This report of programs and program segments addressing issues of importance and concern in the NewsChannel 5 viewing area includes the following:

- NEWSCHANNEL 5 NEWS** – WTVF produces daily newscasts providing local information of interest to viewers in the Nashville designated market area. The station produces 36 hours of local news each week, not including breaking news, special reports, and severe weather coverage. In-depth reports on subjects such as Crime, Health, Government and Politics, Education and Consumer News are routinely included in the news. WTVF also presents newscast features that heighten viewer awareness of problems and concerns including segments such on crime, education and health. Regularly scheduled newscasts air Monday through Friday, 4:00 to 7:00 AM, 4:00 PM, 5:00 PM, 6:00 to 7:00 PM, and 10:00 PM; and on weekends starting at 5:00 AM, in the early evening, and at 10:00 PM. Also, on a continuing but irregular basis, WTVF may telecast local specials, either produced by WTVF, CBS or syndicated, in all dayparts, addressing subjects of special importance.
- NEWSCHANNEL 5 REPORTS** - WTVF regularly produces major series of one or more parts scheduled in the 6 PM REPORT and 10 PM REPORT. These special features provide in-depth reporting on subjects of importance to the WTVF viewing audience and may focus on such topics as government, crime, consumer news, public health, and other issues of local interest. (See Attachment A.)
- CBS PROGRAMS** - WTVF regularly telecasts 60 MINUTES, 48 HOURS, and FACE THE NATION, and from time to time, CBS specials. These specials take the form of Public Affairs programs or news specials. (See Attachment B.)
- PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS** - WTVF schedules public service announcements for a myriad of community agencies and organizations. Attached is a representative list of PSAs' that aired October 1, 2018, through December 31, 2018. (See Attachment C.)
- NEWSCHANNEL 5+ PROGRAMMING** – WTVF produces and programs a second channel, NewsChannel 5+ which is distributed via cable and over the air on 5.2 to approximately 570,000 households. NewsChannel 5+ provides 24 hours of news and information programming with primarily a local focus. Programming includes shows for niche audiences, including African Americans, Hispanics, LGBT, business, politics, schools, local politics/government, call-in programs to discuss significant local issues in-depth, and rebroadcasts of WTVF programming. NewsChannel 5+ also carries local specials, including government prayer breakfasts, local court proceedings, election coverage, and other events of local interest. Local government officials, law enforcement leaders, and the director of schools are regular guests. This regular interaction with community leaders helps WTVF stay abreast and ascertain those issues of concern to viewers in the Nashville area (See Attachment D).

10/5/18 6:30-7 PM	INSIDE POLITICS (30 minutes)	INSIDE POLITICS: Inside Politics is hosted by veteran political reporter Pat Nolan who sits down with the big newsmakers to get the inside scoop on the decisions that affect us all. Pat's guest was former Tennessee Governor Phil Bredesen who is running as the Democratic nominee in the election to fill retiring Senator Bob Corker's seat. Bredesen is in a tight race with Congresswoman Marsha Blackburn. Many believe the open Tennessee seat is key for which party will control the Senate going forward. Bredesen spent the first part of the show talking about the nomination process of Brett Kavanaugh to the Supreme Court and how he would vote if he was on the Senate. The middle part of the show focused on the campaign itself and how it has differed from past campaigns. Both parties are spending enormous funds on campaign ads, many of them negative. Bredesen also must contend with President Rump and Vice-President Pence who have made fund-raising appearances in Tennessee in support of Blackburn. Finally, in the last segment, Bredesen spoke about recent trade deals and how he feels about the recent tariffs that have been imposed on exports and imports.
10/26/18 6:30-7 PM	INSIDE POLITICS (30 minutes)	INSIDE POLITICS: Inside Politics is hosted by veteran political reporter Pat Nolan who sits down with the big newsmakers to get the inside scoop on the decisions that affect us all. Pat's guest was former two-term Nashville Mayor Karl Dean who is running as the Democratic nominee for Governor of Tennessee. Dean is in a tough race, finding himself behind in many polls to Republican businessman Bill Lee. Dean spoke about the need to help some of the most rural counties of the state who have declining population. He would like to see economic development in those areas and is a proponent for rural broadband. In terms of healthcare, Dean spoke about the need to expand Medicare. He contrasted his views on education with those of his opponent who supports a voucher system to aid private schools. While he agrees we need to do more vocational training in schools, he does not see the need to make it mandatory like Lee does. Dean believes we can bring money into the state by taxing online purchases and adding sports gambling which has now been made legal. Dean will not raise the sales tax on regular purchases, saying Tennessee's sales tax is high enough. Dean believes that Bill Lee may have many conflicts of interest if he is elected Governor because his company has contracts with local governments to do heating, air, electrical and plumbing work.
