They are providing contact tracing support to three counties here in Southwest Ohio. Wright State students are the voice on the phone when a Preble, Champaign and Butler County resident, or someone they know tests positive for Covid-19. Leah Elliott, Training Supervisor, "It could be the first time that they're hearing they have covid, so really just explaining to them the situation directly, but with empathy, and connecting them with the resources they may need." Each morning students on shift receive a list of positive cases they they begin making calls, asking questions to find out where the person has been and who they've seen. Hamza Sultan, Contact Tracer, "In order to do that, we need everyone to be transparent when it comes to us so we're able to provide them and other people the information they may need to stay safe." From the answeres they receive, the contact tracers will call everyone who came in direct contact with the positive covid person. Then everyone will be notified to quarantine for 14 days. Natalie Hicks, Lead Shift Supervisor, "By staying home, by isolating and ensuring you're not coming in contact with other people, you're stopping the virus." The programm's been running since September, and the coronavirus cases rise across the state. They also are seeing more cases coming in. Whitney Jenkins, Shift Supervisor, "We're also seeing an increase in the contacts that we're getting because those cases have been around more people. So we have seen a little bit of a spike, but it's nothing our team has not been able to handle." Which is a relief to the Health Departments they serve. Erik Balster, Preble county Health Commissioner, "It takes a huge weight off our shoulders, otherwise it may cause us to get further backed up." |

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| The Cares Act is set to expire December 31st, leaving millions vulnerable to an economic crisis caused by the pandemic. At a Tuesday hearing Ohio Democratic Senator Sherrod Brown slammed Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin. Mnuchin has refused to extend Federal Emergency Loan Programs designed to help businesses and governments survive the pandemic. Brown says because of Mnuchin's decision, President-Elect Biden will inherit an even bigger economic mess. But Secretary Mnuchin insists the economy is making a record comeback. He says he beleives the law requires him to end the programs. "My decision not to extend these facilities was not and economic decision."Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell asked the Senators for immediate, aggressive action. A bipartisan group of lawmakers has proposed a compromise relief package that includes billions in additional business loans. But Missouri Republican Senator Roy Blunt fears negotiators may be unable to bridge the gap between House Democrats and Senate Republicans. | A Stark County woman says after doing some research on the secret lives of bees, she became fascinated and deciede to build two beehives on her property in Uniontown. Michelle Huskins says she and her husband installed a trail camera to keep close watch on the hives and the 100-thousand bees. And the camera captured images of deer and coyotes prowling around the hives. But last Thursday night, she discovered that the camera was rolling as a young man carrying a gun, snuck into their property and began vandalizing the bee hives. She said "I'm like why is someone stealing my bees, and then I look and I'm like holey smokes, he has a gun, in our backyard and then I saw the time stamp, and it was about three minutes after we were out here my heart sank. The camera captured images of the suspect peeling off the covers from the hives, taking them apart, and then setting some of the bees on fire, killing thousands of them. He then pushed over the hives before slinking away. Michelle Huskins says she cannot fathom why he targeted her bee hives. "For somebody just to come out and be so careless with the hives and you know, have no regard for their life, it's just, it's just very sad." Michelle says she won't know the impact of the vandalism on the bee colony and its two queen bees until spring. She is now hoping that someone will be able to identify the vandal and the police can find out what his motivation may have been. "They came up here with some kind of gun, they came up here with a knife, because you can see the slit all the way down my beehive, they obviously had something to start a fire, so I mean it's very concerning. |

Crawford: I think that every nurse is deserving and every healthcare worker is deserving of something special and I think this is a great program for that. | It's been about two years since Ohio University Freshman Collin Wiant died at an off-campus fraternity house. His parents have become anti-hazing advocates. Kathleen Wiant, Collins mother, oh my gosh, Collin was a light every time he walked in a room. It was just over two years ago that light was lost, now it's Collin's parents lighting up the room when they talk about their late son. It was November 2018 when Collin died at a fraternity house at Ohio University. A toxicology report showed he died of asphyxiation after inhaling a whippet. Several people were charged in connection with Collin's death, but his parents soon found, hazing is only a fourth degeree misdemeanor in Ohio. Now the Wiants have come to the State House hoping to stop the hazing they believe led to their son's death from happening to anyone else. House Bill 310 or Collin's Law addresses hazing an bullying. The Bill creates a system for reporting and handling bullying in schools across Ohio and would offer help to the victims. It also increases the penalties for hazing related crimes, especially when it has to do with drugs and alochol.
