Leticia Chavez Paulette shares her story. Host Pastor Danny Sanchez interviews Barbara Sanchez and Alishia Griffin of Victory Outreach International of Albuquerque to discuss prostitution. Barbara does not know one person who decided to work the streets of Albuquerque because they chose to; they have a need. They're either on drugs or they have children to support, and they are caught in a dangerous vicious cycle every day on these streets. When they become drug addicted, they wake up in the morning and the first thing on their mind is their mission; to hustle and sell their body to get money to fulfill their drug addiction. The children of a prostitute are either left in a motel room while she's working, or the state comes in and takes over and takes them away and they end up in the vicious cycle of the system. Some families will step in and take these children on and raise them as their own. The Code Red Ministry is a thrust to reach these twilight treasures, believing for souls to be saved. Code Red Ministry was established in the heart of Victory Outreach International Founders, Pastor Sonny and Sister Julie Arguinzoni because they saw a special need just for prostitutes. Code Red means an alarm, an urgency. It felt like an urgency to come out and reach them and rescue them. Code Red Ministry was established out of the heart of God for His love for His people so that they don't have to live like this anymore. In the City of Albuquerque, New Mexico, it is vital because too many women were dying.

Veronica Lamb, Social Justice Pastor of Blue Water Mission talks about human trafficking. Veronica defines human trafficking as force, fraud, or coercion to force somebody into making money for someone else. This industry brings in about 10 Billion Dollars a month, affecting 25 million people in the world. Women and children all over this country are being picked up, pimped out, and transferred across this country in every city in the nation. Prostitution is 99.9 percent of the time controlled by traffickers and pimps. With sex trafficking victims, someone else is controlling that situation by manipulating, threatening, using coercion, and blackmail. Pimps use violence, threats, and a "Romeo" or boyfriend approach like "Hey, I love you. You should do anything for me." The traffickers and pimps network together employing runners, or other people on the street, to report back to them. They have a systematized approach to breaking down an individual, making them reliant on them, isolating them from all of the relationships and individuals and networks of support that could possibly help them. There are individuals who actually study, train, mentor, and raise up others in order to brainwash and turn out the vulnerable individuals in our society and basically turn them into money-making machines for themselves. Traffickers and pimps love to target young people without a father figure at home, physically or emotionally; or children with parents that are incarcerated; or a young person that grew up in the foster care system; and of course, poverty or any other sort of social economic situations that make young people vulnerable. John Roberts, Community Life Pastor, shares that the goal is to get somebody back to a place where they can fully function in society. They've taken in people from all different walks of life: a single mother and her children, somebody who was trafficked, someone who has fallen into addictions or just hard times, and has found themselves in need of a place to live. Veronica lets women on the streets or in the strip clubs know they are accepted just as they are and that there is a place for them, if they want, when they are ready. Blue Water Mission provides relationships and a family-like atmosphere, and works with other local organizations, as well as local and federal law enforcement.

Mark Siegrist, Director of Education at Denver Rescue Mission, talks about challenges for people who don't have their high school diploma. There are many reasons people do not get a high school diploma; some make a decision in their teenage years to drop out of school, others for economic reasons, for bad decisions, for bad habits in their lives, and some think that life is easier out of school than it is in school. One challenge for people who don't have their high school diploma is that a lot of times they have to lie on their job applications stating that they have completed high school. Although they find a way to survive and work through life without a high school diploma, they realize that there is a great need for bettering themselves. However, some people give up on the idea of reaching their GED goals for reasons such as not finding a resource center, a lack of financial resources, other life commitments, or the difficulty of the GED test. As individuals try to find ways to find stability in their life and focus on what the next step is, those in the Denver Rescue Mission Program, receive the resources, support and tutoring necessary to achieve their GED when they make a personal commitment.

Often families will either help them or cast them out, but sometimes even join them in their addiction. The children often end up with grandparents, uncles and aunts; bouncing around family, or in worse situations. Addiction has no discrimination, affecting people from all walks of life. U-Turn for Christ New Mexico provides a program based on the Bible, and the offer of restoration, and the offer of forgiveness and new life found in Jesus.

