They say the terms will limit their ability to lower drug prices. The USMCA will be the most modern, cutting edge trade agreement in history. President Donald Trump is touring the U.S.-Mexico-Canada trade deal. But Democrats are pushing back. Texas Democratic Congressman Lloyd Doggett says the new trade deal, that replaces NAFTA will end up costing the U.S. at the drug store. Doggett says one provision in the deal protects big drug companies, against cheaper, generic versions of their drugs. That puts the President in a pickle, either get rid of the provision and risk having to renegotiate the deal, or keep it, and risk not passing in Congress. Texas Republican Senator John Cornyn says there's not a lot of time left to get Democrats on board. This is not the only issue the Democrats have with the USMCA. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi says she will not bring the deal up for a vote in the House until the President addresses all her concerns, including labor, environmental and enforcement issues.</p>

He says they've considered this technology for years, and since costs have come down, the City is ready to make that investment. Lieutenant Colonel Eric Henderson says as much as 80 percent of gunshot-related incidents are not reported. He says Shotspotter sensors are only listening for the sound of gunshots. Once that sound is detected, the device sends a recording of the sound to workers at Shotspotter. Other cities, including Columbus and Cincinnati have installed Shotspotter microphones and officials say it's working. Here in Dayton, Herrndrson says the devices will be placed in a three-square mile area around the North Main Corridor, the area that receives the most calls for shots fired. Henderson says neighborhood leaders are excited about the new technology. But others raise concerns, about whether the calls will pull officers away from other neighborhoods. LT. COL. Eric Henderson says "we're able to supplement, anytime there's problems in the neighborhood, and also add some additional patrols to areas when there's issues. The Assistant Police Chief says the technology will be installed in about 3 to 6 months. But he says you should still call police when you hear gunshot.</p>

President Trump waited until after the stock market closed to announce his response for today's move by China, that it was adding 75 billion dollars worth of tariffs on U.S. goods. The President tweeted he is increasing the September 1st tariffs Chinese goods from 10-15 percent, and the planned increases for October first going up 30%. Earlier the President declared he "hereby ordered" American companies operating in China to avoid doing business there. China announced today to new round of tariffs on U.S. begin September first followed by mid December tariffs on U.S. autos. That schedule matches taxes already announce by the White House on 300 billion dollars in Chinese goods. The U.S.-China trade war threatening to further weaken the global economy. It showed today on Wall Street as stocks fell sharply Mister Trump is pressuring the Federal Reserve to lower interest rates, tweeting a headline grabbing question about Chairman Powell. the President is wrestling with new economic challenges at home while facing increasing scrutiny on the world stage.</p>

The State Department of Health is asking healthcare providers to report any more suspected cases. Already deeming the number of teens vaping as a public health crisis, health officials now more concerned because of recent cases of pulmonary illnesses following the use of E-Cigarettes. Dr. Carrie Baker at Kettering Medical Center says not much research has been done on vaping devices, but given these developments, that should change. she says "the smaller particles can go deeper into the lungs, and there are chemicals in there that are aerosolized that could be affecting the lungs. But there just haven't been as many studies about that. It comes as six cases of pulmonary illnesses are being investigated in Ohio, along with more than 100 cases in 15 other states and one death in Illinois that is being considered the first death in the U.S. linked to vaping. Baker says if you vape and you experience any of these symptoms, shortness of breath, fever, chills, lightheaded like you're going to pass out, if you have chest pain you should seek immediate medical attention.</p>

Satellite video of Dorian showing the size and strength of the storm growing in the Atlantic. It could grow into a large category four with winds in excess of 130 miles an hour and is expected to make landfall Monday. Cities all along the Florida Coast, bracing for Hurricane Dorian. Governor Ron Desantis said "if you haven't acted, act to make preparations, Do not wait until its too late." Floridians are heeding the warning, stripping shelves of the essentials. This Costco has dozens of people lined up to buy supplies. At gas stations near Miami Beach lines reach back to the main street. A million gallons of drinking water and over one million meals will be available across the state but residents should plan to have their own food and water for 7 days the Governor says. Officials say they learned lessons from Irma which hit the area two years ago. The Mayor of West Palm Beach says they're already sending teams out to nursing homes to make sure they have supplies and generators. Labor Day Weekend is big business for these communities, in Daytona Beach, a tourist hot spot, one restaurant owner says he isn't taking any chances, I plan to make sure we're safe and if they say evacuate, I'll evacuate. Mayor Keith James, West Palm Beach says "a lot of times the real difficulties of these storms is not during the storm, it's the aftermath. "</p>

These tariffs affect everyday products, like food, clothing, school supplies, and sports equipment. President Trump continues to downplay the effect his trade war with China is having on American buyers. "On this Labor Day Weekend, one union leader says the President is not only hurting U.S. consumers but average workers too. According to J. P. Morgan, the newest round of tariffs on Chinese goods will cost the average American household a thousand dollars a year. More than 160 industry groups have condemned them, even some Republicans are expressing concern. China, meanwhile, is retaliating, imposing new tariffs as of midday Sunday on over 5 thousand U.S. imports like soybeans, beef and pork.</p>

The Hurricane has moved into Eastern Canada, strengthening back to a Category 2 hurricane with winds exceeding 100 miles an hour. In coastal Carolina recovery from Dorian is now underway. The backend was pretty powerful, the wind was impressive. An estimated 20 hurricanes spawned tornados struck parts of the Outer Banks. Dorian flooded Okracoke Island in just a couple hours stranding 800 people who defied evacuation orders. It left thousands in the Carolinas without power, but there were no deaths or major injuries. Meanwhile, a humanitarian crisis is unfolding in the Bahamas. The number dead is at least 43 and undoubtedly will rise. 180 mile per hour winds blasted the region for nearly two days. The destruction is overwhelming. Dorian even swiped New England with some rain and wind Saturday, and is the first hurricane to hit Canada in 10 years.</p>

A new executive order signed by President Trump, modernizing and expanding sanctions to combat global terrorism. The United States can now target terrorists without having to tie them to a specific act of terror or crime. The new order also aims to sanction anyone who finances terror groups. President Trump sending out a warning in a statement accompanying his executive order, saying quote "foreign financial institutions are now on notice that they risk sanctions if he knowingly conduct or facilitate any significant transactions with designated terrorists and terrorist enablers." With the new directive, the Treasury Department and State Department announce the designations of more than two-dozen terror groups, terror leaders and their affiliates.</p>

Senior Master Sergeant Joseph Gibson has served our country for 21 years and was recently assigned duty at Wright Patterson Air Force Base and his son could be forced to wait up to two years to get medicaid benefits because of that relocation. Zachary Gibson is going to be 13 this year, he has a form of Cerebral Palsy that makes him 100 percent dependent on his parents for care. The military provided healthcare covers a lot of his needs but not all. Families like the Gibson's turn to state medicaid programs to fill the gaps and despite qualifying for benefits in their previous state, they are being forced to re-enroll here in Ohio. Trying to make that change are State Representatives Allison Russo and Rick Perales. Their bill would bring Ohio into line with 33 other states that already have agreements to transfer benefit eligibility. Meanwhile the Gibson family is staying optimistic. Danielle Gibson, Military wife, says "we're very fortunate to have moved to a state that is being so active in this process."</p>
