## FOCUS OCTOBER – DECEMBER 2020

In our ongoing effort to serve the public interest, station WKRU (The Big Dog) broadcasts programming responsive to issues of concern to Green Bay and the surrounding service area. The following is a list of those issues and the stations most significant programming treatment of them.

**ISSUES COVERED:** NON-PROFITS ARE STRUGGLING JUST WHEN WE NEED THEM THE MOST.

PROGRAM: PROJECT SHINE- P.S.A'S AND DIGITAL PRODUCTION

LENGTH: 120 SECONDS, 60 SECONDS, 30 SECONDS & 15 SECONDS

DATE / TIME AIRED: 11/19-CONTINUING

DESCRIPTION: WKRU SUPPORTS PROJECT SHINE, WHICH CONNECTS VOLUNTEERS WITH VOLUNTEER MATCH.ORG. THEY PARTNER WITH OVER 130,000 NON-PROFITS AND ARE THE LARGEST ONLINE VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT NETWORK. THERE ARE CURRENTLY 3.2 MILLION VOLUNTEERS NEEDED BY NON-PROFITS. OVER 700,000 OF THOSE OPENINGS ARE FOR VIRTUAL VOLUNTEERS, FOR SAFELY-DISTANCED ACTIVITIES. THIS MAKES IT POSSIBLE FOR PEOPLE WHO DON'T HAVE MONEY TO DONATE, BUT WHO DO HAVE TIME, EXPERIENCE AND PASSION TO STILL HAVE A POSITIVE IMPACT IN THEIR COMMUNITY, THROUGH VOLUNTEERISM. WE AIRED EVERY HOUR LIVE AND RECORDED MESSAGES AND POSTED DIGITAL PROMOS ON OUR WEBSITE AND SOCIAL MEDIA, TO ENABLE GOOD PEOPLE AND GREAT CAUSES TO CONNECT.

PROGRAM: WILL THERE BE ENOUGH ELECTION VOLUNTEERS IN WI?

**LENGTH: 90 SECONDS** 

DATE / TIME AIRED OCTOBER 3-4, 2020

**DESCRIPTION:** ELECTION DAY IS LESS THAN ONE MONTH AWAY. BUT UP UNTIL THEN, A TIDAL WAVE OF ABSENTEE BALLOTS WILL BE SENT IN BECAUSE OF THE PANDEMIC. AND STAFFING POLLING LOCATIONS WILL BE HARD BECAUSE OF THE PANDEMIC. IN WISCONSIN, MUNICIPAL CLERKS ARE HOPING VOLUNTEERS STILL CAN HELP PICK THE SLACK AMID A DIFFERENT VOTING DYNAMIC THIS YEAR. PROGRAM: RURAL HEALTH CARE STRESSED AS COVID SURGES IN MIDWEST

**DESCRIPTION:** MADISON, WI -- WISCONSIN IS AMONG THE NATION'S CORONAVIRUS HOT SPOTS RIGHT NOW. AND IN MANY MIDWESTERN STATES, COMMUNITY SPREAD HAS BEEN A SIGNIFICANT FACTOR IN RURAL AREAS, LEAVING HEALTH-CARE PROVIDERS WITH HIGHER DEMAND WHEN THEY ALREADY HAVE FEWER RESOURCES. **DESCRIPTION:** OUTREACH CONTINUES TO GET MORE FARMERS TO ADOPT CONSERVATION PRACTICES, BUT INITIAL COSTS AND LACK OF TIME CAN BE A BARRIER. IN NORTHEASTERN WISCONSIN, A DONATED PIECE OF EQUIPMENT IS PROVING TO BE USEFUL. PROGRAM: DEER WILL BE DARTING ONTO HIGHWAYS IN THE COMING WEEKS

DATE / TIME AIRED: OCTOBER 24-25, 2020

**DESCRIPTION:** WISCONSIN STATE PATROL WARNS DEER WILL BE MORE PREVALENT AND THEIR MOVEMENTS LESS PREDICTABLE ALONG WISCONSIN ROADWAYS DURING THE MATING SEASON OR "RUT" IN OCTOBER AND NOVEMBER. DEER ARE MORE ACTIVE, ESPECIALLY AT DUSK AND DAWN WHEN THEY MOVE TO AND FROM THEIR BEDDING AND FEEDING AREAS.

PROGRAM: TO SURVIVE CRISIS, SMALL WI FARMS PIVOT TO DIRECT MARKETING

DATE / TIME AIRED: OCTOBER 31 – NOVEMBER 1, 2020

**DESCRIPTION:** DELEVAN, WI -- THE CHALLENGES FACING THE FARMING COMMUNITY BEFORE AND AFTER THE COVID-19 CRISIS HAVE BEEN WELL DOCUMENTED. BUT AGRICULTURE EXPERTS SAY THEY'RE LIKELY TO CONTINUE, ESPECIALLY AS THE PANDEMIC RAVAGES STATES SUCH AS WISCONSIN. STILL, SOME SMALLER OPERATIONS ARE FINDING A WAY TO STAY AFLOAT. COMMENTS FROM JANET GAMBLE, OWNER, TURTLE CREEK GARDENS; AND JEREMY LYNCH, OWNER, ENOS (EE-NOSE) FARMS.

THIS YEAR, THE AMERICAN DIABETES ASSOCIATION IS TAKING A BOLDER, MORE AUDACIOUS APPROACH TO AMERICAN DIABETES MONTH. WITH NEARLY TWENTY-FOUR MILLION CHILDREN AND ADULTS IN THE UNITED STATES LIVING WITH DIABETES AND AN ADDITIONAL FIFTY-SEVEN MILLION AMERICANS AT RISK, SIMPLE AWARENESS WILL NO LONGER SUFFICE
