The teenager accused of killing and molesting six year-old Grace Ross in 2021 has been sentenced to 55 years for her murder.

Court documents say Anthony Hutchens was also sentenced to nine years on the charge of child molesting, which will be served consecutively.

Hutchens was sentenced under the alternative juvenile statute allowing the judge to reevaluate before he turns 18.

Sgt. Ted Bohner (Bonner) of the State Police tells ABC 57 News that most Hoosiers aren't aware of the law, and that creates dangerous situations for police every day.

The move over law states that if you encounter police, fire or ambulances on the side of the road you should change lanes and slow down.

It also applies to highway maintenance vehicles, tow truck and garbage trucks.

PEN America says in the last nine months, 41-percent of the book bans in the U-S have been connected to directives from state officials or elected lawmakers.

Summary: This radio station aired a news story to inform the public about hospitals in Indiana loosing money.

Hospitals are still in bad shape, says the president of the Indiana Hospital Association.

"We had a net loss at all the hospitals combined in the state of Indiana for 2022," said Brian Tabor on Indy Politics. "They lost money as a system and will probably lose more money in 2023."

The reason Indiana's hospitals are running lower on funds than usual is a variety of factors, and he said it starts with the state legislature. He is urging them against passing a bill being considered now that would place a defacto price cap on certain hospital costs.

Tabor said that could cripple hospitals even more and in effect "squeeze the balloon" even tighter. "The cap is set at a number that proponents will say represents some type of national average. It doesn't," Tabor said. "It unfairly represents Indiana. If it were to pass into law it would have devastating consequences."

Tabor said that he is on board with lowering costs that Hoosiers with commercial insurance pay at hospitals. But, capping costs is not the right way to go about it. Tabor said to do that you have to go to the source, which he says is Medicaid. "We have an incredibly under-funded Medicaid program in Indiana when it comes to Medicaid rates," Tabor said. "The Medicaid program pays 53-cents on the dollar of costs."

He said that means the hospital has to cover that left over 47-cents on the dollar, and the only way to do that is to pass those costs on to patients with commercial insurance or those not on Medicaid. He said if that cost shift is reduced, Hoosiers will see healthcare costs decrease.

The teen showed up at Elkhart General Hospital with a non life-threatening gunshot wound.

Program/Segment Title: News Story –Congressman Yakym Introduces Balanced Budget Amendment

Broadcast Date: April 19, 2023

Summary: This radio station aired a news story to inform the public about a new budget for the second district.

Second District Congressman Rudy Yakym introduced a Balanced Budget Amendment to the United States Constitution, the first legislation he has authored as a Member of Congress.

Prior to introducing the Balanced Budget Amendment, Congressman Yakym spoke on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives in support of his legislation and the need to get our nation's fiscal house in order.

Balanced Budget Amendment Provisions:

Total outlays for any fiscal year shall not exceed total receipts, unless three-fifths of Congress approves in a roll call vote. A debt limit increase requires a three-fifths roll call vote in Congress. Before each fiscal year, the President must transmit a budget to Congress in which total outlays do not exceed total receipts. Bills to increase revenue must be approved by a majority of Congress in a roll call vote. Congress may waive the aforementioned requirements if a declaration of war is in effect or if Congress declares that the U.S. is engaged in military conflict that causes an imminent and serious military threat to national security; national security waivers must specifically lay out the budgetary increases made necessary by the conflict. Congress will enforce the amendment and may rely on estimates of outlays and receipts. Total receipts is defined as all receipts except those derived from borrowing; total outlays is defined as all outlays of the U.S. government except for those for debt principal repayment. The amendment takes effect in the fifth fiscal year after its ratification.

During the pandemic, many people filed for unemployment if they ended up either losing their job or were told to stay home due to pandemic shutdowns. For many, this was an option to get by, but for more nefarious characters it was another opportunity for fraud.

Three years removed from the height of the pandemic, lawmakers are concerned that unemployment fraud has been getting further and further out of hand, especially in cases where people are knowingly being overpaid unemployment relief money.

“The Department of Labor’s inspector general pegs pandemic-era unemployment insurance fraud at \$191 billion, though other experts say it could run as high as \$400 billion. These are staggering numbers,” said Rep. Rudy Yakim (R-IN-2nd). Yakim spoke in favor of HR 1163 on Friday which is a bill he is co-sponsoring. The bill provides incentives for states to investigate claims of unemployment fraud with more rigor in order to catch those trying to cheat the government out of taxpayer money. Part of the bill includes provisions that would allow states to keep up to 25-percent of recovered overpayments.

Opponents of the bill, including many Democrats, also include the non-partisan Center on Budget and Policy Priorities. The organization says HR 1163 would actually do more harm than good in tracking down people who are committing unemployment fraud.

The CBPP is concerned the bill will further scrutinize Americans who have been unknowingly receiving overpayments but have not been engaging in fraud. They also don’t like that it allows states to hire private contractors to investigate claims of fraud instead of using public employees.

The bill passed the House on a mostly party-line vote. Only 10 Democrats joined every Republican in the House in voting to pass the measure. The partisan passage points to an uncertain future for the bill in the U.S. Senate.

U.S. 31 was chosen because a large volume of drivers use the roadway to travel through the heart of northern Indiana.

From June 20 through June 22, officers teamed up to make 54 criminal arrests on 174 mostly drug-related charges. More than two dozen of the charges were felonies.

Officers also issued 60 traffic citations and 215 written warnings. There was also one driving while impaired arrest.

During the three days, officers located cocaine, LSD, methamphetamine, heroin, marijuana, psilocybin mushrooms, edible marijuana food, MDMA, THC oil, ketamine, prescription medications, and drug paraphernalia.
