Spot	State legislators applauded Missouri Governor Parson's State of the State address last week – although for very different reasons. The governor's historic 52-million dollars for programs prioritizing children and early education brought lawmakers to their feet, with his calls for expanding childcare access, and higher pay for teachers and state workers. But only Republicans stood to applaud his celebration of the state's abortion ban. Parson boasted about the state's "right to choose" status following the overturning of 'Roe versus Wade.' Some Missourians think perhaps the governor is acknowledging a need for greater investment in young children, given the state's near-total abortion ban. Democratic House Minority Leader Crystal Quade said the speech "fell flat" in terms of women's access to reproductive healthcare. But she's optimistic about having the issue on the ballot this fall. Parson's focus also includes increasing funding for K-through-12 education by 700-million dollars.
