On Monday, October 12, 2015 at 7a.m. News reports, and another restaurant opening this time in Centerville. "Bagger Dave's" will open its first Ohio location at the Cornerstone Development next month. But they plan on opening four locations over the next two years. It is a homecoming for the business since the chain's founder is originally from the Miami Valley. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Monday, November 2, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, Natalie Tendall with 2 News Investigates also traveled to Colorado to find out how the legalization of Marijuana has impacted their state. Officials told Natalie there were some growing pains at first. The state has had to re-assure employers they can still have a drug-free workplace. On Thursday, October 29, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, the man who police say killed a rival furniture salesman more than 20 years ago, will go on trial in January. 67-year-old Sam Perone is accused of killing Richard Woods in 19-92. Perone was brought back to Ohio from Arizona, after a Warren County Grand Jury indicted him for the crime. His trial will be in Lebanon. Authorities say advances in D-N-A technology helped them solve the decades-old crime. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On, Wednesday, November 9, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, 26-year-old "Troy Allen Holder the Second" will face a judge for a preliminary hearing. He already pled "Not Guilty" to the shooting deaths of 36-year-old Titus Ford and 33-year-old Bryant Lawson on Pumphouse Road in Springfield October 28th. The two were found inside an S-U-V. After the shooting, SWAT found Holder at the Springfield Super 8 Motel and was later charged. He is being held on a 1-million-dollar bond. He will be scheduled to appear at 2p.m. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, December 1, 2015 at 10p.m. News reports, a man is recovering tonight, after being hit by a bullet, shot through a window of his home. It happened before 7 this morning on South Light Street in Springfield. Police are still looking for the shooter. They say two shots were fired at the home. On Friday, October 16, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, new jobs are coming to Troy. Clopay Building Products says it's adding 200-thousand square feet to its Troy facility, a 30-millin dollar investment. Clopay is a garage door manufacturing and distribution company. The company's President says they'll be hiring for more than 200 jobs over the next three years. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, November 20, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, the monthly report on Ohio's jobs will be released today, showing the numbers from October. The report from the state Department of Jobs and Family Services will show employment data from across sectors such as construction, manufacturing and health care. Job gains were reported in September in categories including leisure and hospitality, educational and health services, financial activities and information. Ohio's rate is tracking below the national rate, which was 5-percent last month. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Wednesday, December 2, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, a project at the "Wilmington Air Park" could bring hope for new business in Clinton County. An unnamed company is testing flights out of the Air Park, which has been looking to fill the hole left by D-H-L and its 8-thousand jobs. While the group behind it remains unknown, some local experts think it may be online retailer, Amazon. We talked to the company leasing planes for the project. A spokesperson says about 55 employees are working four flights a day. Now many are hoping those jobs keep growing. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, October 26, 2015 at 10p.m. News reported, a spokeswoman with the Ohio Department of Education says they're already working to improve testing. Officials recently moved away from PARCC testing, which was widely considered to be a failed testing provider. They have a new vendor, and state officials say the tests for English, Language Arts and Math will be shortened this year. Schools will also have more flexibility when it comes to how they administer the tests. The Ohio Department of Education says it will keep a watchful eye on any national testing initiatives that are announced. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Friday, November 6, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, The University of Dayton is near the top of the list of the top ten schools in Ohio, graduating the most "well-rounded" students. The poll says U-D does a good job preparing students for the professional world through its commitment to science, business, education, engineering, and stem programs. The list of the top ten schools was compiled based on acceptance and graduation rates and net price. U-D came in second on the list, Ohio State came in first. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, December 1, 2015 at 7a.m. News reported, State officials are asking the Federal Government for more flexibility in the work requirements that some welfare recipients must meet. The Governor's office says certain federal rules don't give people enough time to complete vocational training or job-readiness activities. Officials want to increase a limit on vocational education training from 12 months to 36. The Kasich administration says training for a number of indemand jobs exceeds 12 months. A spokeswoman for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services says the Agency is reviewing Ohio's request. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Friday, October 23, 2015 at 7a.m. **News** reported, the number of homes sold in Dayton is on the rise and so are the prices. The Dayton Area Board of Realtors reports a more than 20-percent improvement in sales year-to-year last month. The agency also says the average sale price rose to almost 141-thousand dollars, the highest September on record. Dayton Investment Advisor, Rob Russell, says this is great news for homeowners thinking about making their next move. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Wednesday, November 4, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, about 70 tenants are living elsewhere tonight after they are evicted from their apartments. Renters at the Grandview Apartment Complex in Dayton spent today trying to find a new place to stay. They were given 24 hours to move out because the building didn't meet city standards. Local organizations, including Homefull, have pitched in to help renters find housing. Many say they just paid rent through November, and they want their money back. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Friday, December 18, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, today the Emergency Housing Coalition hosted the annual Homeless Persons' Memorial Vigil. The event honors the memory of the 35 people who died while homeless this year in Dayton. They are remembered by their first name being read aloud, followed by the tolling of a bell. Organizers say the need to help the homeless is greater than ever. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, October 28, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, patients with advanced melanoma could soon get some relief from an unlikely source, a cold sore virus! The drug, called IM-LY-GIC, was approved by the F-D-A and could be available for use within a week. When it's injected into visible skin tumors, the genetically engineered herpes virus triggers a reaction in the immune system and burst the tumors apart. In a study of more than 400 patients, 16-percent saw a decrease in size of their skin and lymph node lesions compared to only two-percent of those who did not receive the drug. This report lasted 30 seconds.

