In ascertaining the public affairs needs of the WXPB listening community, the management and programming staff of WXPB assesses and reviews the essential issues and topics of importance to the University City and West Philadelphia neighborhoods, along with the University of Pennsylvania community and the overall listening audience. Among the issues addressed by WXPB News Director Bob Bumbera: A story on how Philadelphia's Fairmount Park could soon become home to the proposed "Stables at the Cliffs", a long-awaited home for Philly's urban cowboys, which was brought to light through the Netflix show Concrete Cowboys; Recognizing the 34th National Coming Out Day-An annual LGBT awareness day supporting lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people; The observation of Climate Week at Penn, organized by the Univ. of Pennsylvania's Environmental Innovations Initiative; And the creation of a new music project called "A Philly Special Christmas" -A 7 song holiday LP that will come out on December 23 with proceeds being donated to the Children's Crisis Treatment Center in Philadelphia; And the inauguration of the Univ. of Pennsylvania's 9th President Liz McGill! Those consulted during this quarter included WXPB G.M. Roger LaMay, Program Director Bruce Warren, Assistant Program Director Mike Vasilkos, and WXPB Morning Show host Kristen Kurtis. Resources from the University of Pennsylvania's Office and Community Relations and Center for Community Partnership were also utilized for ideas on programming dealing with community issues. The center is has designed a guide to help build effective partnerships between the

Penn community and the West Philadelphia and University City neighborhoods.. This relationship helps devise community service programs for Penn students and stimulates new and creative initiative linking the Univ. of Penn to its direct neighborhood community. This quarter WXPB continued to broadcast Live from the Kelly Writers' House. Shows included local, Philadelphia poets and musical guests, & University of Pennsylvania students. WXPB also featured a number of ongoing programs addressing a variety of issues including ones focussing on the LGBTQ community (Qzine, Out Music & Amazon Country) & Kids Corner- the only nightly radio show focussing solely on kids and their specific issues. WXPB continues to work diligently is serving the radio station's diverse audiences with insightful, and provocative programming that compliments the music.

Oct. 4, 2022

Philadelphia's Fairmount Park could soon become home to the proposed "Stables at the Cliffs", a long-awaited home for Philly's urban cowboys. Brought to light to many through the Netflix show Concrete Cowboys last year, Philadelphia's tradition of horseback riding goes back hundreds of years, as riders migrated to the city from the South and brought their horses and riding skills along with them. Yet, today's riders have had to make do w/ makeshift stables at Strawberry mansion, in North Philly, the original stables were torn down in 2008. Well, Several riding organizations such as the Fletcher Street Urban Riding Club and the Philadelphia Urban Riding Academy have been trying to raise money to help pay for the construction of the new, East Fairmount Stables, & they are hoping to get more funding from City Council District 5. The project ordinance needs a public hearing before being adopted and before any structures can be built for the stables. October 11, 2022

Today is the 34th National Coming Out Day! An annual LGBT awareness day observed on October 11, to support lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people. The day was first celebrated in the United States in 1988, and October 11th was chosen because it is the anniversary of the 1987 National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights.^[1] Honoring the bravery of LGBTQ+ individuals who decide to come out and live openly & for nearly 50 years, XPN has been home to programming for the LGBTQ community! Sunday nights at 11pm Debra D'Alessandro hosts Amazon Country followed by OUTsounds with Robert Drake, & You can Learn more about those shows @ our website XPN.org

Climate Week at Penn, is underway @ the University of Pennsylvania . Organized by the Environmental Innovations Initiative , the week is designed to highlight & promote the wide range of environmental research, education, and outreach across Penn, which recently launched the Energy and Sustainability Initiative. This year's Climate Week features more than 2 dozen events that spotlight the campus commitment to promoting sustainability and combatting climate change. Since 2009 the University has reduced carbon emissions on campus by close to 40% and has committed to a fully carbon-neutral campus within the next twenty years. Penn's Office of Investments is also working to achieve net zero emissions across the the University

endowment by 2050, but Penn has already ceased making commitments to new private investments in oil and gas production. More info can be found @ climateweek.provost.upenn.edu

