July 2, 2017

Marc Short on implementing President Trump's agenda. President Trump's director of legislative affairs talks health care reform, reinstate the travel ban.

Sen. Rand Paul on push to repeal then replace ObamaCare. While President Trump fights to fulfill a major campaign promise, repealing and replacing ObamaCare, the administration scored victories this week on immigration and upholding the travel ban.

Moderates key to health care reform? Sen. Manchin weighs in, Democratic Senator from West Virginia on chances of a bipartisan deal on health care reform.

Senate Republicans have yet to bring their ObamaCare replacement to the floor for vote. Some suggesting separating repeal and replacement as two different bills.

Well, now, a group of senators is calling on Leader McConnell to shorten or altogether cancel the upcoming August recess in order to make meaningful progress on several legislative issues including health care.

Joining us now to discuss the administration's agenda, President Trump's director of legislative affairs, Marc Short. And we should point out that this is Marc Short's very first appearance on any Sunday show.

So, we are glad to have you here.

MARC SHORT, WHITE HOUSE LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIRECTOR: Thanks for having me.

ROBERTS: You are the man who is tasked with being the foot soldier between the White House and Congress in terms of getting the president's agenda through, where are we really with health care?

SHORT: Look, John, we're getting close. The American people know that ObamaCare is failing. They know that insurance rates have continued to skyrocket. They know that insurers are fleeing markets. And last year alone, 83 insurers have left the market. People know that this is a dramatic situation.

SHORT: It's a crisis. Where we are is the president this weekend is continuing to make calls to members to try to get the Senate package across the finish line. We believe that our package will help to lower premium cost, help provide better quality care for patients and returns the relationship between the patient and his or her doctor without the government being in the middle.

ROBERTS: So, when you say we're getting, how close are you?

SHORT: Well, look, we've gone through a long process in the House and got it completed and passed in the House. We now are in the Senate where there's been obviously a lot of procedural delays in this process. We are at the point of scoring two separate bills throughout the course of this recess this week. So, we hope that we come back the week after recess, we'll have a vote.

ROBERTS: Let's talk about these two bills, because you mentioned this to me earlier in the week. You've got two different bills, variations on the same theme that are going to go to Congressional Budget Office for scoring. What's in those bills?

SHORT: Well, so, what's in the bill is that it will help to get rid of the individual mandate. It will get rid of taxes to make this easier on the American people. One thing that raises rates so much, John, that's really less understood in America is when you're on individual exchanges. The mandates the federal government puts on are so ridiculous that men are forced to carry coverage for mammograms, women are forced to carry coverage for prostate issues it's absurd. And the American people know this. We're going to get rid of many of those regulations and mandates to lower cost.

ROBERTS: What's the difference between the two bills that are going to go (INAUDIBLE)?

SHORT: One has an amendment, that's called the Consumer Freedom Act that Senator Cruz and Senator Lee have offered that will help continue to reduce those regulations. And one is being scored without.

But let's talk about the CBO scoring for a second, because CBO scoring has indicated when they initially scored ObamaCare that 25 million people will be on the ObamaCare exchanges. In fact, there are only 10 million. So, when the press reports that 22 million people are going to lose coverage, it's a ridiculous number. Of that 22 million, seven million --

ROBERTS: But the press has only reported what the CBO says.

July 9, 2017

Reince Priebus breaks down Trump's trip to the G-20 summit. President Trump is back in Washington after his first meeting with Vladimir Putin. What should we look for in relations between the U.S. and Russia? We look forward to a lot of very positive things happening for Russia and the United States and for everybody concerned.

Sen. Cassidy on chances of the GOP repeal and replace ObamaCare. While President Trump fights to fulfill a major campaign promise, repealing and replacing ObamaCare, the administration scored victories this week on immigration and upholding the travel ban.