On Monday November 9, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, 17-thousand heart experts from around the globe are meeting in Florida this week. The buzz this year is about a study of blood pressure control that proved so beneficial it was stopped early. Doctors in Cleveland lead a clinical trial involving more than 9-thousand people with hypertension and one other heart disease risk factor. They were assigned to target the usual 140 blood pressure reading or much lower down to at least 120. Just three years into the planned five year study, the benefits of more intensive treatment and lower pressure were clear: fewer heart problems, and a reduction to heart-related deaths. This report lasted 35 seconds.

On Friday, December 11, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, news research shows a strong link between poverty and childhood obesity. The study of nearly 20-thousand families found that by age 11, children from poorer homes were nearly three times more likely to be obese than their more affluent peers. Playing a sport more than three times a week, an earlier bedtime and fruit consumption were linked to lower obesity rates. But having a mother who smoked during pregnancy or was obese herself increased the risk of weight problems. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Tuesday, October 27, 2015 at 7a.m. **News** reported, new this morning, the government bans E-Cigarettes in airline passengers' checked bags. The move comes after more than two dozen explosions and fires over the last five years. The rule does allow E-Cigarettes in carry-on luggage, but smokers won't be able to recharge those devices while they are on the plane. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Tuesday, November 3, 2015 at 7a.m. **News** reported, it's not a bird, it's not a plane, it's a special delivery. At least that is what google hopes to be able to say soon for its drone delivery. An executive with "Project Wing" discussed the issue at an air traffic controllers conference Monday. He said the goal is to have drones deliver packages by 2017. Drone programs have faced regulatory roadblocks from the government. This report lasted 20 seconds.

On Sunday, December 6, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, President Obama makes a Prime-Time address from the Oval Office tonight about what measures the Government is taking to keep the U.S. safe following the recent attack in California. On Tuesday, October 3, 2015 at 10p.m. **News** reported, a coastal flood warning is in effect today in Charleston, South Carolina. Toads have been shut down, homes and businesses have flooded. Storms this week have already dumped up to 11 inches of rain on the Carolinas and is expected to get worse through the weekend. This report lasted 15 seconds.

On Thursday, November 19, 2015 at 7a.m. **News** reported, people in Georgia are cleaning up after strong storms, including a possible tornado, tore through the area yesterday. Hundreds of trees were knocked down across one county. The Sherriff's Office sent patrols door to door during a widespread power outage. The Red Cross was helping anyone who needed a place to stay for the night. No injuries were reported. This report lasted 25 seconds.

On Monday, December 14, 2015 at 7a.m. **News** reported, a typhoon has slammed into the Eastern Philippines, where flood and landslide-prone communities are bracing for destructive winds, heavy rain and coastal floods of up to 13 feet.