10/29/18	10 PM News (4:01)	METRO UNRESTIMATES COST OF CONTROVERSIAL TAX INCENTIVE: Metro council members are raising questions about the true cost of a controversial tax incentive program known as tax increment financing (TIF). It follows a NewsChannel 5 investigation that reveals the city has likely underestimated the total cost of the program for a second straight year. Last year the city was forced to withdraw money directly from Metro School's budget -- without warning -- to cover the cost of the program. Tax increment financing has helped fuel Nashville's booming growth, but it has received increased scrutiny from council members ever since a series of reports by NewsChannel 5 Investigates in 2015. The district's budget problems were made worse because Metro withdrew nearly \$1.5 million from the schools' budget at a critical time last year to cover unexpected costs associated with TIF. 11/6/18 7-10 PM	Election Coverage 2018 (3 Hours)	ELECTION 2018 COVERAGE: 2018 marked the most expensive election in the history of Tennessee as a key United States Senate seat and the Tennessee Governor race were all up for grabs with no incumbents running. More people voted locally than in the 2016 Presidential election. Our coverage was anchored by Rhori Johnston and Carrie Sharp along with long-term political analyst Pat Nolan. NewsChannel 5 had reporters all over the area at campaign headquarters covering the key races and candidates. Reporter Jason Lamb was with Representative Marsha Blackburn who was running as the Republican candidate for Senate. Reporter Chris Conte covered former Tennessee Governor Phil Bredesen who was running as the Democratic candidate for Senate. This race was particularly vicious as both parties saw Tennessee as a swing state for control of the Senate. Reporter/anchor Emily Luxen was with businessman Bill Lee, the Republican candidate for Governor. Finally, Matthew Torres covered his opponent Karl Dean, a former mayor of Nashville running as the Democratic candidate. As the night wore on, both Republicans – Blackburn and Lee won their respective races. WTVF carried victory and concession speeches for all four candidates. In addition, reporter Kyle Horan kept tabs on voter turnout and how long the wait times were at polling places. Reporter Alexandra Koehn was in Montgomery County covering a key ballot initiative where the city of Clarksville would merge governments with Montgomery County. There were also mayoral races in key cities in our coverage area. Reporter Brandon Marshall focused tabs on a ballot amendment in Davidson County: The city is looking to create a Police Oversight Board which would be made up of eleven citizens. This is in response to several local police shootings of African Americans. CBS had coverage from 7-10 PM but WTVF broke in several different times for local updates. We also carried sustaining local coverage from 7-9 PM on NewsChannel 5 Plus. Throughout the evening, we ran election return graphics on WTVF over CBS coverage. Then, during the 10 PM newscast, we wrapped it all up with the final vote totals.