President Trump is back at the White House after the G-20 summit where he seemed to get along better with Russian President Putin than some of our long-time European allies. So, where do we stand now on foreign hot spots, trade, and climate change? And what about a newly disclosed meeting in 2016 between the president's son, Trump campaign officials, and a Russian lawyer?

In a few minutes, we'll break it all down with an exclusive interview with the White House chief of staff, Reince Priebus.

But, first, let's bring in correspondent Kevin Corke at the White House with the latest -- Kevin.

KEVIN CORKE, FOX NEWS CORRESPONDENT: Chris, no matter how far away the president travels from Washington, for example, the 4,000 miles to Hamburg, Germany, this White House is never terribly far away from the Russian meddling story, it was one of the topics heading into the G-20 and it is again coming out of the G-20.

The president talking about it and tweeting about it once again, this time talk about his meeting with President Vladimir Putin. He tweeted, I strongly pressed President Putin twice about Russian meddling in our election he vehemently denied it. I've already given my opinion.

Later, the President tweeting on Sunday: Putin and I discussed forming an impenetrable cybersecurity unit so that election hacking and many other negative things will be guarded.

This as FOX News confirms that Donald Trump, Jr., arranged a meeting at Trump Tower during the campaign with a Russian lawyer with connections to the Kremlin. That meeting he failed to disclose on his federal paperwork but had been noted by other attendees including Jared Kushner and Paul Manafort. We also heard from the Trump legal team that the person who took part in that meeting may have misrepresented herself and who she worked for and may, in fact, have had ties with DNC operatives, very interesting twist in that story.

July 16, 2017

Sekulow defends Don Trump Jr.'s meeting with Russian lawyer.

New revelations about a meeting between Trump family members and Russian operatives shake Washington, just as the Senate gets ready for a make-or-break vote on health care.

Donald Trump, President of The United States: My son is a wonderful young man. He took a meeting with a Russian lawyer. Most people would've taken that meeting.

Rep. Nancy Pelosi, D-CA, Minority leader: That's just an arrogant disregard for what is ethical.

WALLACE (voice-over): We'll discuss how Donald Jr.'s meeting affects the potential case against the president with Jay Sekulow, a member of the Trump legal team.

Then, Republicans make changes to their health care bill, but some in the party say it's still not enough.

Senator Rand Paul on whether he can support health care reform. Does revised efforts go far enough to repeal & replace OamaCare.

First, some breaking news: Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has put off that big health care about this week while Senator John McCain recovers from surgery to remove a blood clot

from above his left eye. We'll have much more on the effort to repeal and replace ObamaCare a little later.

First, our top story. For months, Donald Trump and his team have tried to put questions about links to Russian interference in the election behind them. But that is now much tougher with a stream of revelations about a meeting Donald Trump, Jr., and other campaign officials held with Russian operatives last summer, expecting to get damaging information about Hillary Clinton.

How does this affect the credibility of the Trump White House? And what does it mean for at least four investigations into possible collisions?

Joining me now is Jay Sekulow, a member of the president's legal team.

Jay, since the story first broke about possible links between the Trump campaign and Russia, the president and his team have repeatedly dismissed this as a hoax and fake news. Here are a few examples.

DONALD TRUMP, JR., son OF PRESIDENT TRUMP: It's disgusting, it's so phony. That exactly goes to show you what the DNC and what the Clinton camp will do. They will lie and do anything to win.

PRESIDENT TRUMP: I have nothing to do with Russia, and even -- for anything. What do I have to do with Russia?

WALLACE: Was there any contact in any way between Trump or his associates and the Kremlin or cutouts they had?

MIKE PENCE, VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATE: Of course not. Why would there be any contacts between the campaign.

PRESIDENT TRUMP: The entire thing has been a witch hunt and there is no collusion between certainly myself and my campaign. But I can only speak for myself and the Russians, zero.

July 23, 2017

Scaramucci talks Trump's agenda, relationship with the press.

CHRIS WALLACE, "FOX NEWS SUNDAY" HOST: I'm Chris Wallace.