Cheryl Wilson, Church Relations Manager, of Joni & Friends Arizona talks about families affected by disabilities. The Stratman family and the Hamilton family share their story. There are over 650 million people around the world affected by disability and they are isolated, abandoned, and often put in institutions because they are so stigmatized. People do not accept them. They are not a part of society. If they cannot be a part of society, they are not going to get an education, and eventually they are not going to be able to get a job or support themselves or their families, so they end up being the highest poverty level group as well. In Arizona, approximately twelve percent of the population, (800,000) has disabilities. People with disabilities are the most unreached people group in the world, and the most unchurched because of stigmas. While the divorce rate is about fifty percent for typical families, it goes up exponentially for a families affected disability. Joni & Friends want the church to be so irresistible that people with disabilities want to run to the church and consequently want to run to Jesus. Joni & Friends trains churches on how to make their facilities accessible, how to minister to mom and dad, how to minister to the siblings, how to reach out to the person with the disability, how to deal with the behavioral issues of a child with autism, and how to adapt the curriculum. They want the church to be that refuge and place for families to go to get the support, connection, prayer, and sense of belonging within the Body of Christ, because the church is not complete unless we have families with disabilities serving alongside us. Joni & Friends also provides a family retreat that is a week-long camp-like experience for these families. Volunteers are needed to come and serve those families for a week. God has created us in His own image. We have so much worth and value to our Savior. Every person is indispensable to Jesus.

Host Cathy Rhodes interviews Milan Homola, Executive Director of Compassion Connect to discuss health. The needs used to be almost equal between medical and dental because of the huge number of uninsured. Then the Affordable Care Act shifted things to a dental focus. The biggest need in our low income neighborhoods are people who can't access dental services for kids and adults of all ages. Dental doesn't have the same infrastructure that there is for medical care on the Medicaid and Medicare side of the equation. Many who are insured under the Affordable Care Act cannot access it due to the complexity of the system. Although some are insured on paper, they cannot find a physician who will actually accept that insurance. The same is true with dental. Most state dental plans are not accepted by the vast majority of private practice dentists. People who are undocumented, or refugees, are also not able to get their basic health care needs met. If people had preventative dental care, many problems could be met earlier at a much lower cost for the healthcare infrastructure. Compassion Connect is a nonprofit organization that works nationally and globally to bring churches together to serve their neighbors, meet health needs, work on anti-trafficking and various issues; basically a church-uniting organization. Compassion Connect designs models of unity so that churches can link arms and people of faith can put their faith into action. A Compassion Connect Clinic is a family-fun atmosphere where people can come, first come, first serve, and connect with doctors and dentists, get their hair cut, get a lunch, connect with volunteers from a dozen different churches in their neighborhoods, and find out about other social service agencies. Volunteers come from churches and the community. It's everyone in the community coming together to serve.

Host Athena Sorensen interviews Steve Holck, Founder of Aloha Pregnancy Care & Counseling Center to discuss abortion. A word of caution, some of what you are about to hear is graphic. Women are afraid financially of a lack of support by the man. They are afraid of their fathers, mothers, and grandparents, which many of them support abortion. Most girls, if you support her in her pregnancy will have the baby. Probably, fifty percent of all abortions are by Christian women. During an abortion process, the so-called doctor wants to go in and kill your baby. That is his job. They'll do it by dilation and extraction or dilation and curettage. They will go in there and scrape the baby out, or there's the partial birth abortion, where they take a full size baby, up to nine months, and they have to kill the baby before it comes out. A lot of women die. Physically, the insides of their uterus can be damaged. When that happens, no more babies. There is deep emotional damage and psychological trauma. Host Athena Sorensen interviews Garret Hashimoto, President of Aloha Pregnancy Care & Counseling Center, to discuss what goes on at their center. Every woman who walks into Aloha Pregnancy Care & Counseling Center is welcomed with a big smile and they make sure she knows that her being there is confidential and that her being there is their concern as much as hers. She is loved and welcomed because they know love overcomes everything. They are a Christian ministry. Services are provided for needy families; giving out free diapers, free baby wipes, free food, free clothing, blankets, you name it.

