Steveson gave an overview of where the country stood as a whole prior to the 1973 US Supreme Court decision on abortion and the stance of the nation following that decision. Since that decision, abortions have seen an annual increase over 100%; estimates put the number of abortions at 1.6 million yearly. More than 12 million abortions have been performed in the United States since 1973; and more than ¼ of USA pregnancies end in abortion now. Steveson discussed the acceptance of abortion, the sanitization of the process, and the decrease of compassion toward unborn children. Taking a biblical point of view, Steveson pointed out the Scriptures that teach us God's perspective on unborn children, murder, and the value of every life. Recognizing that unplanned pregnancies do occur, Steveson encouraged Christian women and young ladies to arm themselves with knowledge and understanding, settling in their own hearts and minds the choice they will make if they are

Besides speaking up against abortion, listeners can also support the Hatch Attachment to the Constitution, which declares that no life can be taken without due process and that life begins at conception.

Briefly they are as follows: 1) Crises are no respecter of persons so do not get bitter in your crises and do not fall victim to the thought that others have not suffered as much as you. 2) Crises call us to rethink our purpose, which is to serve the Lord and not ourselves. 3) Crises call us to reevaluate our priorities, which are God, marriage, family, and friends, not stuff and things. 4) Crises call us to live by principle rather than by feelings; we must never toss out the sacred in time of multiple crises, but cling to the sacred. Summing up, Fugate warned listeners that the best time to prepare for a storm of crises is before the time of any crises because the storm is what reveals the strength of the house.