A shakeup inside the White House. Six months in, where does the Trump agenda stand and will it be overwhelmed by the Russia investigation?

ANTHONY SCARAMUCCI, WHITE HOUSE COMMUNICATIONS DIRECTOR: I think we're going to get the health care done. I also think we're going to get tax reform done. And whatever else is on the president's agenda, we're going to work very, very hard, very studiously here to make it happen.

WALLACE: We'll discuss the president's plans and his ongoing relationship with the media with the new White House communications director Anthony Scaramucci.

Then special counsel Robert Mueller expands his investigation, looking into possible Russian ties to Trump businesses -- as the president criticizes his attorney general and warns the investigators.

KELLYANNE CONWAY, COUNSELOR TO THE PRESIDENT: Let's go back to what the purpose of the investigation was -- Russian interference in our election.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: Sessions should have never recused himself.

JEFF SESSIONS, U.S. ATTORNEY GENERAL: I have the honor of serving as attorney general and I plan to continue to do so as long as that is appropriate.

WALLACE: We'll discuss the latest developments on Russia with Republican Senator John Thune and Democratic Senator Ben Cardin.

Plus, the president's legislative goals are stalled as repeal and replace creates a logjam in Congress.

We'll ask our Sunday panel if Senate Republicans can bring their health care bill back from the dead.

July 30, 2017

Conway on White House operations, health care reform.

Tough times for President Trump, with a stunning defeat on a top legislative initiative and another shakeup of the White House staff.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: Reince is a good man. John Kelly will do a fantastic job.

WALLACE: We'll discuss the president's decision to replace Reince Priebus as chief of staff with retired General John Kelly, when we sit down for an exclusive interview with counselor to the president, Kellyanne Conway.

Then, with the collapse of Republican efforts to repeal and replace ObamaCare, what happens now?

SEN. MITCH MCCONNELL, R-KY, MAJORITY LEADER: It's time for our friends on the other side to tell us what they have in mind.

WALLACE: We'll discuss the possibility for bipartisan compromise and what the other side is willing to give with House Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi.

And with dysfunction in the nation's capital, the worse it's been in years, we'll get a view from outside the beltway, when we talk with Republican Governor John Kasich of Ohio. Conway, Pelosi and Kasich, only on "Fox News Sunday."

Plus, explosive obscene comments by the new White House communications chief shake Washington. We'll ask our Sunday panel whether the latest White House shakeup will save the Trump agenda.

August 6, 2017

Rod Rosenstein addresses efforts to stop White House leaks.

The Russia investigation hits up as the Trump White House deals with a barrage of leaks. Now, the attorney general vows to crack down.

JEFF SESSIONS, ATTORNEY GENERAL: We will not allow rogue anonymous sources with security clearances to sell out our country and leakers will be held accountable.

WALLACE: We'll discuss if investigators can plug the leaks, and the latest developments in the Russia probe with Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein. It's a "Fox News Sunday" exclusive.

Then, as special counsel Robert Mueller takes evidence about Russian interference in the election to a grand jury, the president keep saying there's nothing there.

PRESIDENT DONALD TRUMP: The Russia story is a total fabrication. It's just an excuse for the greatest loss in the history of American politics. That's all it is.

WALLACE: We'll talk with Republican Senator Thom Tillis, who was just introduced a bill to protect the special counsel for being fired.

Plus, as Congress leaves town for a long August recess, we'll ask our Sunday panel about all the unfinished business they will face when they come back after Labor Day.

August 13, 2017

Exclusive: Sen. Graham on Charlottesville, North Korea, and the GOP agenda.

A white nationalist rally in Virginia turns violent with one counter protester run down and killed.

And President Trump sends a message to North Korea's Kim Jong-un: the U.S. military is locked and loaded.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: North Korea better get their act together or they're going to be in trouble like a few nations ever have been in trouble in this world.