CBN News Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Chances are you or someone you know takes a drug to lower cholesterol. This class of drug is called a statin. They are the most widely prescribed drugs in history. An estimated one-fourth of Americans over the age of 40 takes a statin. These enormously popular drugs are controversial. On one hand, some doctors say they are so beneficial, far more people should be taking them than those who already do. However, on the other hand, there are physicians who say statins should be used by fewer people than those who are currently taking them. In addition to doctors, many patients are weighing-in on statins, based on their own experiences with the drugs. Patients like David Venables, who blames statins for ruining his life and killing his dream of retirement filled with travel. He says taking the drug caused such severe walking and breathing problems, he's now basically homebound. Although David felt great, his doctor prescribed a statin because he felt David's LDL or "bad cholesterol," was too high. Not long after that, David started experiencing problems he'd never encountered before. According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, statin side effects include memory loss, confusion, muscle problems, increased blood sugar and diabetes, liver issues and more. Side effects often go away when the patient stops taking the drug. Some statin users, however, say their problems are permanent. David is one of thousands on the web ([http://stopped\\_our\\_statin.webs.com](http://stopped_our_statin.webs.com)) and social media (<http://https://www.facebook.com/groups/statins/>) reporting devastating even fatal reactions after taking a statin...to little avail. Cleveland Clinic Cardiologist Leslie Cho told CBN News she worries stories like these might discourage overall statin use. Dr. Cho goes even further by saying not only should patients who have been prescribed statins stick with the drug, but that more people should start taking one. While proponents of cholesterol-lowering statins say scientific evidence proves the drugs save lives, there are others within the medical community who say that research is deeply flawed. In his book, *"Overdosed America,"* Dr. David Abramson claims drug companies pay for the studies. He says a key facet to the drug companies' dissemination of information is their control of the original data. He says they oversee who is chose to participate in the study, who is dropped from the study, the way questions are asked and more. Perhaps most significant, according to Abramson, is that drug companies keep the raw data secret and release to the public only the information they obtained that make their product look good. In short, Dr. Abramson says the medical community is being scammed. To fix the problem, Abramson is calling for transparency in pharmaceutical companies' research. That would mean unbiased outside experts must analyze all of the raw data and draw their own conclusions before the drug companies are allowed to publish their research. An obviously expensive prospect, Abramson suggests paying for it by taxing the billions of dollars drug manufacturers spend on marketing. In addition to overseeing all of the raw data from pharmaceutical research, Abramson says the public should also know whether there is an all-natural solution to medical problems that are just as effective as the drugs being studied. Therefore, he says congress should mandate that the FDA add a "lifestyle arm" to all drug research to determine the results of behavior modifications compared to taking a drug. Finally, Abramson said drug companies aren't properly disclosing the high volume of patients who show no benefit from taking a statin. He says out of 83 users, statins only prevent one cardiovascular death, while the other 82 show no benefit from the drugs. Furthermore, he said out of 23 users, only one avoids a non-fatal cardiovascular event, while the other 22 show no benefit from the drugs. When it comes to preventing heart disease, the focus tends to be on lowering LDL, or "bad cholesterol." However, an increasing number of physicians say there are more important things to look at. Cardiologist Patrick Fratellone (<http://www.fratellonemedical.com/>) is one of them. Dr. Fratellone is one of a growing number of healthcare providers who say a more important heart disease risk factor than high LDL cholesterol is high triglycerides, combined with low HDL, or "good cholesterol." These two measurements are part of a typical blood lipid profile, but are often overlooked. Dr. Fratellone says triglyceride levels should be less than 150. He says lowering triglycerides and raising HDL or "good cholesterol" can be done by eating healthier. So while most doctors agree statins are helpful for some patients, with all these questions, you should feel free to talk to your doctor about whether one is right for you.

