2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Economy/Business Development during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, July 8, 2014, **WBDT News** reported more restaurants are coming to Miami Township's Austin Landing. Noodles and Company and a Tex-Mex restaurant called Chuy's are both slated for development. Restaurant owners will go before the zoning board next Tuesday for approval. Chuy's could open by next spring and would be located across from Panera Bread. Noodles and Company does not have an estimated opening date. This comes on the heels of reports that Austin Landing is also looking to farmers markets, concerts and movie nights for families. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Thursday, August 7, 2014, **WBDT News** reported more people are gambling at Ohio's casinos. We checked the monthly revenue report this afternoon. Overall revenue at Ohio's casinos went up about 4-million dollars in July. Each of the state's four casinos gained about a million in income. In all, the casinos have drawn more than 470-million so far this year. The state collects about one-third of those revenues in taxes and distributes the money to counties, cities and school districts. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Monday, September 1, 2014, **WBDT News** reported a new water feature is up and running in Miami Township. The new feature is the center piece for a park and event space at the Austin Landing Development. The developers say the space will ultimately be the hub for festivals, concerts and other events. The area will also include walking trails, a bike hub, lockers and restrooms. More stores at Austin Landing are expected to open this fall. They include Field and Stream, Dewey's Pizza and Firebirds Wood Fired Grill. This report lasted 25-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Crime & Justice/Substance Abuse during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, July 1, 2014, **WBDT News** reported we showed you this surveillance video last month of a group of six kids climbing the roof of a picnic shelter at Helke Park in Vandalia. The ripped off the shingles and threw them to the ground. Thanks to viewer tips, police identified the kids and charged four with criminal mischief. They've also not allowed back in any city park. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, August 7, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Springfield residents gathered tonight at a childrens memorial. And they echoed a sentiment loud and clear... "don't mess with the memorial". This comes only a short time after it was discovered that teenagers had vandalized the park. Residents tell us the thieves stole a water fountain measuring 12 feet that is used to keep oxygen in the park's pond. The thief caused many of the pond's bigger fish to die. Tonight the community garnered support to watch over the park during nighttime hours to ensure the memorial remains safe. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Monday, September 1, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Dayton Police are still looking for leads following a series of car break-ins near a ball park. Victims say the break-ins happened within a ten minute time frame at an Irving Avenue parking lot Saturday. Police say the lot is on the other side of a tree line where a baseball game was being played. Officers say the suspect shattered windows and took purses, money and other personal items. At least six vehicles were hit. This report lasted 20-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Employment during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, July 8, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Veterans returning stateside will now have a place to stay, for free. Minnesota governor Mark Dayton inked an agreement that allows Veterans to stay at Hilton Hotels for three nights with no charge. This applies only to vets who are currently job or house hunting. Iowa, Texas and Arizona also offer similar programs. This report lasted 35-seconds.

On Wednesday, August 6, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Miami Valley job seekers are getting a new tool as Dayton City Commissioner Joey Williams launches "Hire Dayton". The new initiative aims to match job seekers with employers by raising awareness of potential opportunities and current openings. Hire Dayton will also help educate those looking for employment on career services available across the city. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, September 4, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Ohio's only passenger airline has new orders that will further expand its fleet. This from our partners at the Dayton Business Journal, American Airlines is adding 47 aircrafts to Dayton-based PSA Airlines. The transfer should mean more jobs here at home as the plan calls for 2,000 more company jobs. The airline already has more than 600 employees in Dayton...1500 nationwide. This report lasted 25-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Education during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, July 29, 2014, **WBDT News** reported now through Friday you can drop off donated school supplies at the Xenia Walmart on Progress Drive. K Then, on August 2nd through 9th the Sugarcreek Township Walmart will be holding a "Fill the Bus" campaign. United Way of Greater Dayton will distribute all the donated school supplies. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, August 1, 2014, **WBDT** reported the Board of Educations scheduled to discuss and approve a new leader during its Tuesday meeting. Both the superintendent and treasurer resigned this summer. Jim Schoenlein and Steve Clark were placed on administrative leave this summer for creating what the board called a hostile work environment. We'll have an update on the meeting for you next week. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Tuesday, September 2, 2014, **WBDT News** reported more students are going to Wright State University this year. Enrollment climbed to more than 17,000 at both the Fairborn and Lake Campus in Celina. University officials say they've seen 11% growth from students coming directly for high school. International students have also increased nearly 18%. This report lasted 15-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Housing Issues/Foreclosures during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Tuesday, July 1, 2014, **WBDT News** reported home sweet home isn't what it used to be in Montgomery County. Seven of ten homeowners are facing dropping property values. Every 3 years, Ohio County Auditors look at home sales, rental and vacancy rates, and other factors to determine how much our properties are worth. Residential values in Montgomery County are down 4% from three years ago. This report lasted 20-seconds. .