October 20, 2022

Kristen, the Philadelphia Eagles are OFF in their bye-week, but a number of players have still been very active off the field, specifically with a new music project! Jason Kelce, Lane Johnson, & Jordan Mailata, former player Connor Barwin, and Charlie Hall (of The War on Drugs) have created “A Philly Special Christmas” A 7 song Holiday LP that will come out on December 23rd. W/ proceeds being donated to the Children’s Crisis Treatment Center in Philadelphia. “A Philly Christmas Special” features classic holiday songs including this one! (Audio) That’s Eagle Center Jason Kelce singing the last line of Santa Claus is Coming to Town.....he’s joined by a bunch of other Eagles AND Philly local artists including: Marshall Allen (of Sun Ra Arkestra), Rob Hyman & Eric Bazilian of (The Hooters), Zach Miller (of Dr. Dog), AND from The War on Drugs, Robbie Bennett, Eliza Hardy Jones & Charlies Hall, who is the Producer of “A Philly Christmas Special”. The Executive Producer of teh album is former EaglesConnor Barwin, who says” “It’s amazing to see Philly's music and sports worlds come together to create

something special for the holidays, and donate proceeds to Philadelphia's Children's Crisis Treatment Center's annual toy drive to help bring a little joy to families during the holidays." A Philly Special Christmas will be available for digital pre-order on 10/29 via iTunes and a limited pressing of 1000 copies on vinyl will be available in late November via A Philly Special Christmas' website.

As the temperatures start to drop many families are very anxious as winter approaches with high energy costs and tight fuel supplies. The Department of Energy is projecting sharp price increases for home heating compared to last winter. Some worry whether heating assistance programs will be adequate for struggling families. Last month, Congress added \$1 billion to Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, bringing the total to at least \$4.8 billion. But that level represents a cut from last year, when federal pandemic relief pushed the total energy assistance package past \$8 billion.

Pennsylvania's Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (or LIHEAP) helps families living on low incomes pay their heating bills in the form of a cash grant. Households in immediate danger of being without heat can also qualify for crisis grants. For more info. the LIHEAP hotline at 1-866-857-7095,

October 21 2022

Kristen mentioned earlier, that later today she will be among those attending the inauguration of Penn's new president Liz McGill! McGill is being inaugurated as the University of Pennsylvania's 9th president, the event that will include rock stars, a U.S. Supreme Court justice, & dozens of other academic and political dignitaries. If you remember Kristen's Friday Morning Mix tape with President McGill a few weeks back....she LOVES music..and 2 of her favorite artists, Sheryl Crow and Jeff Tweedy will be performing! And events will include a symposium with U.S. Supreme Court Justice Elena Kagan

It was more than 60 years ago that Anna May Wong became the first Asian American woman to get a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Now she's become a pioneer in a different way. She is the first Asian American to grace U.S. currency. Wong is featured on a set of quarters bearing her face. Four others have been chosen for the same honor. They include author Maya Angelou and Sally Ride, the first American woman in space.

And as IF there wasn't enough happening in Philadelphia this weekend...The 31st annual Philadelphia Film Festival is underway @ a number of different venues in Center City & Old City...Last year's festival was 90% in-person with reduced capacity and masking requirements.

This year, proof of vaccination and masking are not required @ any event, BOTH are strongly recommended by organizers...The Philadelphia Film Festival runs through October 30th and all the information and lineup can be found @ FilmAdelphia.org. One of the films I'm interested in seeing eventually is a movie based in Philadelphia called "Rittenhouse Square" starring Nick Nolte and Dahrón Jones. More than 130 films from over 40 countries, including *Glass Onion: A Knives Out Mystery* (the much-anticipated sequel to 2019's *Knives Out*); *White Noise*, starring Adam Driver and Greta Gerwig.