CBN News Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: New research shows people who consume lots of sugar are more than twice as likely to die from heart disease. Doctors say sugar feeds cancer and Alzheimer's. Then there's sugar's link to diabetes-and the list goes on. That's why making giving up sugar your New Year's Resolution, to include artificial sweeteners, could be the best thing you could do for your health in 2018. When we think of addiction, we tend to focus on drugs and alcohol. But more doctors now say sugar addiction is often overlooked as the destructive and deadly force it actually is. One of those physicians is sugar addiction specialist Dr. Vincent Pedre (<http://pedremd.com/>), Medical Director of Pedre Integrative Health and President of Dr. Pedre Wellness, based in New York, City. Dr. Pedre says sugar includes all sweeteners such as high fructose corn syrup and natural ones like agave. He also points out that to your body, refined carbohydrates are sugars, too. An estimated three-fourths of Americans are addicted to sugar and don't know it. But food manufacturers do. They add sugar to nearly everything, even foods that may not seem sweet, such as crackers, bread, yogurt, pasta sauce and more. This keeps customers coming back for more. There are nearly 60 different names for sugar. Check the list of ingredients. Red flags are any type of syrup and words that end in -ose. Also fruit juice concentrate, fruit juice, molasses, turbinado, maltodextrin, evaporated cane juice, caramel and honey. Most people might be shocked to learn that they consume 100 times more sugar than their ancestors did back in the 1800s. Dr. Pedre says most patients are also unaware that their sugar overload is at the root of their nagging health issues, and that when people give up sugar, these issues disappear. Scientists who tested lab animals discovered sugar is even more addictive than some illicit drugs. He says people who are addicted to sugar can never be satisfied with just a taste. Dr. Pedre points out that alcoholics shouldn't have even one drink and drug addicts should avoid even just one hit. Therefore by extension, sugar addicts shouldn't have even a little. That's why he recommends giving up all sweets. After a number of days, it varies from person to person, the sugar addict generally stops craving it. In the meantime, he says power-through temptation, armed with the knowledge that it's only temporary. Dr. Pedre does offer this safety net: whole fruit. Whole fruit is fruit in its natural form, not fruit juice or fruit products like gummy fruits, dried fruits or fruit rolls. Dr. Pedre says eventually sugar addicts need to avoid the sugar in fruit, but it's an adequate substitute for the more harmful types of sugar. While whole fruit is an acceptable substitute for sugar, Dr. Pedre warns his patients to avoid artificial sweeteners at all costs. Research shows they're actually worse than the real thing. In his book, *"Happy Gut,"* he says artificial sweeteners can harm our immune system by disrupting the bacteria in our digestive tract. Studies show people who regularly consume artificial sweeteners actually gain more weight. Artificial sweeteners, just like sugar, can trigger dangerous insulin resistance. Dr. Pedre says while insulin is a serious condition, it doesn't have to be permanent. He recommends intermittent fasting to help fix the problem. There are many different ways people can fast intermittently. One of the most popular is going without food for a 12 to 16-hour stretch each night. It might not be easy, but giving up sweets in their many forms, including artificial sweeteners, could pay dividends in the long run.

Host Debrena Jackson Gandy interviews Jeff Lilley, President of Seattle's Union Gospel Mission, to discuss homelessness. Seattle is number three in the nation in terms of its homeless population. New York City is number one and Los Angeles is number two. Seattle's homeless population is increasing. The leading causes of homelessness are addictions; mental health; and criminal justice. When an individual comes out of prison they often don't have a network or support to help them get back into a sustainable life. These primary indicators are compounded by high housing costs. The traditional face of homelessness, an older person that's out on the street, is changing rapidly. More young people are on the streets, and more women, and women with children. In some of the homeless encampments in Seattle, about forty-percent are women, so there is a greater vulnerability there with women and children. Seattle's Union Gospel Mission has found that what works more than anything else is walking alongside individuals, hearing their story, coming up with solutions, and being a part of the healing process that brings their life back to a point where they can thrive, re-engage in healthy relationships and get their life back to where it should be.

