

KFSN-TV QUARTERLY ISSUES/PROGRAMS REPORT
3rd QUARTER 2012

From July 1, 2012, through and including September 30, 2012, KFSN-TV, Licensed In Fresno, California; broadcasts in Digital/HD, presented 38.5 hours of regularly scheduled Local News Programs a week, and in addition, broadcasts a Bi-Monthly Half-Hour Public Affairs Program entitled "Valley Focus." This program is hosted by Action News Anchor Margot Kim, and is a Local Talk/Interview Program dealing exclusively with Issues and Local Affairs. KFSN also produces a Bi-Monthly half-hour program entitled "Latino Life" hosted by Action News Anchor Graciela Moreno, a Talk Interview Program that focuses on issues affecting the Latino community. It also highlights positive contributions Latinos are making in the valley. KFSN-TV airs syndication programming that includes Children's Core Programming as describe in the Children's 398 Report which is filed separately in The Public Inspection File. The ABC Television Network supplies the station with News and Public Interest, as described in the Quarter Report entitled: ABC Television Network News and Public Affairs Programming, which is also filed separately in the Public Inspection File.

On 30.2/30.3 ABC30's sub-channels, KFSN broadcasts the Live Well Network that consists of programs entitled Motion, Mirror, Mirror, Let's Dish, Home with Lisa Quinn, Mexico: One Plate at a Time, Deals, and My Family Recipe Rocks along with others. KFSN-TV's D2/Live Well Network HD Signal carries Public Service Announcements and Children's Core Programming as described in the Children's 398 Report. KFSN-TV's D3 Signal simulcasts the Live Well Network in SD.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 6PM, 7/02/2012, :51 SEC, LOCAL

This story covers the Fresno City leaders that are standing strong behind the idea that they won't extend union contracts to help balance the budget. The Fresno Police Officers' Association asked for a one-year extension on their contract with the City. In exchange, they offered cuts to their salaries and benefits totaling more than four million dollars this year; but City leaders say the contract extension is more expensive in the long run. City leaders could possibly impose their own terms on the police union when the contract expires in 2015.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 11PM 7/02/2012, :53 SEC., LOCAL

The City of Fresno is talking trash with residents hoping it will help fill a four-million dollar budget shortfall. Mayor Swarengin unveiled the budget proposal last week and while the City Council approved it, they still have to vote on whether to privatize residential trash pickup. During a meeting at City Hall tonight, residents shared their concerns regarding increased fees and quality of service. But Swarengin insists those issues will be addressed and that the move will save the City two and a half million dollars year. The Mayor says between sixty and seventy City workers would be affected but they will likely be hired to work for private companies.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 5PM, 7/03/2012, :28 SEC., LOCAL

The Fitch Ratings Company has downgraded the City of Fresno's credit rating. The move affects the City's General Obligation Bond rating which was cut from an "A" to an "A minus". Fitch also revised Fresno's rating outlook from "stable" to "negative". The downgrade means the City will have more difficult time borrowing money and the money it does borrow will be at a higher interest rate. Experts say a key ratings driver is the City's failure to balance the budget and a lack of financial reserves.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 4PM, 7/05/2012, :40 SEC., LOCAL

The Madera City Council is expected to vote on a budget which could result in layoffs. The initial proposed budget called for 22 layoffs and eliminating seven vacant positions. The cuts could impact several departments, including the parks and community services department. No police or firefighter positions are on the line, but some support staff positions at the police department could be eliminated. During a budget workshop last month, City Council members asked staff for more options to avoid the layoffs. Tonight's meeting begins at 6:30 at Madera City Hall. Action News will be at the meeting and have an update tonight at 11.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 11PM, 7/05/2012, :43 SEC., LOCAL

This heat has forced people to find ways to cool off and soon, kids in Fresno's Pinedale neighborhood will have another option: a public pool. Plans are underway to reopen the swimming pool at Pinedale's Community Center. Budget cuts have kept it empty since 2009. Earlier today an anonymous donor dropped off a check at City Hall for more than \$7,000. That's enough to keep the pool open all summer long. City workers will start filling the pool with water as soon as Friday. They hope to have it open by Monday.