October 25 2022

A group of student protesters at the University of Pennsylvania has ended a nearly six-week encampment on the Penn Campus after storming Franklin Field Saturday, during halftime of the Penn-Yale football game. The students, who belong to a group called Fossil Free Penn, have been calling on the university to help low-income residents who are being displaced from the neighboring University City Townhomes, further dissociate from fossil fuel companies, and make payments to the city in lieu of taxes. Nineteen people, 17 of them students, were arrested. The University of Pennsylvania issued a statement that read, in part: that The University supports free speech, thought, inquiry, and lawful

assembly. Penn's Guidelines on Open Expression champion these rights while also affirming that University business – such as classes, meetings, games, or speaking events – shall not be infringed upon or disrupted by protests or demonstrations.

The Philadelphia Museum of Art is currently exhibiting a one of a kind collection of works by French painter Henri Matisse. “Matisse in the 1930s” is the result of a 7 year collaboration between two French museums, and the Barnes Foundation, and the Philadelphia Museum of Art is the only US museum to host the exhibit primarily because of Matisse's connection to Philly. In 1930, he traveled to Philadelphia and met with noted art collector Dr. Albert Barnes, (whose collection at the time, was still in his Lower Merion home). Barnes commissioned Matisse to paint a mural in the mansion on Latches Lane, which has become part of the new Barnes Foundation galleries on the Ben Franklin Parkway. The current exhibit @ the Phila. Museum of Art traces how that commission pushed Matisse into a new creative period. “Matisse in the 1930s” will be on display until January 29th in Philly, after which it will head to Paris.

Fiona Apple is continuing her advocacy of the Constitutional right of being a Court Watcher which is a guaranteed right for all Americans. granted by The First

Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, that gives the public and press a right of access to court proceedings, while the Sixth Amendment gives individuals facing criminal charges the right to a public trial. Well, Fiona's observations as an avid and trained "Court Watcher" have helped people jailed pretrial file a civil rights lawsuit. But now her online access has been shut off...She says it's retaliation for her efforts. In a series of recorded video segments, she explains what she's observed in Prince George's County, Maryland, where she's been watching court proceedings since the pandemic forced many of them online. And Fiona Apple also lists what she says are violations of constitutional rights, and a lack of transparency from pretrial services, Court Watching is designed to allow observers to better understand how the justice system operates and enhancing public confidence in the courts

November 1, 2022

By now, every Phillies fan knows : the song "Dancing On My Own" has become the unofficial-anthem of the Phillies playoff run, which resumes tonight w/ game 3 of the World Series @ CBP. Everyone has been getting into the fun, including the Philly band "SnackTime" who who performed a cool, funky version of the song....And now, adding their own interpretation of Dancing on My Own: the Philadelphia Orchestra! (Audio)

That is The Philadelphia Orchestra, led by Music Director Yannick [Nézet-Séguin], (who by the way, was wearing a powder blue, Mike Schmidt Phillies Jersey, while directing the musicians, in their version of “Dancing on My Own”...& Kristen, I’ll share the video of it (shortly) on our Twitter @XPN MorningShow

By the way I saw a Tweet from Mt. Joy (the band) that if & when the Phillies win the World Series , they’ll do their own cover of the song.

And finally, a story to remember when you’re outside, taking in nature. (As Kristen and I BOTH love to do) Being around birds will make you feel better! According to a new study, just seeing or hearing Birds , provides a boost to mental well-being, ...and that jolt of mental goodness can last up to 8 hours! Researchers @ King’s College in London used a phone app called Urban Mind, in their study. Participants were asked three times a day whether they could see or hear birds, and afterwards they responded to questions about their mental wellbeing. As a result of their findings, the researchers say “There is growing evidence on the mental health benefits of being around nature and we intuitively think that the presence of birdsong and birds help lift our mood,”

This study follows German research which has found that being surrounded by a wide variety of birds can offer increasing life satisfaction: equivalent to \$150 per week of added income.

November 14, 2022

Global climate talks in Egypt are headed into their final week, with plenty of uncertainty left over whether there'll be a substantial deal to combat climate change. Some delegates have been talking about the possibility of a walkout by developing nations unless key demands for more aid to poor countries are met during the talks.