10/25/18	10 PM News (5:44)	WAS AN INNOCENT MAN SENT TO PRISON? - William Arnold was sentenced to 25 years in prison but claims he did not molest a 10-year-old young boy that he was mentoring through the Big Brothers program. His conviction may be a case of mistaken identity. A noted forensic psychologist who specializes in sex abuse cases agrees with Arnold. It turns out there was another 17-year-old William who was in the boy's life at the time. Apparently, there was a rush to justice and nobody stopped to consider the second William. 11/2/18	6 PM News (4:16)	CATHOLIC DIOCESE RELEASES NAMES OF PRIESTS - The Catholic Diocese of Nashville is confronting a dark chapter of its past. The Diocese released the names of priests accused of sexually abusing children some dating back to the 1950s. Investigative reporter Ben Hall looked at this list and talked with the leader of the diocese who ordered its release. The Diocese named 13 priests - none of whom are currently practicing. This action comes as other states are investigating whether church leaders covered up abuse. Participants included J. 11/5/18	5 PM News (2:43)	CRITICS WANT OUTSIDE INVESTIGATION OF DIOCESE - Critics inside and outside the Catholic Church in Nashville are calling for an independent investigation of the Diocese. It comes after the Diocese released the names of 13 former priests who were credibly accused of sexually abusing minors. Some people are questioning if the list is complete, saying that the Diocese is not competent to investigate itself. A group that tracks abuse by priests sent the Bishop a letter saying at least six other names should be included. Some are questioning whether more names should be added to the list. It was suggested that the Diocese turn over its files to the District Attorney or Attorney General and have a truly independent investigation. 11/5/18	6 PM News (6:31)	<u>TBI RAID</u> -- A West Tennessee couple refused to let two Tennessee Bureau of Investigation agents search their house without a warrant. They say what the agents did next was a crime but the TBI director says it's exactly what agents are trained to do. The U.S. Constitution says people have a right to feel secure in their homes "against unreasonable searches and seizures." It's a right that a local couple had always taken for granted until one afternoon three years ago. That's when the two TBI agents, Mark Reynolds and Jeff Jackson, came to their home, looking for evidence for a case involving an adult son who didn't even live with them. The couple asked the agents for a search warrant, but they did not have one. The agents later forced their way in to the home, saying they believe the homeowner might be getting ready to use a firearm. In the past, its internal investigations have been shrouded in secrecy. Now, following questions raised by NewsChannel 5 Investigates, the new TBI director is promising more transparency. Participants included David Rausch, Director, Tennessee Bureau of Investigation; Deborah Fisher, Executive Director, Tennessee Coalition for Open Government; Christopher Slobogin, law professor, Vanderbilt University.
11/9/18	6 PM News (2:13)	<u>DIOCESE NAMES OF NEW PRIESTS ACCUSED OF ABUSE</u> - The Diocese of Nashville has published new names of former priests accused of sexually abusing children. Just last week it named 13 former priests accused of abuse. The new names were released as critics continued calls for an outside investigation. Participants included David Brown, Abuse Survivor; J. Mark Spalding - Bishop of Nashville Diocese.
11/12/18	5 PM News (2:04)	<u>TBI DIRECTOR REGRET</u> -- For the first time, the director of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation is expressing regret over his involvement in a rape investigation of two University of Tennessee football players when he was the police chief in Knoxville. David Rausch placed so-called "courtesy calls" to Coach Butch Jones, tipping off the suspects before his detectives ever had a chance to speak with them. It marks his first comments following a trial where the two ex-players, A.J. Johnson and Michael Williams, were acquitted of all charges. Four and a half months after being sworn in as the TBI director, the former Knoxville police chief repeated his insistence that the "courtesy calls" were the way things had always been done. 11/12/18	6 PM News (3:05)	<u>TBI POLICY CHANGES-</u> Tennessee's new top cop says he is revamping hiring processes and placing stricter controls over the use of agency aircraft as he attempts to restore the image of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation. It follows an on-going NewsChannel 5 investigation of who investigates the investigators. Our investigations also revealed how hiring inside the TBI was marked by favoritism and how the agency's aircraft had been used for the director's convenience. The new director wants to restore the public's trust in the agency which was also mired in a sex scandal by the former director. 11/12/18	10 PM News (3:02)	<u>KIRBY WALLACE ON THE RUN_</u> Nick Beres examined how an accused cop killer, Kirby Wallace, managed to stay on the run after eluding police for nearly two weeks during a massive manhunt. Wallace has now shared some of his secrets since his capture. He says he remained on the move, but only at night, sleeping during the day. Stewart County Sheriff Frankie Gray says Wallace often awoke to find search teams passing just feet from where he was hiding. Wallace also spotted trail cameras and knew he was caught on video in the woods. He figured authorities would check. So, he'd intentionally walk one direction on camera. Then he'd double back undercover, going the other way to lead officers in the wrong direction. He also made a point of staying close to any deer. When they were spooked, he knew someone was coming and hid. Authorities did an exhaustive ground search and also looked from the air. Wallace also had a camouflage netting. He'd hear the chopper and hide under the netting in the brush. For much of the time, Wallace survived on little more than creek water and acorns, though police do think he may have had a stash of food, clothing and weapons hidden somewhere in the woods. It is worth noting that Wallace stole two cars during his time on the run and he had ample opportunity to simply drive somewhere far away. For whatever reason, he chose to stay put in the Indian Mound area of Stewart County and it was just a matter of time until he was caught. 10/1/18-12/28/18	5 PM News (2:30 average)	<u>CONSUMER NEWS:</u> During the 5 PM Newscast, we air a Consumer Reports story alerting viewers to the latest local and national consumer information on scams, recalls and product testing.
