

COOS BAY — A burglary at a Langlois grocery store ended in a car crash and the arrest of two men in Coos Bay yesterday.

Coos Bay police arrested 20 yr old, Richard Schlitz on an outstanding warrant charge. While Michael Reid, 32, of Santa Maria, Calif., faces charges of burglary and theft.

The Curry County sheriff's office received two reports of a burglary in progress at the Langlois Market around 4:30 a.m. Both callers reported seeing two people break into the store and drive north towards Coos Bay in a newer silver four-door car.

About an hour later, a Bandon police officer responding to a reported sighting of the car found the market's cash register on the side of the road near Beach Junction.

Coos Bay police responded once the vehicle entered the city limits. The car crashed near the Southwestern Oregon Community College campus, and three men fled on foot.

Coos Bay police and Curry County Deputy Rod McCallister arrested Reid and Schlitz a few miles from the crash site.

Police allege that Schlitz, Reid and the unknown third suspect broke into gas stations in California and Gold Beach before the Langlois Market burglary.

## Memorial Cross vandalized

Vandals expressed their sentiment about the Vietnam War memorial cross in Mingus Park late Sunday night, or early yesterday morning.

Someone spray-painted the word "Remove" on the cross and then wrote the word "Cut," with an arrow point down to a dotted line at the base of the cross.

The vandalism is the latest chapter in the controversy surrounding the Cross. Following a complaint in early March from the Wisconsin based Freedom from Religion Foundation, that the Cross was a government endorsement of religion, the city of Coos Bay has sought legal council on how it should respond. Coos Bay city manger Roger Craddock stated, earlier this month that the Liberty Inst., should be making it's recommendation to the City Council this month.

## Bomb Scare in Coos Bay

The 100 block of Hull St. in Coos Bay was evacuated Wednesday, June 12, after police officers responding to a Domestic Violence report "learned of a cache of firearms, ammunition, and improvised explosive devices."

According to a news release from the police department, the Oregon State Police Bomb Squad was summoned to the location, and disabled what police believe to be improvised explosive devices, while nearby residents were evacuated as a precaution.

Coos Bay Police Chief Gary McCullough said no suspects are in custody and KCBY TV is reporting that Neighbors identified Jay Yarbrough, as the occupant of the residence.

McCullough said police would obtain a search warrant to inspect the home, as their initial warrant only allowed them to enter the home and remove any explosive devices.

## FORMER OFFICER-PLEA

Ex-officer pleads guilty to steroid dealer tip-off

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — A former North Bend police officer has pleaded guilty in federal court to tipping off a distributor of illegal steroids about a federal investigation.

The Eugene Register-Guard reports that 43-year-old William Blair Downing was sentenced Tuesday to five years of probation as part of the plea bargain. He pleaded guilty to warning the distributor, as well as possessing steroids himself.

Downing quit the North Bend force in June 2011 on the day a search warrant was served at his home and he was interviewed by federal agents. He now lives in Florida.

## FATAL ARSON FIRE

2 dead, 1 man arrested after Coos Bay fires

COOS BAY, Ore. (AP) — At least two people are dead and a 65-year-old man is in custody following arson fires in two Coos Bay homes Saturday.

The Coos County district attorney's office says police arrested 65-year-old Edward Lawrence Nelson on suspicion of aggravated murder and first-degree arson after his home and a neighbor's house went up in flames Saturday. Nelson was arrested after being pulled over by Oregon State Police trooper in Douglas County.

The district attorney says a woman was found dead in Nelson's home and a fire was intentionally set at his residence.

Another fire set at a neighbor's home completely destroyed the residence.

## FATAL ARSON FIRE

Man accused of killing 3 in Coos Bay County

COOS BAY, Ore. (AP) — The Coos County district attorney <sup>HAS</sup> ~~says he plans to file~~ aggravated murder and arson charges ~~Monday~~ against a 65-year-old man accused of killing his wife and two neighbors and setting their homes on fire near the community of Bridge.

The district attorney's office says Edward Lawrence Nelson was stopped while driving Saturday night in Douglas County and jailed in connection with the fire and deaths.

The World reports all three victims are believed to have been killed before the fires were set Saturday evening.

The body of 59-year-old Kathleen Nelson was found in her home. Bodies found in the neighboring home could not be positively identified but they are believed to be Renae and Lola Cottam, both 73.

Police and firefighters found the bodies and indications fires were set.

### PRESS RELEASE

The Coos County Grand Jury has returned an indictment charging Edward Lawrence Nelson with six counts of aggravated murder and three counts of Arson in the First Degree. The arraignment on the indictment will be Tuesday, June 25, 2013 at 8:30 AM.

In addition, the autopsies on the bodies presumed to be Renae and Lola Cottam were completed this afternoon. Both autopsies showed that the individuals died as result of being shot with a firearm. Due to the condition of the bodies (the remains were extensively damaged by the fire in their home), a positive identification of the bodies was not possible. It is clear that one of the bodies is a male and that the other is a female. We hope that dental records will help identify at least one of the bodies. X-rays taken as part of the autopsy process will be compared with dental records of one body. X-rays of the other body do not contain sufficient evidence for a dental record comparison to be made. Additional tests, including DNA testing, will be done to establish the identification of each body. The investigators believe the circumstantial evidence in the case establishes that the bodies are those of Mr. and Mrs. Cottam. It may be several weeks before the testing will be complete.

