There are many elements to this project, which is named for the telephone area code 760 that's assigned to Encinitas, California and surrounding area. One example of how the church members have been blessing the community, on Fridays - before weekends began - church volunteers would drop off backpacks filled with food so the schools could distribute to children who were from "food insecure homes." Pastor Troy Martin shares that about 40 families were directly helped each weekend. And that was before the COVID-19 pandemic hit. "But once the pandemic hit, the numbers jumped to 220-plus families. Our church really rallied around it. People brought in donations. People helped pack, helped organize. People gave funds toward the project just to be a blessing and help people in their time of need." Pastor Troy wants the church to "live on mission to the community." He says it's not like, "'Oh, we hope the community comes into our building as part of one of our services', but, no, we want to go and love the community and bless the community and really be Jesus to the community." |

"So far, our messages have been about wearing masks and the importance of masks and why you shouldn't be afraid to wear the mask...and you can protect yourself from getting it." Land did another show about understanding illness. "We have a staff member who has cancer and so when the kids come back, I wanted them not to be afraid of her because she's lost her hair. Another show touched on wild weather. "We are in the Houston area, so we do have the threat of hurricanes [in 2017, Hurricane Harvey brought catastrophic flooding and damage to Houston]. And we've done another one about manners - honestly, we're just talking to kids about, you know, right now is a good time to home in on their manners. And when you use good manners, you're not just showing respect, you're also showing love and respect for God." |

Pastor Jud Wilhite shares that prior to the pandemic, the church was "blown away to realize we were the largest food pantry in our state - and when the pandemic hit, we served more food in the first two weeks than we did last year!" Wilhite credits God for everything Hope for the City has been able to do. "We started pop-up food distribution sites across elementary school parking lots - anybody that would take us." For people who may be discouraged over a job loss or just the pandemic restrictions causing depression, we asked if counseling help is available? "Absolutely! We have started a ministry that has really been powerful for us and I think made a huge difference in the lives of people. It's called 24 Hour Church." A person who needs an uplift, prayer or guidance can call or text 1-888-805-2778 day or night to speak with a volunteer. Dr. Kevin Corsini, the president of San Diego Christian College joins us to share tips that can make online studies more practical, while at the same time keeping home life balanced. Normally, "We have a natural boundary in place between work and family, and it's called the office, or it's called the school, where you go to a separate physical location." But Dr. Corsini emphasizes, "And that's gone...the refuge that we call home is also a classroom, is also the office and it's beginning to blur the lines" of what needs to be a home space or a work or school environment. "Not only that, but it's impacting the roles in the family. You know, one minute you have to be a father. The next minute you have to be a teacher. The next minute, you're putting on your professional hat as well and throughout the day, that can be very challenging." There is also the factor of a student feeling marginalized. Many online courses are pre-recorded videos that can create a gap between the student and teacher/professor, and input and association with fellow classmates. |

On Sunday mornings, "you get about an hour with the inmates... and you break into smaller groups...you just sit outside those cells and talk to them one-on-one...only separated by the bars." Anna Hurt, a junior social work major, says they were not allowed to bring in cellphones or anything else, "It was just us and them, and our Bibles." When asked if the jail atmosphere was intimidating at first, Anna replied, "myself and others were a little bit intimidated by the idea of it," but after her first visit, "I felt so comfortable in there and the interesting thing is, I found it a lot easier to share the Gospel in the jail than sometimes with some of my non-Christian friends..." But, for now, the in-person jail visits have stopped because of pandemic restrictions. The 'Plan B' is going to be a letter-writing outreach to the prisoners, hoping to keep some semblance of a one-on-one relationship, sharing friendship and the life-changing message of Jesus Christ. |

His boots-on-the-ground interview helps you understand just how serious the situation remains. For example, 90,000 people are still without power in the Lake Charles area alone. "Until the power comes back on, a lot of folks can't come back into the community. They can't work, which means people are not getting paid. There's still very widespread damage around here as well ... <br> there's still a long road to recovery here," advises Lamb. Without power, there's no air conditioning, no fans - and with the temperatures still very summer-like and the humidity high, "mold is a big issue" with homes that have been damaged. Life is not easy. Convoy of Hope, a K-LOVE ministry partner, is working with area churches, "Our primary partner is the local church," says Lamb. Convoy's Louisiana base of operations is currently in a church parking lot. Lamb says, "we're praying with people and offering help wherever we can." That help? Significant. The Convoy team has already trucked in 1.5 million pounds of relief supplies which are being donated to those in need, absolutely free. |