Bill Russell, Executive Director of Union Gospel Mission, talks about homelessness. We talk about the homeless as if it is one block of people, but there are many subcultures within homelessness such as those experiencing substance abuse, the mentally ill, and the newly homeless who are homeless merely because they cannot access affordable housing. The one thing that everyone has in common who is homeless is they are without a home. We have to look at the whole field of what is causing people to be homeless to specialize solutions around the problem that caused the person to become homeless in the first place. For the recently homeless, perhaps the solution is rapid re-housing. They will retain and use and value that provision very well and be good stewards of that response. For the chronically mentally ill, or the addict on the street, or a person who is a misfit and a rogue in society, they need food. If that meal is presented with love and care, and someone gets to know their name, then that is an avenue to help them be coached and guided out of homelessness and away from trouble. Studies have shown in America the number one reason people come to a Union Gospel Mission or to a homeless outreach is for food, but the highest thing they value is relationship and connection. We need layers of care, and a lot of the base of that care is going to be the local church in their own neighborhood being redemptive toward the homeless in that neighborhood, providing ground, and space, and patience, and help, that is the love of Christ in human form.

Host Pastor D Robinson interviews Sharon Ellis, President and CEO, of Habitat for Humanity of Orange County to discuss the need for affordable housing. Mac Alaniz, Homeowner, of Habitat for Humanity; and Timothy and Cynthia Allen, Program Family Habitat for Humanity Participants, share their experiences in the program. The housing market in Orange County is one of the most expensive in California and across the United States. Habitat for Humanity of Orange County works with families in the very low, low, and moderate income ranges. The opportunity to find homeownership within those ranges in Orange County is extremely limited. Many families are living in circumstances that are incredibly challenging. Finding ways to help those families transition into something they can afford is very important. One of the obstacles many families face is a debt to income ratio that is out of balance. Often families are expending fifty to seventy percent of their income on housing. When this is an issue, the family must determine how they can reduce their debt in order to become a Habitat homeowner. The selection process for families is threefold: a willingness to partner with Habitat for Humanity, the ability to pay, and need. When a family becomes a Habitat homeowner they assume a zero percent mortgage and Habitat commits that their housing costs will not be more than thirty percent of their income. Finance classes are provided to help families understand how this new financial structure can benefit their family and launch the next generation. College bound programs are also available. The goal is to help families out of a level of poverty into a level of stability, not just for this generation but the next generation as well. Habitat for Humanity of Orange County is based on the Gospel of Jesus Christ and is an opportunity to put faith into action. Those who volunteer at Habitat for Humanity of Orange County are giving people with a desire to be of service. The end result is powerful and transformational, not only for the families, but for the volunteers and staff as well.

CBN News Reporter Mark Martin Reports: Imagine not having a Bible in your language. That's a reality for around 2,000 languages across the globe. Now in its 75th year, the world renowned Wycliffe Bible Translators continues its work at reducing that number. One of their newest missions is reaching the deaf. While the numbers are also encouraging, much work still needs to be done. The organization says up to 160 million people need the Bible translated in their languages. One new frontier is the deaf community, and Wycliffe is working with Deaf Bible Society to reach this often overlooked group. The need is great. Deaf Bible Society estimates there are 70 million deaf people worldwide, and less than two percent have interacted with the Bible in a language that they can understand. It doesn't stop there. Of the more than 350 sign languages, Pagan tells CBN News not one has a complete Bible translation – even American Sign Language or ASL. Some may wonder, "Why doesn't the deaf community just read a printed Bible?" Pagan (Chantel Pagan, director of advocacy for Deaf Bible Society) calls sign language the heart language of the deaf. Director of operations Adan Burke talked with us about the importance of this translation effort through interpreter Mistie Suhr. He's encouraged by recent progress, specifically for ASL. Once a translation is complete, the Scripture engagement department steps in. CBN News caught up with Brandon, a Deaf Bible Society employee, who demonstrated the Deaf Bible app. Computer technology is essential to the process. Shawn Collins oversees the software program known as Chameleon. All this helps Wycliffe reach deaf people around the world with the Word of God. CBN News watched field coordinator Severa Trevino make contact with a deaf translation team from Tanzania in East Africa, for the first time. Burke, who was CBN News' tour guide of Deaf Bible Society, agreed that the Holy Spirit ordered that contact right as the crew from CBN News walked by. Deaf Bible Society says so far 30 sign languages have portions of the Bible translated. The organization and Wycliffe hope in the next three years that 100 more will be added to that list. Stuart Thiessen, a consultant for the organization, says deaf people are usually the last people to learn what's happening the world. Wycliffe and Deaf Bible Society are taking God's Word to people from all walks of life and helping to usher in the return of Jesus Christ.