Supporters of a ballot measure that would require labeling of genetically altered food are anxiously awaiting their proposition number. They say as soon as they get their number and order on the November ballot they are going to hit the ground running, promoting their initiative to label all genetically modified foods in California. Many foods that contain soy, corn, sugar beets, canola oil, and cotton seed oil are genetically modified. But there are no labeling laws at the moment and so it's nearly impossible to tell if your food has genetically altered ingredients or not. Studies have linked genetically modified food to allergies, organ failure, and fertility problems.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/17/2012, 2:21 MIN., LOCAL

A north valley sheriff is featured in the Governor's sales tax hike campaign. Merced County Sheriff Mark Pazin is a registered Republican, and serves as president of the California State Sheriff's Association. Back in April he says the group voted to support proposition 30 fearing without it public safety will continue to deteriorate. According to the governor, if approved the initiative would secure more funding for public agencies by raising the state sales tax and income taxes on California's highest earners. But, opponents say it could backfire and force large companies to take their business elsewhere. The governor estimates proposition 30 will bring in nine-billion dollars in revenue. The online campaign will eventually progress into TV and radio ads. Opponents of the initiative say they too will be just as aggressive with their campaign

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 5PM, 7/18/2012, :43 SEC., LOCAL

The University of California's board of regents endorsed Governor Jerry Brown's tax increase proposal today and agreed to freeze undergraduate tuition--for now. The board met in San Francisco today for one of its annual meetings. Last September, the board voted to increase student tuition. Full-time college undergraduates now spend more than 12-thousand dollars a year on education. The current proposal would freeze undergraduate tuition. But some graduate school programs may still see an increase of up to 35-percent. Governor Brown also promised to freeze tuition rates if voters pass proposition 30 which is a temporary tax increase. But if the ballot measure fails, the regents warned they will rise cost mid-year by up to 20-percent.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/19/2012, :43 SEC., LOCAL

Getting on and off Highway 99 in northwest Fresno will eventually be easier. Plans for the Veteran's Boulevard Diagonal are moving forward. The three mile route would run from Grantland and Shaw northeast to Herndon and Polk with an interchange with Highway 99. The Fresno City Council today approved plans and agreements to get the project started. Assistant public works director Scott Mozier says once completed it will ease. With the City approval, Cal-trans now takes over the project. It is expected to take six years to complete at a cost of one hundred ten million dollars.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 5PM, 7/25/2012, :35 SEC., LOCAL

During a special meeting, the Madera City Council will consider cutting dozens of City jobs including some positions at the police department. Council members are considering a budget that calls for cutting 29 total positions, including 22 layoffs. The City administrator says a lack of state funding and the fragile economy are to blame. The proposed cuts could make service slower at City Hall and impact the parks and community services department. no police officer or firefighter jobs are on the

line. But support staff positions face potential cut. The meeting takes place tonight at six at Madera City Hall.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/27/2012, :51 SEC, LOCAL

The Fresno City Council was not able to talk trash at yesterday's meeting. Council members were expected to vote on whether to accept a report showing the benefits of selling the City's home garbage pick-up service to private companies. But Council Member Larry Westerlund was absent, leaving supporters of the plan without enough votes to pass it. Marina Magdelano represents the City workers who now pick up the trash. She sees what happened as another stalling tactic. The City Council is now set to consider the consultant's report on August 16th. They will also decide whether to pay the consultant two hundred thousand dollars for his work.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 5PM, 7/31/2012, :34 SEC., LOCAL

Governor Jerry Brown's November ballot initiative to raise taxes has already collected more than six-million dollars. The campaign reported today that it received six-point-three million dollars in the first half of the year with five million dollars in cash hand at the end of June. Brown's Proposition 30 would raise the state sales tax and income taxes on California's highest earners as a way to help balance the budget.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/2/2012, 2:27 MIN., LOCAL

The plan is to build high speed rail in between Highway 99 and the existing train tracks. But right now, they're too close together along that two and a half mile stretch; so rail officials say the highway has to move. The high speed rail authority CEO tells Action News the planning process for moving Highway 99 will start in the next three to six months, and construction should be underway within the next two years.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 4PM, 8/1/2012, :23 SEC., LOCAL