On Monday, August 18, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Julian Castro was publicly sworn in as Secretary of Housing and Urban Development today. The former San Antonio Mayor was privately sworn into office in late July after easily being confirmed by the Senate. But today he was joined by his family as Vice President Joe Biden administered the ceremonial oath. Castro rose to national prominence after delivering the keynote address at the 2012 Democratic Convention. He is the 16th HUD Secretary. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Monday, September 22, 2014, **WBDT News** reported mixed signs for the housing market in Dayton. The Board of Realtors say there were more gains in sales prices in August of single-family homes. But at the same time, the number of homes sold in the Miami Valley lagged from August to 2013. The average sale price last month was \$143,000. That didn't quite match last month's high-water mark. But it was still the 2nd highest average sales price in seven years. This report lasted 25-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Social Welfare/Health during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Saturday, July 12, 2014, **WBDT News** reported treatment of severe pain may not depend on how badly you feel, but where you live. A new report from the CDC finds prescription rates for powerful painkillers vary from state to state. The agency says states in the south have the highest rates. And there is a link between the number of prescriptions written and overdoses. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Thursday, August 7, 2014, **WBDT News** reported US Health officials clear the way for an experimental Ebola treatment. The Food and Drug Administration eased safety restrictions on TKM. It targets the genetic material of Ebola. Last month, the FDA halted a small study of the injection in humans because of safety concerns. The news comes on the same day a house subcommittee heard pleas from the CDC about the growing Ebola outbreak. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Wednesday, September 3, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Careflight christens its newest helicopter. It will be the first operational one of its kind in the US. These are stock photos of what the copter could look like. This new transport is technologically advanced and will enhance flight safety, response times and be able to carry more than one patient. The unveiling will be 10 this morning at Miami Valley Hospital. This report lasted 20-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Government during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Monday, July 7, 2014, **WBDT News** reported planning a trip? Try to get out before July 21st unless you want to pay more. That's when the Transportation Security Administration will raise security fees at US airports. The money is used to fund TSA efforts. Flyers will start paying a flight fee of \$5.60 each way, no matter how many planes you board en route to your final destination. Congress approved the higher fees as part of its bi-partisan budget deal last December. This report lasted 20-seconds.

On Friday, August 1, 2014, **WBDT News** reported on immigration. The House of Representatives approved a \$694-million dollar bill addressing the surge in undocumented children crossing the US-Mexico border. The bill passed just before 9PM. The legislation increases spending for National Guard Troops, adds immigration judges and detention facilities and would send migrant kids home more quickly. However, with the Senate adjourned for the summer, the bill stands no chance of becoming law. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Thursday, September 4, 2014, **WBDT News** reported there's no such thing as a free lunch, even in the land of free lunches. Because the famous perks enjoyed by the well-paid workers of Silicon Valley may now be subjected to stiff taxes from the federal government. This report lasted 15-seconds.

2 News at 10 on Dayton's CW addressing Environment during the Third Quarter of 2014. This issue was addressed in through our locally produced talk shows, news programming, and other programming listed below:

On Saturday, July 5, 2014, **WBDT News** reported starting next week the City of Trotwood is going green. The city will partner with Rumpke to bring bigger recycling bins to residents. City officials hope it increases recycling in the city by 25%. The carts can hold here times as much as the current red recycling bins. Rumpke will still empty them every week. Look for the bigger bins to start arriving at your home between July 8th and 18th. This report lasted 25-seconds.

On Friday, August 8, 2014, **WBDT News** reported Ohio's Democratic leaders are urging Governor John Kasich to take steps to stop the Toledo area's toxic algae blooms and prevent future water crises. The Lake Erie Legislative Caucus met Friday to talk about the continued algae problem and how they can prevent future public health emergencies. Lawmakers urged Governor Kasich to immediately declare the Maumee as a "distressed watershed" to begin the process of curbing harmful chemical pollution in Lake Erie. This report lasted 30-seconds.

On Thursday, September 4, 2014, **WBDT News** reported new information tonight as the State of Ohio is receiving more than \$7 million dollars to combat harmful algae blooms. The US Environmental Protection Agency awarded the grant money to The Ohio Department of Natural Resources' Ohio Clean Lakes Initiative. That fund aims to improve water quality initiatives on Lake Erie which was plagued this summer by an algae bloom that caused a water crisis in Toledo. This report lasted 35-seconds.