David Wilinski shares his story. Host Vanessa Rose interviews Jim Moyer, Men's Director, of Greater Phoenix Teen Challenge; Teresa Logue, Women's Director, of Home of Hope; and Rick Casto, Director of Christian Life Ranch Center; to discuss substance abuse. Studies show addiction affects 23.5 Million Americans; that's one in ten people over the age of ten. Eighty percent of all offenses that lead to incarceration are due to drug and alcohol addiction. Our society labels some types of addiction as a disease. This classification would lead someone to believe that once you're an addict you're always an addict. This not true. Women who struggle with addiction very often are involved in prostitution. Ninety-eight to Ninety-nine percent of the women who come to the center have experienced sexual abuse, domestic violence, or both. Approximately fifty percent of the women are fighting for custody of their children. Many times, addictions are basically people trying to find their identity. We live in the largest fatherless generation in the history of the world. Teen Challenge is a residential program and Jesus is the recipe for success. Identity in Christ is one of the most crucial components of discipleship. Described as the Jesus Factor, through the work of the Holy Spirit and the teachings of Christ that develop within people that are addicted, they have hope again and a changed heart. Residents build a comradery and friendship based on God's amazing grace, His love, and His forgiveness. The staff love them back to life.

Bill Russell, Executive Director and Co-Founder of LifeChange at Union Gospel Rescue Mission talks about substance abuse. Substance abuse affects one in nine Americans. This includes drinking too much alcohol, addiction to opiates, use of central nervous system drugs such as crack cocaine, cocaine, methamphetamine, or marijuana use. When we talk about substance abuse we are talking about people with a life-controlling issue. Substance abuse has a number of collateral problems associated with it. It's not just a private, personal problem. It negatively affects relationships, including marriages and parenting. Divorce rates are higher among substance abusers. A lot of domestic violence and child abuse, or child neglect, is associated with substance abusing parents. There are numerous parts of our society that are performance based. However, statistically, there is a high relapse rate on twenty-eight day treatment programs. There is also a high relapse rate for those who have gone to AA meetings. Any time you put a person on the clock, or under pressure to perform, you are actually exacerbating the condition of their feeling worthless, not up to it, and needing to escape back to drugs and alcohol. You don't just erase a problem from your life, you have to replace it. Participants share their stories. Union Gospel Mission gives people hope when they've tried everything else and nothing has worked. Hope of transformation. Hope of a life change. When an individual comes into LifeChange, they can expect to go through different levels in LifeChange that builds momentum for that hope and recovery. They start slow and keep building through Bible studies, church services, self-evaluations, work therapy, education, and counseling.

Devotion is something that takes all of your energy and focus on that one thing. As the result of drug addiction, many individuals from impoverished and affluent neighborhoods, experience broken relationships, emotional and physical trauma, sexual abuse, loss of their children, job loss, jail time, homelessness, memory loss, schizophrenia, anxiety, anger, tooth loss, weight loss, Hepatitis C, Aids, and self-mutilation. However, it's never too late. The power of Christ can turn anybody around. Teen Challenge helps everyone, with over 250 locations in the United States and over 1,000 worldwide, helps everyone. It is not a medical program. Teen Challenge is a Biblical discipleship program with the belief that in one step to Christ, if that person will just surrender to Jesus, they can see their life transformed. Their program includes curriculum, Biblical counseling, housing, spiritual training, and vocational training in three phases: induction, training and re-entry.

