On Monday, the Pentagon's mail facility received two letters that initially tested positive for a dangerous toxin. One letter was addressed to Secretary of State James Mattis. The other was addressed to the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral John Richardson. A third letter addressed to President Trump was intercepted at the White House by the Secret Service. Each envelope had traces of a crude castor bean concoction. Authorities believe William Clyde Allen of Logan, Utah, is connected to the letters. Allen was taken into police custody for questioning on Wednesday, a formal complaint is expected to be filed in Federal Court on Friday

Authorities arrested George "Billy" Wagner the third, George Wagner the fourth, Angela Wagner and Edward "Jake" Wagner. All four are charged with planning and carrying out the murders of the Rhoden Family on April 22, 2016. Wagner family members have been considered suspects for a long time. Investigators released their pictures in the summer of 2017 with a request for information from the public, today, they were arrested. The Attorney General said, at the center of the case is the issue of custody of a young girl. It was April of 2016 that seven members of the Rhoden family as well as one family members fiance, were all found murdered, execution style, all but one shot multiple times in the head. "We believe the evidence will show the suspects spent months planning the crime, they studied the victims habit and routines and knew the layouts of their homes." For Little Pike County, it has been 2 and half years of waiting and wondering. Sheriff Charles Reader says today is a big day. 2 News received this statement from the lawyer representing the Wagner family, "The Wagners look forward to their trial and day in court so they can vindicate their names. We look forward to the day when the true culprits will be discovered and brought to justice for this terrible tragedy."</p>

The National Retail Federation is projecting more jingle at the cash register this holiday season. According to the N-R-F, this November and December holiday retail sales will increase between 4.3 to 4.8 percent over last year. that translates to as much as \$721 billion dollars more. The N-R-F says its 2018 forecast is higher than the average annual increase of 3.9 percent over the past five years. Analysts say strong employment, higher wages and an overall healthier economy are contributing to more spending. The N-R-F looks at consumer credit, disposable personal income and previous monthly retail sales to gage expectations. The N-R-F's holiday forecast includes online and other non-store sales.</p>

Members of Ohio's Congressional Delegation say they're furious over General Motors decision to lay off workers in three states. Now they're calling on President Trump to get involved. Congressman Tim Ryan says the President should visit workers and G-M officials in person as soon as possible. Deputy Press Secretary Hogan Gidley says there is no decision on any potential visit. The President will meet with China's President during the G20 Summit in Argentina this weekend. Several lawmakers from America's Farm Country are urging the President to strike a deal. The President says he's open to making a deal, but says no final decisions have been made,</p>

The US accuses her of violating trade restrictions within Iran. But the Chinese Government is vowing "grave consequences" if she isn't released. China is condemning the arrest of a top executive with tech giant Huawei. Summoning the US Ambassador to demand the United States drop its warrant against Meng Wanzhou who remains in a Vancouver jail. Huawei says it's "not aware of any wrongdoing by Ms. Meng." US lawyers are opposing bail for Meng arguing her wealth makes her a flight risk that she had used seven passports in 11 years. Prosecutors want to extradite her to the US to stand trial on charges of fraud that she allegedly covered up deals through a subsidiary to evade US sanctions against Iran. In her sworn affidavit, Meng says she is innocent, and in China, fury at what she is widely seen as a competitive swipe at Huawei, a source of National pride here. The timing of it awkward Meng's arrest came the same day as President Trump and China's President Xi Jinping called a truce in their trade war.</p>

					<p>We turn to politics and what has been a strong stretch for President Trump. After his second Supreme Court Nominee was sworn in this weekend, what's next for the President and what does this historic accomplishment mean for the upcoming midterm elections? With one hand on the Bible, Justice Brett Kavanaugh's sworn oath was not an end point, but instead a political reboot for energized and sometimes angry democrats and a recharge for Republicans. Today the President headed for the golf course with Senator Lindsey Graham, Justice Kavanaugh's most firey defender. The President in Rally mode Saturday night, made the bitter confirmation fight a call to act. But sticking with her party, could have real consequences. Republican Susan Collins' yes vote unleashed instant anger to unseat her in 2020. While North Dakota Democrat Heidi Heitkamp who could lose her seat next month, tells 60 Minutes voting yes would have been safer.</p> <p>Springfield native John Legned, singing his support for Democrats, and railing against Republicans. Legend appeared at the Dakota Center with Theresa Gasper, Candidate for Congress in Ohio's 10th Congressional District. She's hoping the singer's visit pushes voters to the polls. Congressman Mike Turner also hoping to win voters over, ahead of Election Day, joined in Kettering by Lieutenant Governor Candidate Jon Husted, he went door-to-door chatting with voters. Turner says he hopes his record on jobs and the local economy is on voters' minds as they cast their ballots.</p>