WALLACE: We'll talk live with one of President Trump's top intelligence officials, CIA Director Mike Pompeo, to breakdown the situation in North Korea. Mike Pompeo in his first Sunday show interview since taking the post.

Then as tensions ramp up, will the U.S. launch a preemptive attack on North Korea? We'll discuss the president's military options with one of the top national security voices in Congress, Republican Senator Lindsey Graham. It's a "Fox News Sunday" exclusive. Plus, the president speaks against the violence in Charlottesville, but fails to call out the white supremacists.

TRUMP: We condemn in the strongest possible terms this egregious display of hatred, bigotry and violence on many sides. On many sides.

WALLACE: We'll ask our Sunday panel whether the president's comments went far enough.

The war of words between President Trump and North Korea keeps escalating, with growing concern it will become a military confrontation.

In a few minutes, we'll talk with Mike Pompeo, director of the CIA about the situation on the Korean peninsula.

But this weekend, the president is dealing with a new problem and another controversy. A white nationalist rally in Charlottesville, Virginia, turned violent when a car rammed into a crowd of counter protesters, killing one and injuring dozens. And a number of Republican leaders have criticized the president for failing to condemn the white supremacist.

Kristin Fisher is covering the president as he continues his time at his golf club in New Jersey -- Kristin.

KRISTIN FISHER, FOX NEWS CORRESPONDENT: Chris, it's not so much what President Trump said, it's what he didn't say, on Twitter and in person. He never even mentioned the white supremacists that had gathered in Charlottesville ostensibly to protest the removal of a Confederate statue.

But the FBI and the Justice Department have already launched a civil rights investigation and the governor of Virginia has declared a state of emergency.

One woman is dead, 19 other injured after a car plowed into the crowd of people who came to protest against the white supremacists. Police suspect a 20-year-old James Alex Field was behind

the wheel. He's been charged with second-degree murder and other counts. Two Virginia state troopers were also killed when their helicopter crashed while patrolling the protest.

President Trump now calling for unity and denouncing the violence.

August 20, 2017

David Bossie on a White House without Steve Bannon; Sen. Ben Cardin on threats from terrorism, North Korea.

BILL HEMMER, "FOX NEWS SUNDAY" GUEST HOST: I'm Bill Hemmer, in for Chris Wallace.

Another major staff shake-up, the president's key strategies leaving the White House.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: I like Mr. Bannon. He's a friend of mine. But Mr. Bannon came on very late, you know that.

HEMMER: We'll break down what's next for the Trump administration with his former Trump deputy campaign manager David Bossie.

Then, terror hitting an American ally yet again. At least 13 dead, including one American, in Barcelona.

REX TILLERSON, SECRETARY OF STATE: Terrorists around the world should know -- that United States and our allies are resolved to find you and bring you to justice.

HEMMER: We'll discuss how the U.S. is fighting the war on terror with Senator Ben Cardin, the top Democrat on the Foreign Relations Committee.

Plus, as Steve Bannon joins the list of ousted White House staffers, we will ask our Sunday panel how the shake-up will affect the president's agenda and those who put him in the White House.

The president parting ways with his top strategist Steve Bannon after the week that saw the president get harsh criticism from both sides after the violence in Charlottesville. So, where does the White House go from here?

With me now, former Trump deputy campaign manager David Bossie.

And, David, welcome to "Fox News Sunday."

BOSSIE: Thanks for having me.

HEMMER: First appearance as a guest, what took you so long?

DAVID BOSSIE, FORMER TRUMP DEPUTY CAMPAIGN MANAGER: The invitation lost in the mail.

HEMMER: Well, listen, it's my first time, too. So, thank you for being here today.

How big of a loss is this for President Trump?

BOSSIE: Well, the president is his own agenda setter. He has been his own strategist for many, many years. And he lets everybody know that.

