Other books include *Curious Attractions: Essays on Fiction Writing*, the anthology *Twenty Under Thirty*, and the recently reissued *Coconuts for the Saint*. She teaches at Colby College and in the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College. Spark has published numerous articles, book reviews, short stories, essays, travel articles, food articles, and op-eds in publications like *Agni*, the *Boston Globe*, the *Cincinnati Review*, the *Chicago Tribune*, *Epoch*, *Esquire*, *Five Points*, *Harvard Review*, *The Huffington Post*, *Maine Magazine*, *Narrative*, *New England Travel and Life*, the *New England Review*, the *New York Times*, *Ploughshares*, *salon.com*, the *San Francisco Chronicle*, the *Washington Post*, *Food and Wine*, and *Yankee*, among other places. 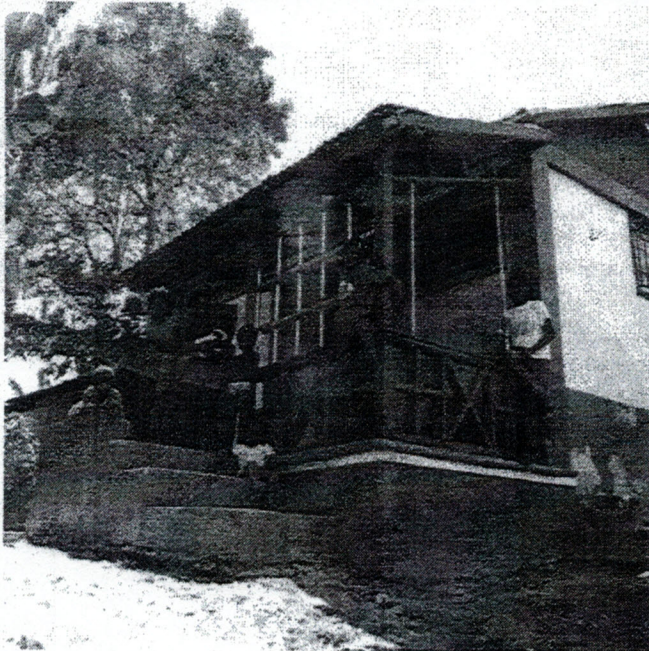

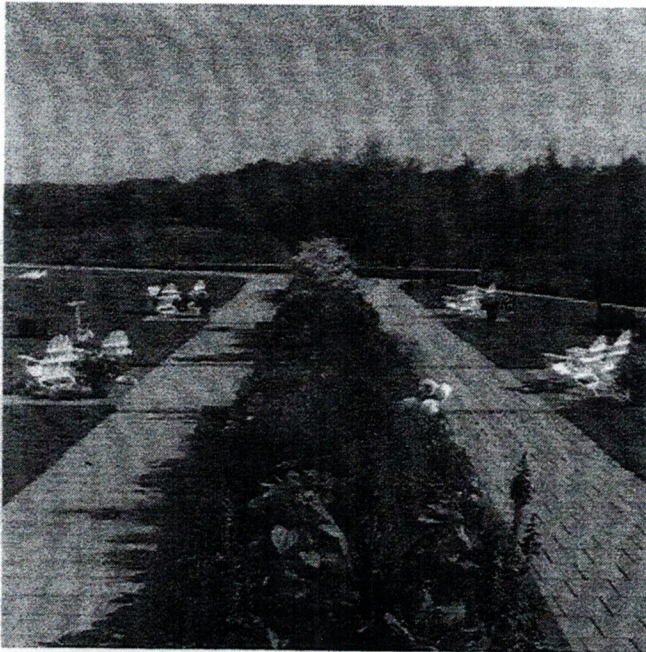