CBN News Reporter Erik Rosales Reports: From the battlefield to the business world, more and more military veterans are reentering the civilian workforce. But many struggle to successfully make the transition. What are some of the business strategies used to empower and employ veterans? U.S. Army veteran Erick Girard has been looking for full-time work for the past six years since leaving the military. After five years serving our country, the second lieutenant left the military with an honorable discharge after an injury. Since then he's been looking for a career. He says the military taught him discipline, loyalty, and honor. But not self-promotion or self-marketing. Lida Citroen spent 25 years in the corporate arena, helping CEOs of leading edge businesses define their brand, understanding their target marketplace and creating strategies to drive production. Now her books such as *"Your Next Mission, A Personal Branding Guide for The Military to Civilian Transition"* and her blog, *"LIDA 360"* (<http://www.unleashingyourbrand.com/>), are helping veterans realize the importance of creating a powerful personal brand and selling that brand to a potential employer. She adds veterans have to go the extra mile, like creating a resume that's easy to understand. She says veterans need to explain what they did and how those skills relate to the job they're applying for, without using military jargon or abbreviations. Citroen says she believes God led her to help veterans. She says a spiritual awakening took place, of all places during the halftime show of a Denver Bronco's football game on Veterans Day. The team did a tribute to soldiers returning home and what it's like to take off the uniform. Since then she's been running her business to help vets. The same is true for former veteran and military transition advisor Patricia Frame. Frame runs Strategies for Human Resources, out of Washington, D.C. As for that interview, Frame says it's important for vets to talk about success stories from their military experience. Frame adds new veterans can learn about the civilian world by talking to other vets already in the workforce. She adds veterans need to join or start employee resource groups in their area or online. Meanwhile, veteran Erick Girard says he will use another virtue the army taught him, that is to never give up. Another reminder from employment experts, what goes online is never private. Employers often check out social media pages, to get a better understanding of a person's character often before any offer is ever made. Host Pastor D Robinson interviews Jim Palmer, President and CEO, of the Orange County Rescue Mission Village of Hope and retired educator, Barbara Morton, Ph.D., to discuss the challenges facing homeless youth. Homelessness impacts a child in many different ways. Often their parents have had dysfunctional childhoods and do not know how to be good, strong parents. Thus, the child is lacking developmentally, lacking in emotional stability, and is lacking in security. A homeless child is always seeking security. The homeless child attends many more schools than the average child and is often considerably behind their peers. The age levels of homeless children in a grade are varied tremendously. The challenge with helping children in school who are homeless is the fear that surrounds that. The key is to have a great school district to partner with. The Orange County Rescue Mission partners with the Tustin Unified School District who has opened their doors to the children of Village of Hope. While parents are trying to address challenges they must overcome, Concordia University provides a professor and college students, Monday through Friday, to tutor children with their homework after school. The Orange County Rescue Mission Village of Hope is a faith-based emergency and transitional living facility where homeless men, women, and children can come and see their lives transformed and restored through the love of Jesus Christ in a place of peace and beauty. Residents, referred to as "students," are provided a continuum of services from outreach to independent living. Each student is given volunteer work assignments and receives three meals a day. The Hurtt Family Health Clinic provides primary and preventative care services, including chiropractic, vision care, mental health and pediatric services, and dental care at no cost. The Success Center allows students to receive assistance to obtain a job, further their education, or obtain vocational training. The goal is to help students achieve stability and success. Amber, a student, shares her story.