Don't get me wrong. Steve Bannon was an integral part of the White House, but this president understands how he got elected. He is the one who formulated really the agenda and the issues that we really ran on and Steve and I -- Steve called me in August of last year when he took over the campaign and I came and joined the campaign in late August.

So, again, I was somebody who came in late. But we help the president. It was the president's ideas. It has always been the president's agenda, 100 percent. For years and years, he's been talking about these issues.

August 27, 2017

Gov. Abbott on Harvey's impact, Secretary Tillerson talks North Korean threat, Afghanistan strategy.

Hurricane Harvey turns deadly as it continues to dump feet of rain on Texas. While overseas, North Korea launches more missiles, how will the U.S. respond?

WALLACE: As Harvey continues to flood parts of Texas, we'll have live reports on the devastation and how people there are handling it. And we'll discuss how Texas will deal with the damage to people and property with that state's governor, Greg Abbott.

Then, as the president commits more troops to Afghanistan, North Korea fires off more missiles just days after Mr. Trump praises their restraint.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: Kim Jong-un, I respect the fact that I believe he is starting to respect us.

WALLACE: We'll break down how the administration plans to deal with North Korea and Afghanistan in an exclusive interview with Secretary of State Rex Tillerson.

Plus, the president pardons former Arizona Sheriff Joe Arpaio, drawing harsh criticism from both parties.

JOE ARPAIO, FORMER ARIZONA SHERIFF: I love that president. He supports law enforcement.

WALLACE: We'll ask our Sunday panel if the president is sending a message to aides being investigated by the special counsel.

September 3, 2017

Sec. Mnuchin talks cutting off North Korea economically.

North Korea conducts its most powerful nuclear test so far. We'll have the latest and talk with a member of the National Security Council.

And President Trump sees firsthand the devastation from Hurricane Harvey.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: I mean, we are talking about -- they say two years, three years, I think that, you know, because this is Texas, you'll probably do it in six months, I have a feeling here.

WALLACE: We'll get the latest and how Texans are responding and rebuilding it from the governor of that state, Greg Abbott.

And then flooding continues to keep thousands from their homes as victims of Harvey wait for aid.

TRUMP: Seven-point-nine billion. We signed it and now, it's going through a very quick -- hopefully quick process.

WALLACE: As Congress gets ready to debate a huge disaster relief package, we'll ask Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin what it means for a big September agenda: keeping the government open, raising the debt limit, and the push for tax reform.

Plus, President Trump will announce the decision on DACA Tuesday.

TRUMP: We love the DREAMERS. We love everybody.

WALLACE: We'll ask our Sunday panel what will happen to the DREAMERS.

September 10, 2017

Gov. Rick Scott on how Florida is handling Hurricane Irma.

Breaking now, Irma makes landfall in Florida as a powerful category four hurricane.

GOV. RICK SCOTT, R-FLORIDA: This is a deadly, major storm and our state has never seen anything like it.

BROCK LONG, FEMA ADMINISTRATOR: Unfortunately, I don't believe all systems understand the magnitude of what's about to happen.

WALLACE: We're live in the storm zone with the latest on Irma, where it's headed, the potential danger, and we'll find out how authorities will respond from Florida Governor Rick Scott and FEMA chief Brock Long.

Then, the president strikes a surprise deal with the Democrats.

REP. NANCY PELOSI, D-CALI., HOUSE MINORITY LEADER: Senate Democratic Leader Chuck Schumer, he can speak New York to the president.

WALLACE: We'll discuss what it means for the president's relationship with the GOP and the Trump agenda with Ohio Congressman Jim Jordan, founding member of the hard-line House Freedom Caucus.

Plus, what should we make of the president's new alliance with Chuck and Nancy? We'll ask our Sunday panel how long it will last.

Here's where we stand with Hurricane Irma right now. The eye of the most powerful Atlantic hurricane ever recorded now moving across the Florida Keys, with maximum sustained winds of 130 miles per hour. The storm expected to inflict damage not seen in Florida since Hurricane Andrew 25 years ago, a record 7 million people in Florida and neighboring states under evacuation orders. Its path projected along Florida's gulf coast from Naples to Tampa Bay.