Supporters of Proposition 8, California's ban on same-sex marriage, have filed a petition for the Supreme Court to uphold the law. The petition asks the nation's highest court to overturn lower court rulings that declared the ban unconstitutional. Supporters say the voter approved law helps protect traditional marriage in America but opponents say it discriminates against same-sex couples.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE 8/9/2012, :25 SEC., LOCAL

President Obama and Mitt Romney are both campaigning hard this week as they prepare for the November election. This morning President Obama begins day two of his campaign swing of Colorado. The "vision to restore middle-class economic security" tour kicked off yesterday in Denver where the president blamed Republicans for the great recession. He also accused them of undermining women's reproductive health by fighting his health care reform bill.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 4PM, 8/9/2012,:43 SEC., LOCAL

The Visalia City Council is scheduled to vote this afternoon on whether to raise the City's sales tax. If the item is approved an initiative will be placed on the November ballot allowing Visalia voters to decide whether to raise the tax from eight percent to eight-point five percent. City officials say even after years of layoffs and cost-reduction measures. Services and the quality of life for City residents may be affected unless the City can increase revenues. They expect that a half-cent sales tax increase would raise ten million dollars in the first year. Tonight's vote will be held at the Council Meeting at City Hall at 5 o'clock. The deadline to file to put the sales tax initiative on the November ballot is tomorrow.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 11PM, 8/11/2012, 1:01 MINL, LOCAL

Mitt Romney appeared with his Vice Presidential pick Paul Ryan in North Carolina today. The two stepped off the plane with big smiles and waves to crowd. Their children and other family members surrounded them as they got on the tarmac. Mitt Romney shook hands and chit-chat but when Romney announced his VP choice this morning, he said he picked Ryan because of his core beliefs and fiscal conservatism.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 11PM, 8/11/2012, :33 SEC., LOCAL

President Obama was in Chicago today raising money for his campaign. He landed in his hometown late this afternoon for a series of five high-dollar fundraisers. One of them was held in his own home at a ticket price of 40 thousand dollars a person. The Obama campaign announced on twitter earlier this week that the president's re-election effort raised 75-million dollars last month. That was far behind Republican rival Mitt Romney's fundraising haul of more than 101-million dollars. This is the third month in a row President Obama has raised less money than Mitt Romney in fundraising.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT FIVE, 8/13/2012, :56 SEC., LOCAL

The dates are set for three presidential debates this fall and for the first time in 20 years, one of the moderators will be a woman. CNN political correspondent Candy Crowley will question President Obama and his Republican opponent Mitt Romney in October. This is one of three debates before the November sixth general election. Crowley will be the first female moderator of a presidential debate since ABC's Carole Simpson in 1992.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 8/14/2012, 2:00 MIN., LOCAL

Each side seems to be taking the divide and conquer approach. Each candidate is in a different state - those states among those likely to determine the outcome of the election. With less than three months until Election Day, the presidential campaign is preceding full speed ahead. President Obama and Mitt Romney both continue bus tours in key swing states -- Romney in Ohio and Obama in Iowa.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 8/14/2012, :32 SEC., LOCAL

North valley Congressman Dennis Cardoza has resigned. Action News has learned Cardoza, who represents Merced in Congress, has tendered his immediate resignation from the House of Representatives. His resignation takes effect at midnight Wednesday. Cardoza says sensitive family needs are motivating his resignation. Last year, Cardoza announced he would not run for re-election, so he's leaving Congress just a few months before his planned retirement.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 6PM, 8/16/2012, 1:30 MIN., LOCAL

Council members are talking about essentially selling off solid waste pick up from homes all across Fresno. They will vote on spending 200-thousand dollars for a feasibility study to move forward in that plan. The City is expecting this proposal to bring in about 2 and half million dollars each year. That money would come by way of franchise fees paid to the City by the private companies that take up the garbage pickup.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 6PM, 8/16/2012, :30 SEC., LOCAL

Also this afternoon at City Hall the Fresno City Council has cleared the way for expansion at Fresno's downtown card room. The City Council has okayed Club One Casino's request to add more gaming tables. The casino wants to add two more card tables, but casino consultant mike dates says the plan is to get even bigger. The casino will be authorized to have 51 tables. Dages says the club one is looking for another building downtown to get even bigger. Club One currently pays the City nearly one and a half million dollars a year in fees.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 8/23/2012, 1:50 SEC., LOCAL

