The top issues for 2016 include substance abuse, homelessness, the environment, health and wellness, and economic development.

The third quarter of the month had a bit of a heavier focus on events and happenings, as it falls during the busy summer tourist season on Cape Cod. We continued to pay attention to our issues list, conducting interviews with local leaders on substance abuse.

As we are gearing up for the busy summer season on Cape Cod, our second quarter also featured a number of interviews geared towards community awareness and economic development.

Inside Cape Cod 2016 Issues List

1. Substance Abuse

State leaders have identified opiate abuse as an epidemic across Massachusetts. A recent County assessment of substance abuse said the same, and also called alcoholism an endemic problem on Cape Cod. The issue affects those of all genders, ages, races, and socio-economic status.

2. Mental Health

We'll take a look at mental health issues across the board- as they relate to young people, the elderly, veterans, the homeless, in an effort to best inform our audience about the broad range of issues, and ways to help.

3. Homelessness

The issue of homelessness, especially in the downtown Hyannis area, is under scrutiny and is in the public eye. What are our local governments and public service agencies doing to combat the problem? How can we help transition people from life in the woods to life in a home?

4. 2016 Politics: Local & National Elections

An open Senate seat, an open State Representative seat, a Presidential election – and much more. Election 2016 coverage will include interviews with candidates on the issues of importance to aid our audience in making informed and intelligent decisions at the polls.

5. Housing

Many Cape Codders struggle with finding a decent place to live. With high housing costs and low salaries and wages, it's nearly impossible for many to buy or rent. We'll take a look at "Housing that's affordable" versus "Affordable Housing", talk with leaders and industry professionals about solutions to this problem.

6. Environment: Wastewater

The Cape Cod Commission recently completed its update of the Section 208 Water Quality Plan. Now, it's time for Cape Cod towns to implement solutions set forth in the document. We'll take a look at what our towns are doing now, the effort to deal with the issue on a regional basis, and discuss funding sources.

7. Economic Development

Tourism and the Cape's seasonal economy on one side; the need for sustainable, well-paying, yearround jobs on the other. What are Cape Cod's leaders doing to work towards a sustainable economic future? How does our natural environment tie in? How can we keep more jobs and more people on "this side" of the bridge?