Rhona Mahl, Executive Director & Founder of Braking Cycles, talks about homeless youth. Youth homelessness in Portland is increasing at epidemic proportions. It is no longer hidden but very visible. There is a misconception that youth want to be homeless because they can look edgy and have attitudes. But the truth is, many times they have no other choice. They have been abandoned by their families, or they don't even know who their families are; their parents are incarcerated or on drugs; they are second and third generation homeless; or they are escaping abuse. Youth run to the streets for protection but there are so many dangers out there. They're looking for a place to belong and the streets offer a place for them to belong. They find themselves surrounded by a community, a street family; the gangs, the pimps, the drug lords that embrace them and want them to be a part of their system. They're given a false identity, and the longer they are in that identity the more their true identity is stolen from them. These young people are injured, deeply injured. They are just kids that are just crying out for love. When we talk about homeless people it is not the lack or abundance of homes, it's the lack of human connection. Braking Cycles Coffee and Bike Shop, is used as a tool to reach our youth and as a platform to share the truths about youth homelessness. Transitional Youth is a faith-based non-profit serving homeless and at-risk youth with an outreach in downtown Portland, serving meals and providing clothing. They also have a house in Beaverton and Vancouver, and a working horse ranch in Yacolt, Washington. Transitional Youth is an avenue for young folks to change the direction of their life. Jesus is the answer. Their identity is in Christ.

Michael Ishmael, Regional Director, of Operation Christmas Child talks about Operation Christmas Child, a ministry of Samaritan's Purse. Mariya Snizhko, a volunteer, shares her story. Operation Christmas Child is another venue to reach the children of the world with the Gospel message. It was a natural fit with their disaster relief programs. As they went in with disaster vehicles and supplies for those who were in need, hurting, and needy, a lot of times the children are forgotten in that process, so the shoe box ministry allowed these children to know that they were not forgotten in that process. Operation Christmas Child has local partners who are working in their community to reach out through events in the language and the cultural context that these children will be able to understand and receive. A lot of these children have been affected by war, natural disaster, poverty, and many of them live in orphanages or group homes. These shoe boxes bring a smile to their face. That shoe box is a representation of Christ's love for them. It's a simple, easy way for people to be involved to share that they are not forgotten and that there is a God that loves them. Many of those shoe boxes give hope in a very dark situation. Time and time again, children open a box and it's the exact thing that they personally need or have been praying for. So when somebody drops off a shoe box at a drop off location the third week in November, that shoe box gets loaded on a truck and goes to one of eight processing centers around the U.S. Then it goes to a port, then into the receiving country, where a local team of volunteers have been prayerfully preparing to receive those boxes and have a strategy on how to distribute those boxes to pastors and teachers in their country. These shoe boxes go into the hands of pastors and leaders around the world who desire to reach out into the community. Most of these boxes are delivered overseas because very few places in the United States lack the social infrastructure or have the experiences that most of these children who are receiving these boxes have had. However, there are a number of boxes that are delivered in the United States. The items that go into the boxes are provided by local individuals and churches, community groups, and civic organizations in the community.

Host Birga Alden interviews Mary LeQuieu, Executive Director, of Care Net Pregnancy Centers of Albuquerque to discuss teen pregnancy. Restraints have been put on pregnancy centers for advertising their services. Outside their centers, they have to have information which tells people where to go to get government funded abortions. At Care Net, they tell people that that is a legal option, but their approach is that before you make any kind of decision, you need to know what those options look like and what the risks associated look like. Approximately seventy percent of all people seeking an abortion are attending church fairly regularly. About nine percent of the women in a recent study who have had abortions said that the church actually provided for paying for their abortion and encouraged them to have an abortion. Parents love their teenagers, but they don't trust God enough to deal with this situation. When fear enters in and takes over they're looking for a way out. Even if they are strongly pro-life, strongly evangelical, there is a great temptation to sort of salvage the situation, and abortion seems like the easy way out. If pastors are going to ignore it from the pulpit, if youth pastors are not willing to talk about sexual integrity to their teenagers, we will continue to have this problem. Care Net Pregnancy Centers are located in Albuquerque, Rio Rancho, Los Lunas, and Moriarty. Their state of the art medical mobile units offer support at campuses and events, taking services where they are needed and bringing medical services to communities throughout New Mexico. Their life skills training program, called "Earn While You Learn," engages fathers and teaches both parents to overcome the obstacles in their lives. Care Net helps teenagers in every way possible. They do an assessment of their needs to identify their issues, then help them find solutions to those issues. They do a lot to help teenagers delay sexual activity but choose life. There are six training courses each year for new volunteers.

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