					<p>Congress has nine days left to avoid a partial government shutdown, and right now, it doesn't look good. What was supposed to be a negotiation ended up with President Trump and Democrats bickering back-and-forth with cameras rolling. President Trump and Democrats at odds on how, or whether to keep the Government open. Vice President Pence sat silent as his boss demanded five billion dollars to build a border wall that he promised Mexico would pay for. Democrats are offering less than a third of that, with no wall. Democrats called out the President on bad facts, claiming much of the wall has already been built. It hasn't. The public feud brought mixed reaction on Capital Hill. For now, stalemate.</p> <p>Obamacare Open Enrollment begins November first, but starting now, Healthcare.gov is showing users how much they'll pay for coverage in 2019. John Peck is with the Pro-Obamacare Group "Get America Covered". He says his advocacy group is having a tougher time informing people about their insurance options. But the Trump administration says it's focused on doing all it can to lower premium costs. Eric Hargan the Deputy Secretary of Health and Human Services says his department has made progress in bringing costs down and has expanded the types of plans consumers can choose from. But Peck says consumers need to stick with Obamacare, if they want coverage for pre-existing conditions. If you see a price that seems to good to be true, off of Healthcare.gov it is probably a scam. Open Enrollment lasts through December 15th.</p>

John Holahan, co-wrote the report. He says fewer insurance companies are offering coverage in remote areas. And he says with fewer choices, and less competition, prices are often higher for those rural consumers, for example, in Tennessee the study found, rural residents paid 187 more dollars for the same plans offered in Urban areas, in Illinois, its 119 dollars more, in Colorado, rural consumers are charged \$113 more. "If they're low income to middle income, they're protected by the Subsidy structure." Holahan says those subsidies will equal savings for many consumers. But he encourages everyone to shop around, if possible, for the best deal.</p>

Seasonal allergies, or a high pollution day may be what triggers your child's asthma flare-ups. But there may be something else factoring into your child's breathing problems, his or her weight. A new study published in Pediatrics shows that about a quarter of new asthma cases in obese children are directly attributed to their obesity, and that 30 percent are more likely to be diagnosed with asthma. Dr. Preeti Sharma at Children's Health says the reasons why obesity is linked to asthma are not known for sure, but said limiting your obese child's activity, to avoid an asthma flare-up, isn't suggested. Research shows when kids or adults lose weight, their asthma can get better. "So talking to a doctor getting your child on the appropriate asthma therapies so that their asthma is well controlled is going to be very important. Experts already know obesity leads to *250-thousand* new cases of adult asthma each year.</p>

					<p>Hurricane Michael hit the coast as a powerful category four storm, laying waste to the Florida panhandle. Officials on the ground there have sent out a call for assistance. A seven member Ohio National Guard team left this afternoon with their helicopter. They say although its hard to tell what exactly they'll be doing until they get there, they are prepared for whatever comes their way. They say it's something they're used to, having been deployed to Texas and Florida last year. Michael brought strong storm surge and high winds, destroying buildings leaving many homeless and claiming lives. The National guard crew says they're prepared to do search and rescue, personnel and equipment transportation and supply runs.</p> <p>The flames are still burning, but the firefighters working around the clock are making progress. And as the fires become more contained the focus turns to the recovery efforts. In Butte County, authorities continue to search for human remains, more than 100 residents are still unaccounted for. The California wildfires have burned more than 230 thousand acres over the past week. Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke visiting the state to assess the damage and committing the support of Federal resources. And the White House announcing the President will travel to California Saturday and is expected to meet with some of the most affected. The worst of the storm has passed but winter weather advisories remain as officials warn dangerous road conditions lie ahead. "we need to stay vigilant, we're not out of the woods yet." That's the latest from officials after this weekend's record-breaking winter storm dumped rain, ice and snow across the Carolinas and Virginia, some are seeing a year's worth of snow fall in just a matter of hours, creating a nightmare for responders. Hundreds of thousands of customers lost power after the storm, crews made progress on Monday repairing damaged power lines. Operations have returned to normal at major airports in the region, though dozens of flights are still cancelled. And Highway Patrol Officers in North Carolina report thousands of drivers have called for assistance. Tow truck drivers are unable to keep up with drivers in distress. The National Weather Service report black ice could form across the Carolinas and Virginia. Officials are warning drivers not to take any chances.</p>
