Kim shares about how StandUp for Kids Thurston County operates four core programs: Street Outreach, a Drop-In Outreach Center which offers respite and connects kids to different programs, Mentoring programs and Housing programs to help get kids off living on the streets. Teen homeless rates are on the rise in Thurston County especially after the pandemic. Kim talks about the different things kids are exposed to while living on the streets, how difficult it is to live on the streets and how difficult it can be for kids to ask for help. If someone needs help, StandUp for Kids Thurston County offers their programs for free. Donated space is needed for kids to come in and get off the street for the evening such as churches, classrooms etc. Volunteers are needed to help serve on the streets by passing out supplies and helping connect kids to local services.