10/31/18	6 PM News (2:55)	<u>POOR INSPECTIONS</u> - A recent audit says the state is not doing enough to ensure safety on elevators and carnival rides. Both elevators and thrill rides are regulated by Tennessee's Department of Labor and Workforce Development. They're supposed to be inspected and permitted by the state before you can ride them, but according to a new audit by the State Comptroller's Office, there have been a lot of rides operating without the proper permits. State auditors found in the last four years, more than half of all first-time permits were issued after the rides had already been in use. Auditors found about half of these inspections are late, on average about two months. Elevators are not supposed to get a permit to operate until all problems have been fixed. State auditors found quite a few permits have been issued before the owners provided proof that the code violations had been taken care of. In some cases, the state apparently took the owners' word that the repairs had been made, never requiring a receipt or completed work order or even a follow-up inspection. Managers at the Department of Labor and Workforce Development said a lot of the issues were because they needed more employees.

11/1/18	10 PM News (3:26)	HEMP: TENNESSEE'S NEXT BIG CASH CROP – Many of the growing number of hemp farmers in Tennessee believe it is on the verge of becoming the state's next big cash crop. Demand for hemp stems from the growing use of CBD oil produced by the crop which is helpful in everything from seizures to anxiety and pain relief. CBD-producing hemp can sell for up to \$50,000 an acre. Participants included Clint Palmer expert on Tennessee cash crops.

11/13/18	6 PM News (2:01)	SCHOOL BOARD POLICY CHANGES - For months, Metro schools have been engulfed in controversy over how the district has spent taxpayer Money. Now, the Metro School Board appears ready to enact reforms to reassure taxpayers that they're watching, including appointing internal auditors and increasing board scrutiny of contracts. This follows an on-going NewsChannel 5 investigation that raised questions about millions of dollars spent without following the district's own purchasing policies and about contracts awarded without the school board's knowledge. 11/19/18	6 PM News (3:54)	DRIFTING WEED KILLER - Some farmers are claiming a controversial weed killer – Dicamba - is forcing them out of business. But just last month the EPA approved its use for another two years - with some new restrictions. It follows lawsuits and investigations here in Tennessee and across the country involving Dicamba. The problem is if neighboring farms are using the product, it can drift onto adjacent farms. The Tennessee Department of Agriculture received 135 complaints about Dicamba damage last year, which they say is a large number. 11/20/18	6 PM News (3:05)	DRIFTING WEED KILLER THREATENS ICONIC TREES - Is a controversial weed killer used by farmers threatening 200-year-old trees? The iconic cypress trees growing in the middle of Reelfoot Lake are being damaged. The shallow lake in Northwest Tennessee was created by an earthquake in 1812. Tourists have been fascinated by the 200-year-old cypress trees that now grow in water. A local hotel owner says they may be lost for good if something isn't done. He told state officials a weed killer called Dicamba, that farmers spray on fields all around the lake, often drifts over the water. 11/5/18 10 PM-2 AM	Severe Weather Coverage (240 Minutes)	SEVERE WEATHER COVERAGE: On the eve of Election Day, a deadly EF-2 tornado struck the Nashville DMA killing one woman in Rutherford County and injuring others. Heavy rain and damaging winds began to sweep through our coverage area around 8 PM and continuing into Tuesday morning. NewsChannel 5 began sustaining coverage during the height of the storm beginning with our 10 PM News through 2 AM. During that time, the National Weather Service issued tornado watches for most of the mid-state. The National Weather Service confirmed that a total of seven tornadoes hit the area. In addition to Rutherford County, tornadoes were confirmed in Cannon, Franklin, Dekalb, White, Lawrence and Wayne counties. A tornado, with winds of 135 miles per hour struck the neighborhood where the woman died when her home collapsed. This was the first fatality from a November tornado in our DMA since 2002. Two other women were injured when their mobile home rolled over.