In the moment, we'll discuss the threat and the response with FEMA Administrator Brock Long and Florida Governor Rick Scott.

But, first, we have Fox team coverage. Chief meteorologist Rick Reichmuth tells us where Irma is headed. Bill Hemmer on the emergency facing Florida.

But we begin with Adam Housley in Key Largo, in the storm's crosshairs right now -- Adam.

ADAM HOUSLEY, FOX NEWS CORRESPONDENT: Yes, Chris, you talk about the storm's crosshairs, here in Key Largo, the winds have been battering this part of Florida for more than 24 hours. In fact, at 10:30 yesterday morning, we lost power here and the winds have not died down and have continued to grow. Right now, you can tell that the wind is gusting over 100 miles per hour from where I'm standing.

If I'm going to step away for a second to give you an idea of the storm's wrath and the rage of the storm. The eye is going to pass about 40 miles we believe to our west, so we're right on the side of the storm. You can see trees split in half, across our parking lot from the secure location that we are located to the tree about four feet around. It stands about 10 feet above ground.

You know, I've been in 10 hurricanes, but I've got to tell you, this one is the most powerful one that I felt this far away from the center and it's been just nonstop. The storms here in Key Largo started yesterday at about 11:00 p.m. We left the area on the ocean side storm, the east side of the Key, the water has already come up about three feet and was headed towards the interstate.

Here on the bayside, it has not yet gotten that high at all. The wind and rain is battering us. We know that also evacuations here began several days ago. People that stay for Andrew 25 years ago saw the picture, saw the video coming out of the Caribbean and said this time they were going to stay.

Chris, very few people left here in Key Largo, thankfully, as this storm comes ashore.

September 17, 2017

General H.R. McMaster on global threats; Blunt, Durbin talk DACA, dreamers and dealing with Trump.

CHRIS WALLACE, "FOX NEWS SUNDAY" HOST: I'm Chris Wallace.

North Korea fires another missile while London is hit by a terror attack, as President Trump prepares to take the world stage and address the U.N.

REX TILLERSON, U.S. STATE SECRETARY: North Korea is now a global threat and it requires a global response.

LT. GEN. H.R. MCMASTER, NATIONAL SECURITY ADVISOR: We've been kicking the can down the road and we're out of road.

NIKKI HALEY, U.S. AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED NATIONS: I have no problem kicking it to General Mattis because I think he has plenty of options.

WALLACE, We'll discuss foreign hot spot and preview the president's message at the international community on North Korea, Iran and terror with national security advisor, General H.R. McMaster.

Then, does President Trump have an immigration deal with Chuck and Nancy or not?

SEN. CHUCK SCHUMER, D-NY, SENATE MINORITY LEADER: We have reached an understanding on this issue. We have to work out details.

REP. NANCY PELOSI, D-CALI., HOUSE MINORITY LEADER: We have an agreement to move forward.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: The wall to me is vital. If I don't get the wall, then we will become the obstruction.

WALLACE: We'll break down the DACA discussion and whether there's a new balance of power in Washington with two Senate leaders, Democrat Dick Durbin and Republican Roy Blunt.

Plus, big tech comes under fire. We'll ask our Sunday panel about how Russia used Facebook in the 2016 election.

And our power player of the week, breaking barriers while keeping some of the sport's biggest stars in the game.

What does it mean to you to be the first female head doctor in the history of both Major League Baseball and the NFL?

WALLACE: All, right now, on "Fox News Sunday."

The United Nations General Assembly has been called the super bowl of diplomacy. And this week, President Trump goes to New York to join other world leaders there for the first time. With plenty of hot spots to discuss, what will the president focus on and what action will he seek?

General, welcome back to "Fox News Sunday."