Coos Bay man arrested in explosives probe

COQUILLE, Ore. (AP) — A 38-year-old has been arrested in a case that began earlier this month when a State Police bomb squad destroyed improvised explosive devices found in a Coos Bay home.

The World newspaper reports that Coos County sheriff's deputies arrested 38-year-old Jay Yarbrough near Powers, southeast of Coos Bay. He had been sought on explosives and other charges, including domestic assault.

Deputies said they'd learned he was camping on an island in the South Fork Coquille River.

The sheriff's office says 48-year-old Tina Rossback of Coos Bay also was arrested, accused of harboring a fugitive. They were booked after police pulled over a flatbed pickup truck on Sunday.

The devices came to the attention of Coos Bay officers June 12 as they were investigating a domestic violence report.

## Not Guilty Plea

Coos County Circuit Court Judge Richard Barron entered Not Guilty pleas for a 65-year old Bridge male Tuesday morning, June 25, in Coquille, who allegedly shot and killed his 59-year old wife and 73-year old neighbors Saturday, June 15 at two Big Creek homes. Edward L. Nelson, who is being held on a \$6 million bail, allegedly also set the houses on fire before fleeing the area. He was captured in a vehicle on Hwy. 42 south of Roseburg that evening. Nelson was earlier indicted by a Grand Jury on six-counts of Aggravated Murder and three-counts of Arson. His next court appearance has been set for August 12.

When contacted by the Officer, Partmann produced a knife and lunged toward the Officer. Partmann was tazed but subsequently fled into the bay after a foot chase over railroad and Menasha property.

A rescue boat was mobilized by the North Bend Fire Department and Partmann was eventually taken into custody by North Bend Police Officers with the assistance of the Oregon State Police, Coquille Tribal Police and North Bend Fire.

## BANDON SHOOTING

Man convicted in Ore. coastal killings

COQUILLE, Ore. (AP) — An Oregon man has been convicted of two counts of aggravated murder for fatally shooting the 19-year-old husband of his mother-in-law and her terminally ill former husband.

Circuit Court Judge Richard Barron found 43-year-old Timothy Henson guilty Thursday after a three-day, nonjury trial in Coquille (Ko-KEEL), Ore.

Henson was convicted of killing 70-year-old Milton Leach and George Micheaux III during a trip to the Oregon coast in September. Henson testified that he used methamphetamine during the trip and was feeling paranoid.

The judge sentenced him to life in prison. He'll have to serve 60 years before being eligible for parole.

## CIGARETTE TAXES

Ore. House votes to let counties tax tobacco

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — The Oregon House has narrowly voted to let counties tax cigarettes.

The 31-29 vote Thursday sends the measure to the Senate.

Tobacco taxes are currently the exclusive authority of the state.

Proponents say the bill would help struggling counties raise revenue while discouraging smoking. Critics say tobacco taxes are regressive because smokers tend to have lower incomes.

It's unclear how many counties would choose to tax tobacco products or what rate they would charge.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — State officials say Oregon's unemployment rate continues to inch down and was at 8.2 percent last month.

The State Employment Department said that's the lowest rate since October 2008. At that time, the economy was weakening significantly in the Great Recession, and Oregon's unemployment rate was 7.7 percent.

The department released its monthly report on jobs and employment Tuesday.

It said that at 8.2 percent, the current unemployment rate is a tenth of a percentage point lower than in February.

The report said Oregon added 1,900 jobs in March on a seasonally adjusted basis, a slower pace than in January and February.

The private sector added 2,700 jobs in March, while governments cut 800.

Ore. county confronts budget gap

COQUILLE, Ore. (AP) — Coos County, Ore., officials say there's a roughly \$3 million gap between expected resources for the coming fiscal year and proposed expenditures.

The World newspaper reports that members of the county budget committee plan to start work on closing that gap next week.

Proposed expenditures total \$22.9 million while the county expects \$19.8 million in revenue.

The county reportedly is running out of saved-up timber money.

Officials say cuts have already been made but more are needed.

Coos County total payroll employment rose by 20 jobs in April. Over the year, the county gained 60 jobs, with increases in the private sector somewhat offset by public sector declines. In April, manufacturing employment grew by 40 with an increase of 20 in both wood products and food manufacturing. Leisure and hospitality continued its typical seasonal hiring, up by 70 jobs over the month. Government employment shed 130 jobs over the month, most all of those in local government education.

Over the year, a number of private sector industries showed estimated employment increases. Those gain jobs include wood product manufacturing (+70), retail trade (+20), leisure and hospitality (+40), and food manufacturing (+40). Employment totals are below their year-before figures in mining and logging (-30), and educational and health services (-10). State government (-30), and Indian tribal local government (-50) both lost jobs in the past 12 months. Federal government gained 20 jobs over the year.

Curry County total payroll employment rose in April, up by 30 jobs. Leisure and hospitality (+40) and manufacturing, retail trade, and federal government each gained 10 jobs in April. Local government employment decreased by 30 jobs. Both professional and business services and financial activities lost 10 jobs over the month.

Over the year, total payroll employment grew by 120 jobs. Private sector gains totaling 200 jobs were offset by a decline of 80 government jobs. Sectors showing estimated job gains since April 2012 included construction (+50), wood products manufacturing (+40), professional and business services (+40), health care (+30), and leisure and hospitality (+70). On the other hand, job declines were estimated in retail trade (-50), and local government (-80).