One of those communities is Kenosha, Wisconsin - just across the border from Chicagoland. There are clear signs God, through his people - 'the church' - is working to help the people of Kenosha. And, in reality, the plans were being laid well before the controversial incident where Jacob Blake was shot in August. "Several years ago, we had an event in our community that was really a turning point for us," explains Pastor Bob Griffith. "We pulled together 30 different churches to try to help our community that needed food and services - and that was a very powerful event. It was a moment when we realized that if we work together and leverage the power of unity that we can be do much more for the glory of God than we could ever do alone." With that initial project, "we gave away thousands of pounds of food and resources and medical and dental services, and people wanted to know what we were going to do next." One Kenosha city leader even told Pastor Griffith, "This could be a model of how our community works together in the future." In time, the community coalition became known as "1HOPE." Pastor Griffith is the founder of 1HOPE, a volunteer role, alongside his ministry position as executive pastor of the multi-campus Journey Church. Today, the 1HOPE foundational layer gives Kenosha a spiritual and practical undergirding to cope with the unrest and uncertainty. |

The members of the First Baptist Church of Oakhurst, California stepped up to help even after some of the members had been evacuated from their own homes. "We put the meals together and we loaded them up in our vehicles and took them out to distribute," Pastor Greg said. The pastor has been volunteering at the local Red Cross shelter as well, checking in evacuees and looking for opportunities to serve wherever he can. One of the best things? "Being able to pray with a gentleman who...lost everything. It's devastating. Just being able to share the hope of Christ with him, the gospel with him, has been an encouragement to our church." Pastor Greg said. Pastor Greg reminds us to keep our neighbors in mind even after the fires are out. "There's still a lot of stress and a lot of anxiety from loss or what the next disaster might be." |

The town of Middlebury has a population of not quite 4,000 - and there are many farms in the surrounding area. The "Drive Your Tractor to Church" event held each year by the church team honors farming as a very essential and noble field of employment. Pastor Gary Sheets sees to it the farm families are welcomed, prayed for, well fed - and their tractors, which represent the farm family income, are prayed over, blessed. Farming can be tough - and, at times, some farmers even consider taking their own lives After one Sunday sermon that specifically talked about a spike in suicides among farmers, especially dairy farmers, nationally, a number of farmers privately shared with the pastor they've had major concerns about losing their farms... and some have had dark, disturbing thoughts that have rattled their mental health. Pastor Gary responded with encouragement from the Bible. He reminds farm families, "our value is found in Jesus Christ" not what our land or farm looks like. Pastor Gary said he preached "right out of the bottom of my broken heart." There's also been an outreach called "Truckers Bobtail Cruise-In," where those who drive 18-wheelers are saluted for their essential work - and also receive needed prayer and encouragement. These over-the-road drivers are often away from their families weeks at a time. "We have found that these truck drivers deal with loneliness a lot," explains Pastor Gary. |

Chris is Campus Life Military Director with Youth for Christ. As a military veteran himself, Chris shares, "The thing that I do know is that we have military personnel who have helped with Christcentered programs all over the world." These men and women, who get transferred every few years, are often eager to find a way to serve in the local base community. And MacArthur Middle School at Fort Meade, Maryland, is the first school to benefit from the tutoring program, which is supported by Youth for Christ. Students in grades $6,7, \& 8$ can get tutoring and encouragement from those who also serve in the Armed Forces. During break times, the tutors and students can talk about life issues, things the kids are struggling with. Chris says a frequent finding is "there is no male leader in the home," a gap that can have considerable negative side effects. "And they're looking for somebody to speak into their lives." Other troubles include bullying, along with the various temptations most all teens and pre-teens face in today's culture. <br> Complicating things, COVID-19 restrictions have made a lot of the contact virtual, but Chris and other team members are doing their best to keep relationships moving in a positive direction. |

