Ohio has monitored prescription information sine 2006 and with an increase in overdoses, an update will hit the shelves this November. The program can now calculate overdose risk and provide treatment options if any ref flags pop up. The upgrade comes as all eyes look to Ohio to find a way to fight back against addiction	A search is on across the Ohio and possibly the Midwest. A 14-year-old pregnant teen is missing. The White House Economic Advisors said the Republican Tax Reform Plan would benefit American workers. Flu season is arriving early this year and it's hitting hard. The Ohio Health Department has elevated flu activity to "widespread", the highest level. Last year Ohio didn't reach "widespread" until mid-January. Recent data shows there were 144 flu-related hospoitalizations in one week, compared to 29 during the same week last year. Emergency Medicine Physician, Dr. Christoper Huelsman says one reason for that is this year's flu strand is a lot more infectious.	The concept of heatlhcare for all and the single payer syster have been talked about at the federal lever, now they will talk about it here in Ohio.Democrat State Representatives Teresa Fedor and Bernadine Kennedy Kent are making it their mission to solve the problems with Healthcare in Ohio. Republican State Representative Stephen Huffman has practiced medicine for 25 years and agrees that healthcare is not where it needs to be right now, but that's where thier shared opinion ends. Some feel that a single payer system will let us negotiate as a state, but others feel a one payer system would decrease the quality of healthcare in Ohio.

Joe Tuss, Montgomery County Environmental Services, said, "one thing we specially tried to do, is give the economy and our residents and homeowners, the opportunity to have really low, solid low and steady rates as the economy recovered. According to the County, water rates have increased jus over one percent each year since 2010, with the average increase in the State of Ohio being four percent. Rates will go up 14 percent in 2018 and for the next 4 years rates will increase by more than 5 percent. The Medical Marijuana facility planned for Dayton would open in a vacant building on Valley Street. Mabeline Horn lives near the proposed Medical Marijuana facility says that it might help some people and some people it may not. Mabeline has in the area for 8 years and the Medical Marijuana facility would be a block from her home, says her biggest concern is traffic. the 11 growers will have to wait nine months until an inspection before they can start growing. Steve Ashcraft also lives near the proposed site and is looking forward to the boost in possible jobs, especially in a building that has been vacant.	In a 4 to 1 vote, Trotwood City Council voted to impose a 6-month moratorium on Medical Marijuana. Residents on both sides of the issue are now speaking up, saying it could bring jobs to the area, but others say, there's too much of a stigma associated with the drug. Counci members are pressing pause on Medical Marijuana and using the next 6-months to research the issue further and see if it's a good fit for Trotwood. Survey resultsof about 200 people show 78 percent would support having a Medical Marijuana Cultivator in Trotwood, 21 percent said no. Residents on both sides agree that Trotwood needs jobs, and Mayor Mary McDonald says that has been her focus since day one.