There's the argument that downtown is already getting too much help, and also, that money voters assumed would go for streets and buses is going to help developers. But the majority of the Council agreed downtown is a transportation hub, worthy of help. Increasing residential development in

downtown Fresno, putting more people in one place, and reducing urban sprawl is seen as one way to improve the region's transportation problems. That's why the committee that oversees the Measure C sales tax funds agreed to make seven hundred thousand dollars available to encourage downtown growth.

Action News has learned Republican Vice Presidential Candidate Paul Ryan will visit the central valley next month. Ryan is scheduled to attend a one thousand dollar per person dinner at the Fresno Convention Center on September eighth.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 5PM, 8/28/2012, 1:53 MIN., LOCAL

City and County leaders say they're disappointed. The SPCA today said they made the decision not to extend the contract because they don't like the direction the City and County are taking when it comes to stray animals. They believe there's an ordinance change concerning strays and are under the assumption they will no longer be picked up. But County and City leaders say there was no ordinance change and they were working with expert consultants to find another option for animals.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT FIVE, 8/27/2012, :32 SEC., LOCAL

The debate over labeling genetically modified foods will play out this fall when California voters go to the polls. Proposition 37 would require new food labels on products that are genetically engineered foods as they are also called are those with changes made to their DNA through genetic engineering. Supporters say Californians have the right to know what's in their food and that the long term effects are still unknown. But opponents say the bill is misleading and sets itself up for frivolous lawsuits. They also say the new law would drive up the costs of food.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 5PM 8/30/2012, 1:00 MIN., LOCAL

Fresno City leaders are encouraging valley drivers to take the "No Text Pledge". The Fresno police department is teaming up with AT&T to combat texting and driving on valley roads. A representative from the telecommunications company explained details of a new campaign at City Hall this morning, to encourage more people to keep their phones down while they're behind the wheel. At today's meeting, they shared statistics on teen texting and driving. They say about 90 percent of teenagers reply within five minutes and texting and driving puts a person at 23 times the risk of an accident.

AM LIVE SATURDAY, 8/25/2012, :16 SEC., LOCAL

A quarter of registered voters have not made up their minds about who they will be voting for this November. That's according to a new AP poll out this morning. The poll also shows only 29-percent of those voters are interested in the campaign. That's compared with 51-percent of those who have already made up their minds. Undecided voters are expected to be key for either candidate to win the election.

ACTION NEWS LIVE AT 6PM, 8/27/2012, :30 SEC., LOCAL

While lawmakers vote on a flurry of bills to beat the Friday deadline, one proposal still remains unwritten: the long-promised overhaul of public pensions. apartment complex near the university, where Fresno police say he lives. 18-year-old Ernest Young was arrested along with a 15-year-old.

Teens who engage in distracted and dangerous driving most likely learned their bad driving skills from their parents. A report from Liberty Mutual Insurance shows the majority of more than 17-hundred teens surveyed admitted to making poor decisions while behind the wheel. Nine out of ten said they talked on their cell phone while driving and 94-percent admitted to speeding. The survey also found a majority of surveyed teens said they got their bad habits from their mother and father. A driving safety expert said even occasionally answering your phone during a drive could influence your kids to do the same.

Doctors are issuing a new warning to parents this morning about trampolines for kids. The American Academy Of Pediatrics released an updated policy saying trampolines are too dangerous for children to use. The report cites nearly 100-thousand trampoline-related injuries in 2009. They say kids under the age of 5 are at greater risk of severe injury. Almost half of injuries in children resulted in fracture. They also found that safety netting and padding did not change the amount of injuries.

Valley wide, eleven people have been infected with the virus and there are 44 human cases around the state, compared to 27 at this time last year.

The tentative agreement calls for no salary increases but with opportunities to re-open salary and benefits over the next couple of years. It's also the only place in the Valley where childhood cancer survivors can seek help for long-term effects that often come with treatment.

It costs \$1 million a day to run this non-profit hospital, which turns 60 this year.
