We had 496 donors come into our blood drives in January and we collected 452 units of blood. We collected 125 more units of blood in January 2024 than we did last year. I looked at the monthly records in January for the last 10 years that I have been here. This was the strongest January we have seen.

When we talk of collecting blood it is measured in the number of pints collected or units collected. Each unit or pint collected really represents helping a patient in need – someone's mother, father sister or brother....

We also had many new donors in January which was great to see. We received many comments from donors who said they came in because they heard the need on the radio.

Please extend our thanks to everyone at the station for all their help and support. Everyone helped play a part in this month's success – Doug, Mina, Billy, Nick, Jordan, Julie....
