The Bills would expand the amount of mental healthcare providers by creating a new one called Certified Mental Health Assistants. The Assistant has to practice under Physician supervision and cannot make a diagnosis, but would be able to provide continuing care , in turn, creating greater access to help. In a statement, Democratic Representative Beth Liston says she looks forward to working on this and discussing the best way to help ensure mental health care is accessible to everyone. Because identical bills were introduced in the House and Senate, it can help make the process of passing on quicker. That's what Gaverone says she's hopeful will happen.

The report also shows unemployment increased slightly from 3.5 to 3.7 percent. Labor Secretary Marty Walsh says the up-tick could be the first sign the Federal Reserves efforts to slow inflation are working. Earlier this week the Federal Reserve raised interest rates again, an aggressive push to try to lower inflation. But with nearly two job openings, for every unemployed worker, The Fed will likely need to keep taking action. With Election Day approaching, Republicans are hammering Democrats over inflation.</p>

Joseph Hartrich faces a felony charge of making a "terroristic threat", as well as a misdemeanor charge of "inducing panic." Court documents show authorities arrested Hartrich Monday, after investigating threats made on the social media platform Yik Yak. The posts threatened a specific building on campus, and indicated he planned a shooting at the school. Several Law Enforcement Agencies, including the F-B-I investigated the threat, tracing it back to Hartrich. He was arrested, and later admitted to making the threats, claiming he did it as a joke. Hartrich is due back in court November 17th.</p>

Joel Smith, Director of the Miami County Emergency Management Agency said, "Murphy's Law says that when you're not ready, that's when the emergency is going to hit you. It's just like having a first aid kit. Some things you just never know when you're going to need them." Sliding off the road can keep you stranded for hours, so non-perishable foods, water, jumper cables, blankets, hats, gloves, and flashlights are important to keep in your car. Jeff Lewis, Miami County EMA Emergency Management Specialist said, "FEMA tries to tell people if you can make a kit that allows you to stay kind of self-sufficient for at least 72 hours, that's the best case scenario. They want to have enough water, food and supplies. If the power goes out in your house, having those supplies are recommended, but trying to find a way to heat your home is equally as important, and certain methods come with their own risks. Smith said "problems with carbon monoxide poisoning arise when people move generators inside, try to heat themselves with their gas stove.</p>

Last week, there were 190 patients, there are only 181 beds. Those numbers went down slightly over the weekend, but RSV cases remain high. The Miami Valley is also seeing a rise in flu cases. According to the centers for disease control and prevention, Ohio is in the "high" category for flu activity, and Montgomery County is leading the state in the state in flu hospitalizations, with 83 so far this season. With such high cases, local doctors are urging caution as we get closer to the Thanksgiving Holiday. and recommend both children and adults get their flu shots, but they also want to remind people these are not new illnesses and the rise in RSVs something we see every year.</p>

We went to the experts fo find out why. Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy Head of Petroleum Analysis: "The price of oil continue to be under pressure, That's pushed the wholesale price of gasoline down. Refineries are back on line after doing maintenance. Supply of gasoline is up and that's pushing pricesdown. " Gas has fallen here in the Buckeye State just over 17 cents from last week, and Dayton's average dropped the same over that period, now averaging \$3.06 a gallon. One reason for that drop, supply, gasoline inventory is up by 8 million barrels from last month as refineries are utilizind around 95% of their operating capacity. Kara Hitchens, AAA Public Affairs Manager: "We've seen people make cuts in their budgets earlier in the year to make gas prices work within their budget, and so this is giving families a little relief and is coming just in time for Christmas. People want to get together with their family anf friends for the holidays, and we know that there's always lots of gift giving that happens during the holidays as well, so hopefully this will give people a little break. With indoor gatherings becoming popular during the cold holiday season, local health leaders are encouraging maksing again. Dr. Jordan Knox says the Miami Valley is experiencing high levels of influenza cases possibly linked to low vaccination rates or limited exposure among young children. "We had uncharacterically low levels of flu the past two years and since the flu often spreads first in younger kids, 4 years and younger, they"re thinking they haven't had much flu exposure, might've skipped being vaccinated due to the pandemic so they don't have as good of protection and it's spreading faster than usual.</p>

The small chunk that did show up for today's vote in person all eager to get home to avoid winter storms. Before the vote, Speaker Pelosi said the bill puts people over politics. The 4-thousand page bill includes 858 billion in Defense spending, raises the salaries of Service Members and sends 45 billion to Ukraine. The package also includes billions needed here at home. Like 40 billion in disaster recovery funds. Shortly after the bill passed President Biden praised new investments in cancer research, public safety and health care coverage for Veterans exposed to toxic burn pits. But only 9 House Republicans agreed. In total 201 lawmakers voted against the package. House Republicans Leader Kevin McCarthy who's jockeying for the Speaker's seat next year called the bills shameful. Once signed by the President the Government will remain funded through September of next year.</p>
