Their neighbor was sentenced to life with the possibility of parole. Defense lawyers asked the judge for leniency arguing their clients did not intend to kill anyone. The men convicted of his murder now face a second trial on federal hate crimes.

Enrollment for Affordable Care Act plans ends in just a few days. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid services Administrator Chiquita Brooks-Lasure says nearly 14 million people have already signed up for coverage this year. She says it's clear insurance improves health outcomes. Brooks-Lashure promises that no matter where Americans live, they can get coverage. The deadline is January 15th with coverage beginning on February 1st.

Lawmakers say the global chip shortage has exposed one of America's manufacturing weakpoints. That's why they've been working to turn the "Chips Act" into law, long before Intel's announcement of a plant here in Central Ohio. It's unclear when a vote on the Chips Act could happen, but Speaker Pelosi has said it's a top priority for Democrats' 2022 agenda. But if it passes in the House, the two chambers of Congress would have to reconcile some of the big difference in the two bills before sending it to the President.</p>

"We hit our goal of getting our primary routes back up to speed within two hours of that storm event on 280 of 281 routes we meter in northwest Ohio. Remember ODOT does not plow city streets.</p>

Officers located the two teen suspects at a house on Anna Street, where there was a standoff. The two teens face four counts of murder, three counts of aggravated robbery and several other charges.</p>

This law will also no longer require people to inform law enforcement they have a firearm on them if pulled over, now, they'll only have to disclose the information if asked. Sheriff Whittaker says gun violence is mostly domestic-related in Darke County, but he asks people to continue using caution even with this new law.</p>

Norbert Mitchel, Vice President of the CATO Institute's Center for Monetary and Financial alternatives, says the Fed is trying to cool off the economy. Mitchel says the Fed doesn't directly control things like mortgage rates. Fed Chair Jerome Powell also said the Federal Reserve will continue raising rates, with 6 more similar hikes expected before the end of the year.</p>
