But not before about 49,000 General Motors employees go on strike just before midnight. Outside a GM auto assembly building in Detroit, a handful of picketers carried signs and chanted UAW. The United Auto Workers is the union that represents roughly 49,000 GM employees who've promised to strike. "The price of living is going up, everything is off our paychecks, so this strike is necessary." "These UAW members, not so long ago, helped save the company that many people didn't think would survive. They stood up for that company and now they want that company to stand up for them at the table." In a statement, GM says it offered to invest more than 7 billion dollars in factories in four states and create 5400 new position, with the majority to be filled by existing employees.

Details: Tens of thousands of General Motors workers are on strike, as the United Auto Workers union walked out at dozens of GM facilities. It is the largest work stoppage by any union against any American business since the last strike at GM in 2007, but the two sides are talking. The union says GM is putting profits ahead of its people, many of whom weathered the company's struggles in 2008 and 2009, Bankruptcy, and a government bailout. GM says it has made an offer that would boost worker pay and make a \$7 billion investment in preserving thousands of jobs, in addition to offering a "solution" for two plants slated for closure, one in Detroit, and one in Lordstown, Ohio. The union says saving jobs is key to the talks. Any deal between the union and GM will set the tone for upcoming contract conversations with Ford and Fiat Chrysler.

Harris disappeared on May 12, 2002. Six days later her body was found floating in the Red River. Police learned that she had told at least one other person she was pregnant. Neither was arrested or charged with any related crime. In 2017, Mark Johnson, the newly elected Fannin County Sheriff, made good on a campaign promise to re-open the case. What he found was limited information and damaged, destroyed or mishandled evidence. Daryl Parker, a former sheriff's lieutenant and Marine, now a private investigator, is working with the Harris family and with Barry Wernick, a filmmaker married to Harris' sister, Alyssa. These two men believe that their investigation will yield clues that will solve this case. Thanks to the Abel family's lobbying efforts, in 1994, Congress passed a law which allows the U.S. prosecution of U.S. nationals who kill other Americans in foreign countries. Also, a family history of suicide was made known. Ultimately the reliability of many witnesses was put in doubt by the defense. The jurors quickly decided the verdict: not guilty. Two jurors agreed to speak and explain their verdict. They are adamant they made the correct decision. Ashley's parents maintain their daughter did not commit suicide. County commissioner Randy Fairbanks was one of the first to call Sheriff's deputies after the explosions that rocked his home, a couple of hundred yards from where they were being set off in this neighborhood. "Somebody's shooting some stuff, and they said we've had another call and they said so we're coming out to check it out." Deputies came out and talked with the man at 10,100 Rolling Wind Drive. They found out the substance was legal to detonate in the State. Neighbors say the man who asked not to be identified did it twice; the first was a gender reveal party last September--the second on July 4th. Steve Langley wants it stopped. He told the county commission and us that his home had been damaged. "The house was shaking, cracked this window here, and Window World had to come out and replace it." Langley's neighbor Susanne Hayes is taking care of her Viet-Nam veteran husband who has cancer and is under hospice care. "He said, 'Is the, are we, is the Vietnam war going on? Are we still in the war?' So, you know, he had flashbacks - so like I said, it was a scary time." **ANGLEY:** "When the explosion takes place, the shock waves are coming right down the side of the hill, right at our homes. And, my neighbors across the street, uh, I think the people across the street had some dishes damaged where they fell off and different things, so we are suffering damage to our homes." Langley contacted Representative Robin Smith who said today that she is looking into the legal use of Tannerite and may bring it up in the legislature. Sheriff Jim Hammond told the commission it's something that's going to become a widespread problem if something isn't done. The exploding target material can be purchased legally in sporting goods stores.

Crews have been working all day to repair the break, but the work is taking even longer than Tennessee American Water had expected. Around 10 pm Thursday night, Tennessee American Crews were working on a planned project at the main plant off Amnicola Highway. A water main break occurred in a 1960's era, 36 inch pipe near where they were working. Because such a large volume of water goes through that pipe, up to 35,000 customers were affected. This morning, a prediction of 12 hours for much of the low lying areas of downtown to have service restored was made, but the repairs are taking longer than anticipated. This water boiling advisory is only for Tennessee American Water customers, and only out of an abundance of caution, since she says bacteria may form in the water if it's sitting stagnant for too long. Amy Maxwell with the Hamilton County Emergency Management Agency, says water is being delivered to community centers, hospitals, and the jail. Daphne Kirksey, with Tennessee American Water, explains why. Operations at the jail continue to be as normal, we are providing water and also the portable toilets, for the inmates as well. We also have fire trucks that are there to help assist with the water efforts as well." 18 Fire Department Tankers are helping with fire suppression and water supply for local businesses and hospitals. 8 surrounding counties and all local volunteer fire departments were all assisting in the effort.

Rick Boatwright/Deputy Chief of Operations "Making sure you are discarding smoking materials in the proper containers. Notifying the fire department quickly so we can get a handle on the brush fire in a quick manner that way we don't have things or fires spread such as the Gatlinburg incident." Not all brush fires come from people's mistakes. Rick Boatwright/ Deputy Chief of Operations "some of them are unintentional, power lines being down if we get windstorms. Most of our fires are of that nature." Right now, Hamilton County has a burn ban that ends September 30th. Patrick Core/Chief Meteorologist "people are more apt to spend more time outdoors and more apt to try to build those little campfires and that's where we have a lot of problems." But you need to be aware of what you are doing at all times and properly putting out fires when finished.