And in related news, actor Rain Wilson (best known for his role as Dwight Shrute (of NBC's "The Office")) has "changed" his name and is inviting others to do the same. He debuted his new name: " Rainfall Heat Wave Rising Sea Levels Wilson" on social media Thursday as a way to raise awareness about the climate control crisis. He called it "a cheap little stunt to help save planet Earth

Philadelphia is preparing for the possible arrival of a bus-full of immigrants from Texas either today or tomorrow. City officials have been informed that there may be a bus with around 52 people seeking asylum, heading to Philadelphia from Del Rio, Texas. Officials say the situation is evolving, but they are working with local partner organizations to care for those who arrive with food, shelter and medical care, if needed. Since the summer Governors from Texas and Florida have been sending migrants up to northern cities like New York City

as a way to protest the Biden administration's immigration policies.

November 18, 2022

Construction of the long-awaited museum dedicated to the works of Philadelphia sculptor Alexander Calder is finally underway. Some 30 years after the idea of a museum was first presented, ground has been broken @ the site along the Ben Franklin Parkway on what will be “Calder Gardens”. The museum is being built across from the Barnes Foundation. The \$70 million project is expected to be completed by late 2024, will feature a number of works by Calder including paintings, monumental sculptures, and his famous “mobiles”.

According to a new report, Music fans are listening to more music than ever before, & music continues to be integral to people's mental and physical wellbeing. The Engaging with Music report by the (International Federation of the Phonographic Industry) shows that music lovers are spending on average 20 hours per week, listening to music: which is up from 18 1/2 hours in 2021. The report collected responses from more than 44,000 people in 22 countries –& found that more than 75% said they enjoyed music in multiple formats, including radio, video, audio streaming, gaming and more. The report also concluded that music continues to be an integral part

of people's wellbeing, with 69% responding that music is important to their mental health and for physical exercise.

November 29, 2022

On this Giving Tuesday on WXPB. The Philadelphia Animal Welfare Society (PAWS) is celebrating its 16th anniversary, and ever since day 1, Melissa Levy has been the organization's Executive Director. Melissa told me that "She could not imagine doing anything else in her professional life, then helping animals in need. (We aired the first part of Bob Bumbera's interview with Melissa) PAWS is dedicated to saving Philadelphia's homeless and at-risk pets, and Melissa says finding all of them a permanent home is made even more challenging since PAWS relies 100% on donations. (Aired second cut of Bob's interview with Melissa) Melissa Levy, the Executive Director of PAWS (The Philadelphia Animal Welfare Society) -which is the city's largest rescue partner dedicated to saving Philly's 'homeless and at-risk pets...and once again, today -Giving Tuesday, For every 3 people who donate, XPN and Subaru will provide a week's worth of food and housing for 1 rescued dog or cat, & of course you can donate @ XPN.org.

December 7, 2022

The deadline for obtaining the Real ID needed to board a domestic flight has been pushed back again, with the Department of Homeland Security citing the lingering impact of the COVID-19 pandemic for the slower-than-expected rollout. The deadline to have a Real ID had been May 3, 2023, but DHS announced Monday that it was pushed back to May 7, 2025. People are getting compliant IDs as they renew driver's licenses, but DHS said the pandemic resulted in backlogs at state driver's license offices. Because of the backlogs, many state agencies that issue driver's licenses automatically extended expiration dates on licenses and ID cards, rather than issuing compliant licenses and cards.

December 7th is National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day & only a few centenarian-survivors of the attack in 1941 are expected to gather at the scene in Hawaii to commemorate those who died. It was 81 years ago the Empire of Japan launched an air raid on the U.S. Navy base at Pearl Harbor, killing 2,403 U.S. service members & personnel, including 68 civilians. The United States declared war against Japan the next day.

December 8, 2022

24-acres of forest grounds in Upper Roxborough (once known as Boy Scout tract) - which were at risk of being sold and developed to raise funds for its owner, the

nonprofit Schuylkill Center for Environmental Education - will be preserved, thanks to an surprise 3 million \$ donation from anonymous benefactors. The donation will allow the Schuylkill Center to preserve the land, through a conservation easement with Natural Lands, a large land trust. The easement will prevent any future owners from developing the forest land. After unsuccessful attempts to receive grants for the protection of the land, the Center announced in June it was seeking buyers for development and construction on the site. Alarm from the forests ' neighbors prompted news coverage which caught the eye of Vanguard Charitable, a national philanthropic fund.