10/23/18 6:30 PM	HOOKED: TENNESSEE'S OPIOID CRISIS (30 Minutes)	This local special produced by NewsChannel 5 reporters Matthew Torres and Chris Conte looked at the state's growing problem with opioid addiction. There were 1268 opioid overdose death in Tennessee last year. 115 people per day die every day in America due to opioid abuse – every three weeks, the same amount of people die from opioids as those who died during the September 11 th attacks. The first portion looked at reasons for the rise in opioid abuse which affects all segments and demographics of society. Doctors rarely prescribed opioid treatment in the 1980's and 90's but prescriptions skyrocketed after 2001. In 2015, enough opioids were prescribed to keep every American medicated around the clock for 3 weeks. The state is fighting back as some insurance companies will no longer pay for these kinds of pills and doctors are limited on how many days they can prescribe for. The state created a 30-million-dollar TN Together plan that is focused on prevention, treatment and law enforcement. The section portion looked at Fentanyl, the main cause in a 70% spike in opioid deaths over 2016. The portion of the special also looked at how opioid abuse is affecting normal EMS services in the state. EMS personnel use Narcan to counteract the effects of Fentanyl but the cost has tripled in the past 10 years. the surge of additions. Fentanyl used to primarily come from China but now the Mexican drug cartels are distributing the drug which has caused extra strain on the TBI and other law enforcement agencies to combat it. The third section focused on the decrease in pain centers in Tennessee. There were 350 pain management centers in Tennessee in 2015 – there are less than half that now. The centers have closed due to stricter regulations and fear of legal consequences. As clinics have closed, this leaves patients with few options, especially depending on their insurance coverage. Finally, the special looked at the toll opioid abuse has taken on survivors who have lost love ones due to overdoses. There are now more than a million kids in America now living with grandparents due to parental addiction to opioids. 11/15/18	6 PM News (5:31)	FARMER SUICIDES - Across the United States farmers are being continually forced out of a profession that has often been in their family for decades. This is forcing some to feel like they have no other choice but to take their own lives. A staggering number of U.S. farmers have committed suicide over the last few years including some in Tennessee and Kentucky. According to data from the the University of Kentucky's violent death reporting system, in the last five years alone, 98 farmers have committed suicide in the Blue Grass State. The cause is often complicated. Many experts blame the rising costs of keeping farms operational coupled with the low cost farmers often get for products like soybeans, corn and milk when they go to sell. 10/06/18 **48 HOURS: “Hollywood Horror Story”** – a report on the brutal murder of Iana Kasian, a woman killed by a perpetrator who left the crime scene like something out of a graphic novel. Kasian, a tax attorney, in what seemed like a charmed life, immigrated to the United States to be a translator. While living in California, she met Blake Leibel, the son of a wealthy Canadian real estate family. He lived a complicated life but longed to make it big in the Hollywood film industry. Almost a year before he met Kasian he was obsessed with the notion that his family would be harmed by someone tied to his brother Cody, who had big gambling debts. At the time Kasian was killed, Leibel was divorcing his wife, living with Kasian and his newborn daughter Diana. He was also romantically involved with another woman. Kasian’s mother, Olga Kasian, became concerned when she could not reach her daughter. She called the police, who eventually gained access to the home she shared with Leibel -- authorities were shocked by what they found. Leibel was barricaded inside a bedroom and Kasian was discovered dead in the bathroom. Her body covered with a blanket, she was extremely pale, and she was scalped. It was a horrible, sadistic killing, just like a scene in one of Leibel’s movies. Police arrested Leibel. Investigation led to the discovery that Kasian’s body was drained of blood. It took 6-8 hours for her to die. Leibel stood trial and the scenes from his graphic novel and the film he directed took center stage. He was found guilty of first-degree murder without parole. **On-screen text graphic:** Olga has filed a wrongful death lawsuit against Blake Leibel. Any proceeds would go to Diana. Diana is an American citizen. Olga is still hoping to raise her in the United States. 