2 News on Dayton's CW addressing ECONOMY/BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT during the Third Quarter of 2015. The issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Saturday, July 11, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Sugarcreek Township and the City of Centerville have scheduled "another" meeting regarding the Cornerstone Development. This comes from our partners at The Xenia Gazette. The two sides will meet Wednesday, July 22, to see if an agreement can be reached. At issue is how much Centerville would pay Sugarcreek Township for those services at Cornerstone, which is on Centerville annexed property but still in the Township. Currently Costco is the only open retail business. Several restaurants and Kroger have announced plans to construct there. This report lasted 35 seconds.

On Friday, August 21, 2015 at 10 p.m. News reports, Also falling, the Dow Jones. The stock market suffered its biggest drop in nearly four years today. Three big factors are driving this week's worries. Concerns over china's economy, the Federal Reserve's biggest benchmark interest rate and dropping oil prices. The Dow closed down more than 530 points today. Among the stocks hit hard today. Apple, down more than 20 percent from its recent high. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Thursday, September 17, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Interest rates will stay at record lows for a little longer. The Federal Reserve decided not to raise the interest rates today, instead leaving the short-term rate near zero, where it's been since the Great Recession. Signs of a slowdown in China's economy have intensified fears among investors. Local Financial Planner Bob Russell says this is good news if you're looking to make a big purchase. On Monday, July 20, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, more details are emerging about the troubled life of the gunman who killed four Marines and an Ohio Sailor last week. Muhammad Youssef Abdulazeez was due to face a judge this month for a drunken driving arrest. A family spokesman says he also fought substance abuse. After losing his job this year, his family believes his personal struggles are at the heart of Thursday's attack. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Sunday, August 29, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, we first told you about expletive markings on areas in the Oregon District. Police caught up with two men on Wayne Avenue after several more trashcans and dumpsters were vandalized. Nicholas Edwards and Gregory Bailey were arrested on charges of criminal damaging and possessing criminal tools. Police say the two have been arrested before for the same crime. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Sunday, September 27, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, a driver for Cousin Vinney's says she was dropping off an order in the 10-hundred block of Highland Avenue last night when a man on a bike came up behind her, put his arm around her throat, and demanded money. He took her purse and then rode away. Police searched the area for but were unable to find him. If you have any information that could help, call Crime Stoppers. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, July 31, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Court documents filed in bankruptcy court confirm the sale of "Standard Register" to "Taylor Corporation" should be complete today. The new company will be called "SRC Liquidation

Company.” The longtime Dayton Company filed for bankruptcy protection in March. The Minnesota-based “Taylor Corporation” will pay 307-million dollars for the assets. Standard Register opened for business in Dayton back in 19-12. 850 local jobs would be lost if the company uprooted. We’ll keep you updated on today’s developments. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, August 21, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Ohio’s unemployment rates drops to an even 5-percent for July, the lowest level since 2001. We dug deeper into the numbers out today from the Department of Job and Family Services and found most of the job gains are in the Government sector while there’s been a job loss in the private sector. We talked with a local Employment Service Agency and the manager says jobs are available in Montgomery County, especially in manufacturing and customer service. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Thursday, September 3, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, New at 10, a Cincinnati area Police Officer has been fired, after being arrested in a sex crime investigation. The chief confirmed today that Sgt. John Swing’s employment was terminated September first. The Township is located in Clermont County. Swing is charged with gross sexual imposition. He’s accused of sexually touching a 20-year-old woman, who was riding with him as part of an Explorer Program. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, July 27, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, in tonight’s 2 Your Health, the number of children diagnosed with Autism tripled between 2000 and 2010. But new research suggests the increase reflects a change in how doctors diagnose the condition. A Penn State University study looked at Special Education enrollment over the past 11 years. They found no increase in overall numbers of children, and the rise in kids with Autism equaled the decrease of those with

other intellectual disabilities. Autism can be difficult to diagnose, because it often overlaps with similar disorders. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Tuesday, August 25, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Congressman Mike Turner is honored for his work in bringing "STEM" jobs to our area. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. The "Dayton Defense Education Foundation" awarded the Congressman with its Lifetime Achievement Award. He'll receive the honor at the STEM Charity Gala next month. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Sunday, September 27, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Ohio University is partnering with Columbus State Community College to expand degree offerings. Students can take courses at an education center there toward a health care related degree at O-U. The center can serve two thousand students a semester. Columbus State students will then be able to transfer to O-U to pursue a Bachelor's Degree. This report lasted 20 seconds.