"Just tears and crying out to God and saying 'God, I can't handle this. I'm not strong enough for this.' And from the very beginning, I just felt God so strongly saying 'You're not strong enough, but I am strong enough,'" Abigail shared with us. Feeling motivated, she's taken the opportunity to encourage other families in what has become an unexpected very personal ministry at the Ohio hospital cancer treatment center. "It's been a really strange privilege to be able to be in this mission field, to be with people who might not necessarily know God, who might not be prayed for the way that I know Esther is," Walker said. "Knowing the names of the kids and knowing their faces and being able to go through and pray for them and feel that peace. ... I don't know if there's Christians actively praying for them or not, but I know I can [pray for them]. So even if that's all that I do, it's one of those things that makes it bearable." Abigail has even written a book sharing her experiences and God's faithfulness: "Suffering, Endurance, Character \& Hope: A Story of Pediatric Cancer and a Mother's Love." |

"I gave last week for the 27th time." But these days what's in his blood is even more important for saving lives. "I tested positive for COVID-19 in mid-August." Adam lost his sense of smell \& taste for a while, but really wasn't hit all that hard by the virus. But his COVID experience is now proving very valuable for others. "So, what the plasma does, is it has antibodies and so when folks come into a hospital setting, they will give them my antibodies with blood to fight off the virus." Every time Adam donates plasma, it helps 4 people - and so far, 16 people in the Dayton, Ohio area have been blessed by Adam's willingness to continue donating. Adam, an active Christian, says that taking an hour of his time to donate is no bother - and well worth it to help others. |

After a physical exam and bloodwork, he asked his family doctor, "What about this twitch?" Bill says the doctor seemed to react with a bit of alarm. Performing some basic tests, the doctor made a tentative diagnosis of Parkinson's disease. In short, it's a brain disorder that can cause shaking, difficulty walking, stiffness, and coordination issues. Bill Ragle is among a select group of patients who have been treated with a relatively new procedure that can often bring significant relief. After the diagnosis, it wasn't long before Bill's health started going downhill "pretty dramatically and pretty quickly." A committed Christian, Bill, who is Professor of Finance at Ohio's Cedarville University, explains he had many talks with God about his circumstances. And he concluded God would do one of two things. "God can heal me. I know he can do that. I've seen him do that with other people, so why not me?" The other way would be: God allowing him to go through the ailment but staying close. "God doesn't always heal our diseases. He frequently uses our diseased state - or whatever other troubles we might have in life to get us trusting more so that the watching world can see that and then (think), 'Wow, that's some God he has because look at the way he's going through these difficult times!'" Either way, Bill says God will get the glory. Just recently, after much prayer about the pros and cons, Bill was approved for a medical treatment called Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS), where small holes are drilled into his skull and electrodes are placed deep in his brain. This is a delicate operation. "They've got about a millimeter of room for error in there." The operation at the University of Cincinnati Medical Center was successful. Now a battery pack consistently sends 1.6 volts of electrical charge directly to his brain. |

Arianna Graham has Down Syndrome. Her mother Andrea says, despite her different ability, Ariana is very much like other kids her age. Arianna is just 6-year's old, but at her tender age, she's doing some amazing things. So far, she's become an ambassador for Nothing Down, a national advocacy group for Down Syndrome. She's also appeared on a billboard in New York City Times Square for the National Down Syndrome Society. Just past 500 miles into the hike, Luke and Annalee climbed down at a tricky point on the trail and saw a boulder start to move! Luke immediately went into dad mode and pushed his daughter out of the way, "thinking I could get out of the way as well, but it caught me." The boulder, estimated to weigh 8,000 pounds, "rolled me for about 15, 20 feet [headfirst]," but then, "it teetered upon a rock, somehow miraculously, so my daughter could pull me out." The pummeling rockslide caused major injuries. "I broke my femur, I broke my hip, I broke my forearm, three ribs and lots of stitches and bandages along the way. I'm not that type of a person who looks for a demon (slight laugh) behind every rock ... I know that sometimes life happens, but I do also believe that we were in a spiritual battle, we're battling for a whole city up in Colorado City trying to bring refuge and jobs and hope for a city. I do know the enemy would like nothing more than to sideline us and keep us from doing that." The church is also active in battling human trafficking. Incredibly, the boulder onslaught did not derail the Barnetts' mission. All the media attention to the close brush with death led to massive interest in the Short Creek Dream Center and saw \$2,000,000 raised...instead of the hoped for $\$ 1,000,000$ ! |