48 HOURS: “Dead Ringer” - a report about former pro boxer Ramon Sosa, the potential victim in a murder-for-hire scheme, who with the help of law enforcement agents, managed to survive -- all the while setting up a sting operation to catch those responsible. Sosa owned the popular Woodlands Boxing and Fitness in Montgomery County, Texas. He had a family and a beautiful second wife who helped him run their booming business. After six years together, things began to sour between Sosa and his wife -- he learned of a divorce attorney and missing money from the business. And then someone wanted him dead. A friend of Sosa's named Mundo, who worked out at the gym, overheard Sosa's wife Lulu and was sure she had murder on her mind. They came up with a sting operation to protect the boxer, in which Mundo posed as a hit man. When they had evidence, they contacted the police, who then took over the case. Mundo still played along, agreeing to kill Sosa, and provided photographic proof of the death. Police staged the death scene, with Sosa's "dead body" photographed in a ditch with a bullet hole in the head. Lulu Sosa was arrested, and claimed she was innocent. She was charged with solicitation of capital murder. After 15 months, she gave up the fight and agreed to a plea deal to reduced charges and twenty years in prison. **On-screen text graphic:** Lulu Sosa comes up for parole once a year. 48 HOURS: “The Fitbit Alibi” (9:00 – 10:00p) – a report on the groundbreaking 2016 murder case of Nicole Vander Heyden that was solved using 21st century technology. Vander Heyden went out with her live-in boyfriend Doug Detrie and other friends for a night on the town in Green Bay, Wisconsin and never made it home. A day later, she was found beaten and strangled in a field. Her live-in boyfriend became the prime suspect and was arrested because he had separated from the group during the barhopping and went home without Nicole. Detrie was wearing a Fitbit device and the data recorded during the time of Vander Heyden's murder corroborated with what Detrie had told police, therefore clearing him of suspicion. He was released 18 days after his arrest. Over the next several months, clothes and other items found at the murder scene were processed by the police for DNA, which led police to George Steven Burch, a man who had moved from Virginia to Green Bay for a fresh start. Burch was questioned about a hit-and-run and had handed over his cell phone to police. The phone was an Android device with a Google account, which stores and tracks a person's exact location within Google's servers and is viewed with a tool called Google Dashboard. Investigators got a warrant to view Burch's account and discovered that on the night of the murder, the data tracked him to Nicole's house – the crime scene – where he stayed for nearly an hour. He was arrested and charged with first-degree intentional homicide. On February 19, 2018, George Burch went on trial for Nicole's murder. The technology evidence from Fitbit and Google played an important part of the proceedings. Also, in the courtroom, the sister and fiancé of Joey White, a man Burch killed in Virginia twenty years ago. Neither is surprised that Burch is on trial again. Only this time, they hope he is found guilty, and is not acquitted. It took the jury three hours to find Burch guilty. **On-screen text graphic:** Doug Detrie continues to raise Dylan, now two. George Burch will be sentenced on May 4, 2018. He faces life in prison. 10/20/18 **48 HOURS: “Cold-Blooded Killer” (10:00 - 11:00p)** – a report about Mike Williams, a missing Florida man who was believed to have been eaten by alligators in December 2000, and his mother’s belief that something sinister happened. Williams, a successful real estate appraiser, left home to go duck hunting on Lake Seminole on his sixth wedding anniversary. When he did not return home, his wife Denise started looking for him. A massive search ensued. It ended after 44 days with Williams listed as “still missing.” People wondered if he had run off. After six months, his waders, hunting license and a flashlight were discovered at the lake and another explanation was offered: he was eaten by alligators. Mike’s mother, Cheryl Williams, always believed there was more to the story. For nine years, she wrote to the governor of Florida urging him to re-open the case. She even contacted wildlife experts, who told her that alligators do not feed in cold winter months. In the meantime, Denise Williams moved on with her life, cashed in life insurance policies and completely cut off contact with Mike’s mother. She eventually married Mike’s best friend Brian Winchester. Seven years later, the re-opened investigation led to suspicions that both Cheryl and Brian were involved, but police could do nothing because they were married to each other. Soon after, their marriage disintegrated. Police saw an opportunity when Brian cracked after assaulting and kidnapping Denise, to which he pleaded guilty and cut a deal with prosecutors: he finally admitted to killing Mike Williams. Brian revealed the location of the body, with the understanding he that would not be charged with murder. He said it was all Denise’s idea -- she was not willing to be divorced but wanted to be with Brian. She was arrested and charged with