The move to E-V's is expected to have a major impact on drivers wallets, and the environment. The network could start being built as early as this fall, if Ohio is ready. Tom Bullock, Executive Director of The Citizens Utility Board of Ohio, they've been pushing Ohio's lawmakers to get an E-V plan in place for exactly this moment, so the opportunity doesn't pass Ohio by. There's another incentive for Ohio to get an E-V plan together, even more federal funding will soon open up for states, but unlike this first round of funding, those dollars will be competitive.</p>

Chair Jerome Powell announced Wednesday the Fed is raising interest rates by one-half percentage point, and reducing its bond holdings. This will mean higher interest rates for car loans, mortgages and credit cards. President Joe Biden said there are other efforts at play in hopes of taming inflation. "Bringing down the deficit is one way to ease inflationary pressures in an economy." The President announced the government will pay down the national debt for the first time in 6 years, while he continues to push congress to pass his other economic priorities, including takes on high earners and big businesses. Republicans like Senators Pat Toomey and Rick Scott argue the administration's tax plan, along with prioritizing clean energy and forgiving student loans, would only further damage the economy.</p>

					<p>2 NEWS @ 10PM on Dayton's CW</p>	<p>Body cam footage shows exactly what unfolded on I-75 near Dryden Road just before 6AM on Wednesday May 4, 2022. Police and medics responded to a crash in the Northbound lanes, a car flipped on its top. Video shows 27-year-old Elijah Isham inside the car with a gun. Over the course of 5 minutes police plead with Isham to drop the gun. They continue to plead with him, they look for other options to de-escalate the situation. Their commands were coming back with no response so they were trying to get a response from this individual to further de-escalate. When that did not work, two officers fired nine shots at Isham. Isham was taken to the hospital where he died. Kelmmenson and Lloyd are on administrative leave. The Tactical Crime Suppression Unit Task Force is handling the investigation.</p>

That's why Ashley Lantto says she wanted to organize this nurses march in Columbus. Hundreds of nurses showed up to the Ohio Statehouse. They say staffing and other changes affect them and their patients. We asked 3 major hospital systems to respond to the nurses concerns. Representatives from the Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center sent us a statement that reads in part - "We respect our nurses right to demonstrate on their time off, our top priority is providing high quality patient-centered care and providing a positive work environment." The nurses say they hope they chanted loud enough to have their voices truly heard and incite change.</p>

On Tuesday the bipartisan group of Senators met virtually to talk about how they can take action. Senator Chris Murphy is leading discussions over gun control for democrats, while Senator John Cornyn heads up the Republican side. President Biden said Tuesday he plans to meet with Congress too. And he's expressed optimism that lawmakers can reach a compromise on legislation to stop future mass shooting. At an N-R-A conference in Houston last week, several influential Republicans reiterated Pro-Second Amendment views. On Thursday, the House Judiciary Committee is having an emergency meeting to move forward a package of gun control legislation.</p>

While his family did not want to go on camera, they tell me Holderman was a loving father and grandfather. Holderman was working Merchant Security Services at a Security Guard. Dayton Police say he was their go to guy. While Merchant declined an interview, they did post on Facebook saying "it's with a heavy heart we have lost one of our dearest and most dedicated officers today. Our hearts are broken." Holderman was shot and killed by 30 year old Brian Booth. Booth was charged with multiple crimes over the years including theft and possession of drug instruments. At the time of the shooting, he had two warrants for alleged crimes in Warren and Montgomery counties.</p>

But he's not worried. I asked Dr. Kontra, could we be headed out of one pandemic into another. He says no, Covid-19 is much more contagious. He says Monkeypox can be transmitted through respiratory droplets like covid, but it won't happen nearly as fast. With this new outbreak, Kontra says we're in a very different place than covid in the spring of 20-20. The healthcare system is already equipped to fight Monkeypox.</p>

Connecticut Senator Chris Murphy and Texas Senator John Cornyn are among the bipartisan group of lawmakers working on a compromise gun control bill. The items currently on the table are investments in mental healthcare, red flag laws, and expanding background checks. President Biden wants Congress to go further by including a ban on assault weapons. But the President also acknowledges that's not likely to pass given the current gridlock. This week there will be several hearings on Capitol Hill involving gun safety bills.</p>

Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen says that means tackling the sectors driving price increases. But Republicans say proposals that require government spending are the problem, not the solution. And Senator John Thune says the American Rescue Plan is a prime example. Senator Ted Cruz also blames inflation on the President's energy policies. Secretary Yellen believes investing in clean energy will help. But Cruz says the Administration's Green policies are making things worse. Senator Stabenow says both parties need to focus on solutions.</p>
