SECTION 1: QUARTERLY PROBLEMS AND ISSUES

1. The Coronavirus: As of the publish date of this document, there is finally positive news to report, after over a full year, 13,931 positive Covid-19 cases and 469 deaths. Now over 70% of residents of Barnstable County are fully vaccinated. The radio stations of CodComm have devoted various broadcasting efforts to inform its listeners where to get vaccinated, the lifting of mask mandates, and tributes to the 469 Cape Codders lost to the pandemic. Our hope is that in future Quarterly Issues reports we will no longer need to list Covid-19 as issue number 1.

2. Breast Cancer: Interviews with The Massachusetts Breast Cancer Coalition that offer programs and information on a solving breast cancer once and for all in Barnstable County.

3. Environment - Wastewater: The precious ecosystem that surrounds Cape Cod is threatened daily. We visit the policies of local governing bodies to identify the most common sources of pollution to our waterways and reservoirs. This is a continuing issue we will be addressing to help find solution locally.

4. Mental Health - Suicide: Thousands of Cape Codders are currently living with dependency, yet nearly two thirds of people suffering never seek treatment. We addressed this subject again this quarter and attempt to increase awareness and seek answers with the help from NAMI.

5. Hunger: There is an ongoing need to feed and provide families across Cape Cod who live paycheck to paycheck, or who are completely out of work options. A local grocery store chain has addressed this need and we broadcast this vital information.

6. Economy – Affordable Housing: The ongoing housing crisis in Barnstable County is tackled this quarter with a discussion about Habitat For Humanity and the local charitable efforts to build affordable housing.

7. Addiction – Recovery: Unfortunately this emergency issue was with us before the Coronavirus and will be with us long after. Codcomm Inc. is committed to continue broadcasting programming that addresses opioid addiction and recovery options.

8. Economy – Tourism: As the Covid-19 Pandemic finally winds down after nearly 15 months of devastation to the local economy, new challenges arise including filling numerous job openings to fulfill the returning tourists to the Cape. We team up with the Cape Cod Chamber of Commerce to rebroadcast their series of podcasts searching for solutions to help local vendors.

FALMOUTH — A free virtual forum about opioids and addiction, which will include discussions with Falmouth's elected representatives, public safety officials and treatment program representatives, will be held from 2 to 6 p.m. Saturday.

The forum's guest speaker is Dr. João Goulão, Portugal's director general of the Service for Intervention on Addictive Behaviors and Dependence. He is considered the architect of Portugal's drug policy where possession of small amounts of illicit drugs is processed as an administrative infraction instead of a criminal offense, according to a release from Lifespan, a nonprofit health system based in Providence, R.I. Substance abuse is also treated as a health issue versus a crime.

The forum is sponsored by the Center of Biomedical Research Excellence on Opioids and Overdose at Rhode Island Hospital.