murder and is currently awaiting trial. **On-screen text graphic:** Denise Williams is scheduled to stand trial for the murder of her husband on December 10, 2018. Mike and Denise's daughter is nineteen and in college. She is said to be close with Denise's sisters. Jacob sought out Moataz Azzeh to eliminate the problems. Azzeh initially took the job but disappeared with Jacob’s money. Jacob turned to a local bail bondsman, who was looking for Azzeh himself, and he called the Houston Police. Azzeh eventually went on to help undercover agents with the case, which included staging the deaths of the intended targets, McDaniel’s ex-husband Marion “Mack” McDaniel and Meghan Verikas. During the sting operation, which included the use of bodycam footage, the couple was arrested. Included are excerpts of the bodycam footage, and of a recorded diary McDaniel started after being released on bail. She took her own life sixteen days later. Leon Jacob has pleaded not guilty. Original on-screen text graphic: Valerie’s daughter inherited her estate and now lives with her father, Mack McDaniel. “Taz” Azzeh, the “Hit Man” accepted a plea deal in his theft case and is currently on probation. He hopes to become a Houston Police Officer. **UPDATE for the 11/17/18 updated rebroadcast:** In 2018, Leon Jacob stood trial. He claimed to only be a womanizer. Both of his intended targets Meghan Verikas and Marion “Mack” McDaniel testified otherwise. Jacob’s own words came back to haunt him, and he was found guilty on all counts. His sentence: life in prison on each count, solicitation of capital murder for Meghan Verikas and Mack McDaniel. **On-screen text graphic for the 11/17/18 updated rebroadcast:** Leon Jacob will be eligible for parole in the year 2047. He will be 69 years old. His family and friends turned to social media sites like Instagram and Facebook to locate him. The search led to Larry Dilione, who had been with Comunale at the Grand Sutton apartment of James Rackover, an aspiring model and the surrogate son of Jeffrey Rackover, the so-called “Jeweler to the Stars”. Dilione provided information that made no sense to Comunale’s father or his friend Max Branchinelli, who had located Dilione on Instagram. Dilione then provided information about Rackover and Max Gemma, whose father was once the mayor of Oceanport, NJ to the police. The investigation revealed that after the murder, Comunale’s body was dumped out of a window at the Sutton Place address, driven to Oceanport, NJ and left in a hole in the ground in a wooded area behind a florist shop. Rackover and Dilione were charged with the brutal murder of Comunale and other crimes. Max Gemma was charged with hindering prosecution and tampering with physical evidence. After the arrest, police discovered that Rackover, was not really the son of the celebrity jeweler, but an ex-con from Florida named James Beaudin, who Jeffrey Rackover had befriended, explaining that he was the son he never knew about. At trial, both Rackover and Dilione said the other was responsible. The star witness in the case was Louis Ruggiero, the troubled son of popular New York television anchor Rosanna Scotto. Ruggiero, a close friend of Rackover’s, testified about what Rackover told him happened that night, becoming the first witness who directly implicated James Rackover in the crime. On November 2, 2018, the jury reached a verdict: the former James Beaudoin, now James Rackover, was convicted on all counts for the murder. Dilione’s trial is set for January, with Gemma being tried later. **On-screen text graphic:** James Rackover will be sentenced on December 5th. The radio legend was heard by millions around the world as host of “American Top 40” and he was also the voice of Shaggy in the cartoon classic “Scooby Doo”. At the time of his death, his estate was estimated to be worth between \$80- \$100 million. Jean, married to Kasem for 34 years, and the children from his first marriage went to war over the money. Each side accuses the other of hastening his death and both sides have filed wrongful death suits. Jean Kasem claims her husband had cut off the children financially because they were only interested in his money. Kerri Kasem and her siblings blame her father’s death on Jean’s actions, claiming elder abuse. Kasem was diagnosed with Lewy Body Dementia before his death and his condition left him unable to speak during his final months. Jean prevented contact with his children, but they fought to see him, saying they oversaw his health care. Each side accuses the other of neglect. Nothing was ever proven. After Kasem’s death, as the widow, Jean Kasem was in charge of the body, eventually having him buried in Norway in an unmarked grave. **On-screen text graphic:** The Kasem family's wrongful death suit against Jean is scheduled for court next spring. Jean has filed a counter wrongful death suit. The outcome of the case could decide who inherits Casey Kasem's fortune. Casey Kasem's radio show can still be heard in syndication around the world.