December 9, 2022

Brittney Griner is back on U.S. soil! (A plane carrying the basketball star landed in Texas earlier this morning, after she was released from a Russian jail yesterday. It was part of a prisoner swap for convicted Russian arms dealer Victor Bout, who had been in a U.S. jail for the past 10 years. The White House had been hoping for the release of both Griner and another jailed American, Paul Whelan, who was arrested & convicted of spying in Russia in 2018, and is serving a 16 year prison sentence.

After nearly 66 years, Philadelphia police have identified the "Boy in the Box"- as 4 year old Joseph Augustus Zarelli, who's murdered body was discovered inside a

cardboard box in Fox Chase in 1957. Philadelphia Police Captain Jason Smith say detectives identified the child's father as part of their investigation.

The University of Pennsylvania Libraries has acquired the archives of The Philadelphia Orchestra and the Academy of Music in an agreement that will provide public access to the historical collection. The materials document the early history of both institutions, starting with the Academy of Music's opening in 1857 and The Philadelphia Orchestra's founding in 1900. The archives will become part of the Penn Libraries' Kislak Center for Special Collections, Rare Books and Manuscripts, where they will eventually be made accessible to the public.

February 14, 2022

President Joe Biden has signed gay marriage legislation into law. A crowd of thousands , which included performers Sam Smith and Cindy Lauper, on the South Lawn of the White House to watch the ceremony. Biden said "The law and the love it defends strike a blow against hate in all its forms."

Dave Grohl & Greg Kurstin's Hanukkah Sessions are returning! Last year, they released 8 new cover songs for Hanukkah. Well, this year the two recorded a new session recently @ Club Largo in Los Angeles, that

featured a number of special guests including Beck, Tenacious D, Karen O, Pink, and Greg Kurstin's "Bird And The Bee" bandmate Inara George. The live recordings should be rolling out daily beginning this Sunday, December 18, -which is the first night of Hanukkah.

The Acoustical Society of America is now using 3D-printing technology, to create quality but affordable violins for those who want to play, but can't necessarily afford the instrument! The society's Young Artists Program is using a specially engineered plastic polymer substance that replicates the tonal qualities of a traditionally built violin, which can cost hundreds if not thousands of dollars, putting the instrument out of reach for many. But the 3D violins will cost far less. Violins aren't the first instrument to be 3D-printed: guitars and saxophones have also been created using the technology. Program Summary: A discussion about the new exhibit exploring the life and works of the openly-gay artist Keith Haring, now on display at the *James A. Michener Art Museum* in Doylestown PA. We spoke with its curator, **Joshua Lessard**.

Program Details: Keith Haring: A Radiant Legacy features more than 100 unique and notable works from a private collection, including two rare Subway drawings, complete suites of many of the artist's icon print series and Medusa Head (the largest print in the artist's oeuvre). Keith Haring (1958-1990) was arguably the most accomplished and prominent American artist of the 1980s. Born in Reading, PA, and raised in nearby Kutztown, Haring developed an early love for drawing. Working in a variety of mediums—including paintings, prints, posters, drawings, sculpture, and street art—Haring developed a style that was instantly recognizable. Through his friendship with artists Kenny Scharf and Jean-Michel Basquiat, he became interested in the colorful graffiti art of city streets which would influence his meteoric rise. During his brief ten-year career, Haring rewrote the rulebook for contemporary art, integrating the seemingly discrete arenas of New York City's gritty downtown counterculture and uptown art aristocracy. A friend of Andy Warhol's, Haring unabashedly developed and promoted his own brand through commercial partnerships, mass market products, and even his own storefront. Equally important was his social justice activism, raising awareness of AIDS and fighting against racism and the proliferation of illegal drugs.