2 News on Dayton's CW addressing HOUSING ISSUES/FORECLOSURES during the Third Quarter of 2015. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Thursday, August 13, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, New at 10, a California-based Company is accused of taking thousands of dollars from Ohioans, falsely promising to help them avoid foreclosure. Today, Ohio Attorney General Mike Dewine announced a lawsuit against "Green Tree Financial Group" which goes by several different names. Dewine says the company took advance payment, ranging from 900 to five-thousand dollars, but failed to obtain loan modification, federal grants, or issue refunds, as promised. At least 18 people in Ohio have reported losing money in the scheme. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Tuesday, September 22, 2015 at 7a.m. News reports, Ryan Homes is now Oh-for-2 in Centerville. For the second time, Centerville City Council rejects a

proposed housing development. Ryan Homes wants to build 94 homes on the Zengel property off Alex Bell Road. The original proposal was for 98, but Ryan Homes changed it, at the request of Council, to give the lots more space. Neighbors say that change wasn't enough to address their concerns. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, September 29, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, among those making the trip to see Pope Francis this week in Washington D-C is Congressman Mike Turner, along with two Dayton Nuns. He's worked closely with Sister Rose (Willden-house) Wildenhaus and Sister Rose Margaret (Broo-man) Broerman. Together, through the Saint Mary's Development Corporation, they built housing for Dayton Veterans. Turner says he chose the sisters because of their efforts to make a difference in our community. This report lasted 20 seconds.

2 News on Dayton's CW addressing SOCIAL WELFARE/HEALTH during the Third Quarter of 2015. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Thursday, July 30, 2015 at 7a.m. News reports, new this morning, contaminated water poses a health hazard to swimmers and boaters competing in next year's Olympics in Rio De Janeiro. An Associated Press analysis of water quality has revealed dangerously high levels of viruses and bacteria from human sewage in Olympic and Paralympic venues. Some competitors already training in Rio have already fallen ill with fevers, vomiting and diarrhea. Many might not be able to compete. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Thursday, August 27, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, a significant increase in the number of toddlers vaccinated during the last school year. More than 90 percent of toddlers received the shots for Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Polio, hepatitis B, and Varicella. The percentage of children who did "not" have any vaccinations at all last year was less than one percent. But the C-D-C warns

communities could still become vulnerable to outbreaks of small pockets of people who are missing vaccinations. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Tuesday, September 29, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, with flu season around the corner, schools are doing their part to keep the germs from spreading in the classroom. Dayton Public Schools strongly encourages every child be vaccinated once a year. The school's Director of Health Services, Virginia Noe, says the influenza is easily spread in a classroom setting. This report lasted 25 seconds.

2 News on Dayton's CW addressing GOVERNMENT during the Third Quarter of 2015. This issue was addressed in through our local produced talk show, news programming and other programming listed below:

On Friday, July 24, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, the Justice Department is being asked to find out whether sensitive Government information was transmitted on Hillary Rodham Clinton's personal email. Clinton has acknowledged using a personal email server as Secretary of State, but has said she never sent classified information. The Inspector General for the Intelligence Community has informed members of Congress that some material Clinton emailed from her private server contained classified information, but it was not identified that way. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, July 28, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Lawyers for Jonathan Pollard say the U.S. Government is granting him parole, after 30 years in prison for spying for Israel. He is due to be released in November. They say the decision followed a parole hearing earlier this month. The 60 year old Pollard has been imprisoned since 19-85 for selling classified information to Israel. He was arrested as he tried unsuccessfully to gain asylum in the Israel Embassy in Washington. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, September 14, 2015 at 7a.m. News reports, a judge rules the Government can step in on a lawsuit involving a New Paris student who is blind. Aleeha Dudley is suing Miami University, accusing the school of using technology which presents a barrier to her education. Dudley says she could not use provided course materials and didn't get any in braille. The Government alleges the University has violated the "American with Disabilities Act". The University denies doing anything wrong. This report lasted 25 seconds.

2 News on Dayton's CW addressing ENVIRONMENT/GREEN during the Third Quarter of 2015. This issue was addressed in through or locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Wednesday, July 8, 2015 at 7a.m. News reports, The Dayton International Airport is working to protect the local environment. As part of a partnership with Five Rivers Metroparks, the airport is cleaning and restoring a 4-oint-1 acre habitat in Englewood Metropark. The project includes removing invasive Honeysuckle Bushes and replanting native trees. Grant money also paid for the airport to enclose a stream near the end of the runway, which was a safety concern. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, August 7, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Federal Environmental officials say the yellow muck the surged into a river from a Colorado Mine contains heavy metals, including lead, arsenic and cadmium. An E-P-A crew accidentally released one million gallons of wastewater from the mine on Wednesday. It flowed into a river that is popular with boaters and anglers, and it flows into New Mexico. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, August 12, 2015 at 7a.m. News reports, Colorado's Governor is hoping for changes following a mine spill accidentally triggered by an E-P-A crew. He says he's hoping for a new relationship between the state and E-P-A to tackle a quote: "Legacy of Pollution" created from mining. Environment officials say much of the polluted water has been plugged up, but cleaning still needs to be done.

State officials hope to have the river open again for recreation in the next few days. This report lasted 25 seconds.