The president said: I spoke with President Moon of South Korea last night, asked him -- excuse me -- asked him how Rocket Man is doing. Long gas lines forming in North Korea. Too bad.

Well, before I get to the substance, Rocket Man, have you heard that from the president before or is that a new one?

CHRIS WALLACE, "FOX NEWS SUNDAY" HOST: I'm Chris Wallace.

Republican senators race the clock and deal with a new defection, in the last ditch effort to end ObamaCare.

SEN. LINDSEY GRAHAM, R-SOUTH CAROLINA: If you are Bernie believer, this is your worst nightmare, because I take money and power out of Washington.

DONALD TRUMP, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: It is a little tougher without McCain's vote, I'll be honest. It's a little tougher, but we've got some time.

WALLACE: We'll discuss the 11th hour effort to round up the votes with Marc Short, the White House director of legislative affairs.

Then, President Trump re-ignites a racial controversy, this time with black pro-athletes, including those who kneel during the national anthem.

TRUMP: You see it, even if it's one player, leave the stadium. I guarantee things will stop. Things will stop. Just pick up and leave.

WALLACE: We'll ask our Sunday panel what it means for the president's relations with minorities.

Plus, our exclusive interview with billionaire/philanthropist Bill Gates on his foundation spending billions on global health.

BILL GATES, BILLIONAIRE/PHILANTHROPIST: That a child in Africa is a hundred times more likely to die than a child in the U.S. or Europe.

WALLACE: And our power players of the week. Some of the innovators who are finding ways to deliver life-saving vaccines to the world's poorest children.

All right now on "Fox News Sunday."

WALLACE: And hello again from Fox News in Washington.

We'll get to President Trump's confrontation with black pro athletes in a few minutes. But, first, the clock is ticking on Republican leaders' deadline next Saturday to dismantle ObamaCare and keep their promise to conservative voters. The bill needs 50 votes plus a tiebreaker from Vice President Pence, none expected to come from Democrats.

Friday, the GOP's slim majority took a big hit when Senator John McCain announced he is a no. President Trump attacking him and other Republican senators for their opposition.

Joining me now to discuss where things stand is Marc Short, the White House legislative affairs director.

Mark, welcome back to "Fox News Sunday."

MARC SHORT, WHITE HOUSE LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DIRECTOR: Chris, thanks for having me.

WALLACE: Is this latest effort to replace ObamaCare now dead?

SHORT: No, Chris, it's not dead. Here we were, just days away from a final vote, and we're trying to win over the support of the last couple of senators to get there. As you know, there's no Democrat support for it.

So, the last time in the Senate, the vote of 52 of Republicans, we gained 49. But all 48 Democrats oppose. That will be the same case this week.

Now, we need to make sure that those last couple of Republicans we win over. Those Republicans, of course, as you know, are John McCain, Lisa Murkowski, Susan Collins, and Rand Paul. That's our path to victory.

WALLACE: Well, John McCain is unknown. Are you expecting Rand Paul is a no? Are you suggesting Rand Paul isn't a definite no?

SHORT: I think with Rand Paul, there's -- Rand Paul has been certainly someone who's very principled on health care. You know, we hope we can earn his support, because when else would he get the opportunity to vote on a bill that actually provides real entitlement reform? When will we get a chance to vote on a bill that doubles the ability to contribute to health savings account? And, Chris, when will we get the ability to vote on a bill that gets rid of the individual mandate, the employer mandate?

And something else that I know is important to Rand Paul and that's life. This administration stood for life, and this bill protects the sanctity of life by denying taxpayer dollars going to fund abortions. If Rand Paul is the final vote here, it's hard to see how he could go to his pro-life supporters (ph) and say, I had a chance to protect life and instead, I went the other way.

WALLACE: But Rand Paul has made it clear, he wants to repeal ObamaCare. He says -- and, in fact, the bill does leave a lot of ObamaCare, including all of the taxes in place. He calls it "ObamaCare lite".
