among rayon and cellophane and big business? We thought that "cellophane" was also a product of the past—how is transparent viscose cellulose used today? [Note: sausage casings and skinless franks.]

– One of your chapters is titled, "rayon goes to war." What were some of the ways in which rayon was promoted and propagandized and even produced by slave labor by many countries during World War II. What are some of the things you learned about health hazards and worker exposure during that time?

– How did the post-war development of totally synthetic fabrics – nylon, orlon and others – affect the evolution and use of rayon. How have its uses morphed over time? You have recently visited factory sites—both closed down and still operating. What did you observe?

—How is cellulose viscose "greenwashed" today?

– It's clear that your overarching research interests go well beyond rayon and cellophane ~~and cellophane~~; how does this story provide a link to the larger issue of industrial-induced diseases?

Susan? This is Ecotopia on KZFR and we are speaking with Dr. Paul Blanc about his book, *Fake Silk: The Lethal History of Viscose Rayon*, recently published by Yale University Press. We haven't been able to do justice to the rich research and detail in the book and urge listeners to get a copy and read more. But in our remaining time we'd also like to ask him about his previous book, *How Everyday Products Make People Sick* and about his blog for Psychology Today on "Household Hazards." X

--With the election and inauguration on everybody's mind, we were interested in your blog post titled, "Let's Make America Toxic Again," describing a Christmas ornament marketed by the Trump campaign. Please tell us about the "Red Cap Collectible Ornament" and, more important, what you see as the threat of a Trump rollback of environmental and workplace regulations.

--You also wrote about other Christmas product recalls from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission—crossbows, a chicken toy, wine boxes, christmas lights, candles . . . How confident can we be that the CPSC is catching all the products that can harm us?

--What can concerned listeners do to: A) protect themselves and their families, B) lobby or otherwise advocate for safer products on the marketplace and more responsible behavior by big business?

Our guest has been Dr. Paul Blanc professor of Occupational and Environmental Medicine at UCSF. The book is *Fake Silk: The Lethal History of Viscose Rayon*, and Dr. Blanc has also written a book on *How Everyday Products Make People Sick*. 

Music #1: Theme

Steve: This is Ecotopia on KZFR, exploring ecosystems, environmental, social, technological. I'm Stephen Tchudi. These are difficult times for activists with environmental interests, and tonight we'll be talking with several activists who are making a difference.

Susan: I'm Susan Tchudi. First we'll be on the phone with Robert Wintner, who goes by the pen name of Snorkel Bob. We've interviewed Robert several times before about his interest in preserving reefs and tropical fish in the state of Hawaii. Tonight, he'll tell us about legislation pending in Hawaii that would ban catching tropicals for the aquarium trade, and he will ask for listeners' help in passing that legislation.

Steve: Then we will talk with three Chico activists: Chris Nelson, Dave Garcia, and Jake Davis. We'll ask them about what they see as the challenges and problems resulting from Donald Trump's recent executive orders and actions on the environment, which range from stifling the scientific evidence of climate change to putting a climate denier in charge of the EPA.

We'll take a short break and be back to talk with Robert Wintner about his tropical fish campaigns in Hawaii.

Steve: This is Ecotopia on KZFR, and on the phone with us from Hawaii is Robert Wintner, who also goes by the moniker of Snorkel Bob. We've interviewed him previously about his gorgeous photo books showing tropical fish in their native habitat, particularly Hawaii and Cuba. Robert contacted us last week about some legislation pending in Hawaii and asked for our help in inviting people to contact the Hawaii legislature. Welcome back to Ecotopia, Robert Wintner.

--You've long fought against the aquarium trade, and you've certainly convinced us that aquariums,

from home to public institutions, are a bad idea. Please tell our listeners why catching tropicals, shipping them across the seas, and placing them in stores and aquariums is such a bad idea.

--What are the bills that are coming before the Hawaii legislature? What would be their effect? Who is leading the opposition to these bills? You've said that this is mostly about money. Who profits most from the aquarium trade?

--You told us that you'd like to have support coming from California. How can our listeners weigh in? Will the Hawaii legislature be interested in what Californians think?

--How do people register their concerns. (Listeners, we'll put all this info up on our web site.) And how can people follow and become supporters of your work. (<http://snorkelbob.com/one-reef/>) Snorkel Bob foundation.

Thank you, Robert Wintner for being with us tonight. We hope you'll come back from time to time to tell us about this political action (and to share your newest photos and writing). This is Ecotopia on KZFR, and we'll be back shortly to talk with Northstate Activists Chris Nelson, Dave Garcia, and Jake Davis.

Steve: This is Ecotopia on KZFR. It's no secret that the environment is under attack from the new president. Since January 20 Trump and his staff have presented a number of alarming mandates that undermine years of work by environmentalists. Before speaking with our guests—Chris Nelson, Dave Garcia, and Jake Davis—I want to remind us all of some of the actions that have been taken by the Trump administration and his supporters in congress:

- A freeze on all new EPA new contracts and grants.
- A media blackout at the EPA . . . That meant no press releases, no blog posts and no social media.
- Removing references to climate change from the White House web site.
- Bringing the the XL Keystone and Dakota pipelines back to life, rescinding the blocks created by President Obama.
- Rolling back stream pollution and methane release limitations that we discussed last week with Earth Justice attorney Abigail Dillen.
- Nominating former Oklahoma Attorney and climate denier General Scott Pruitt as head of the EPA, who, according to his own we site, is "a leading advocate against the EPA's activist agenda."
- Introducing a bill in the republican congress to abolish the EPA altogether.
- A recent article by Rachel Levin published yesterday by the Daily Environmental Report estimates that Trump will keep at least 30 of his anti-environment campaign promises shortly, including rolling back the U.S. agreements under the Paris Accords.

With us in the studio now are three amazing local activists, Chris Nelson, Jake Davis, and Dave Garcia who have led and are leading campaigns on climate change, drones, fracking, oil trains, and more. We want to ask them about how Trumpism is affecting their work and what they think local activists can do about it.

--Chris Nelson: You were at Standing Rock in December about the time the Obama administration called off the Corps of Engineers and its plans to run the Dakota Access Pipeline close to Native American water supplies. Please describe your experiences. What is the result of the Trump actions? [Note that the N. Dakota state government has now elevated some forms of protest to a felony.] [Tribal leaders have urged protesters to go home.]

--Dave Garcia: To our knowledge, Trump has not yet acted on fracking, but he campaigned on a pro-fracking platform, and given his appointments to the EPA [Scott Pruitt] and Texas pro-petroleum Rick Perry, Secretary of Energy and oilman Rex Tillerson as Secretary of State, we have suppose that efforts to limit fracking will be stifled. What do you think? Comment on the methane release rollback. What about the oil trains?

--Jake Davis: Chico 350.org has campaigned vigorously with workshops, rallies, and more to bring attention to climate change. What will be the impacts of Trumpism, including his pledge to roll back the Paris Accords.

--All three: What can activists do?

- Protests, rallies?
- Legal action? [Times on the immigration ban rollback. EarthJustice and ACLU.]
- Personal change—solar, gardens, automobiles

--Are there any specific plans in the works for groups of which you are a part? How can people learn more and get involved?

Susan Tchudi: You are the convener of a group called the Environmental Coalition of Butte County.

Please tell us about that organization, who's involved, what you have planned.
