**Economic:** Economists think 2015 will bring a better year for the state in job and population growth, but it will likely see lackluster economic growth as the hangover from the housing bust continues to dampen the economic recovery. There is no shortage of potential economic challenges entering 2015, but economists predict slight improvement to Arizona job gains, population growth and retail spending in the coming year. Arizona is expected to add about 100,000 new residents, a 1.5 percent population growth rate that will keep the state among the nation's fastest-growing but also well below usual patterns.

**Gov. Ducey announces statewide leadership summit in May.** Gov. Doug Ducey has announced a statewide leadership summit at University of Phoenix Stadium. . Ducey's office announced that the governor is set to host the summit on May 14 in Glendale. The summit will feature local leaders in business, education and government to discuss how to make Arizona the best place to do business and receive an education.

**Tucson announces rural hospital alliance.** Tucson Medical Center is expected to announce an alliance with four rural hospitals in southern Arizona. The Arizona Daily Star reports the Southern Arizona Hospital Alliance unveiling comes as a 283-mile march supporting rural hospitals culminates in Washington, D.C. The event is being organized by the National Rural Health Association, which estimates more rural hospitals have closed since January 2013 than in the past 10 years combined. The southern Arizona alliance allows the hospitals to apply for grants as a group and make purchases collectively.

**There are about to be several more Jamba Juice stores in the Valley,** according to local franchise operator Scott Timmons with Blend Serve, LLC. The franchise group started its first Jamba Juice store in Gilbert almost 18 years ago, said Timmons, a managing partner of Blend Serve. Now they've signed a deal that will at least double their reach. They're committed to open four more stores and they have an option to open a fifth.

**Groupon to hire 100 new employees, moving to SkySong late this summer.** Groupon announced it will be relocating from temporary offices in Phoenix to SkySong at Arizona State University's Scottsdale Innovation Center, and hiring an additional 100 employees to work in the new space. Groupon first announced the online company would open a Phoenix office in January, and they've grown that office to about 50 employees, according to Nicholas Halliwell, a Groupon spokesperson. The new office space at SkySong will hold about 150 employees, Halliwell said, and it will be a permanent location for the company in the Valley.

Super Bowl, related events put \$719.4 million into state's economy. This year's Super Bowl in Glendale, Arizona and game-related events pumped more than \$719 million into the state's economy. A study released focused on the nine-day period from Jan. 24 through Feb. 1 coinciding with the Pro Bowl and Super Bowl, both played at University of Phoenix Stadium. Figures show that more than 120,000 people came to the Phoenix metro area for the game and more than 1 million people visited Super Bowl Central in downtown Phoenix. **Employment/Jobs:** Arizona's projected job growth should be about 2.5 percent in 2015 compared with about 2 percent this year. That's still less than the 3 to 5 percent growth the state often sees. Private economist Elliott Pollack blames much of the slow recovery on the lack of a rebound in construction. The lack of a rebound in the construction industry is one of the major reasons the state continues to see lower-than-normal job growth,

Good news: More workers are quitting their jobs. Many Americans are stuck with stagnant wages, but Ben Baxter has scored a 31% pay hike since the end of 2011. No, the 28-year-old Alabama resident didn't hypnotize his employer into giving him a raise. He didn't master a secret salary negotiating strategy either. Baxter just felt confident enough about the economy to jump from job to job in order to boost his salary. He's quit six different engineering jobs since February 2013, including two positions since last summer. "I tend to change jobs about every six to twelve months. It's the best way to increase salary," Baxter told CNN Money. The calculation is simple: It comes down to staying and getting a 1% raise or leaving and receiving a 10% boost, he said.

"Always have an out in your back pocket," said Baxter, who currently works as a quality engineer at an auto parts supplier. More quits = better economy: Baxter is part a growing trend of workers who are walking into their manager's office and saying, "I quit." Nearly 2.8 million employees voluntarily quit their jobs in January, up 17% from the year before, according to the latest government statistics. The quit rate, which measures the number of quits as a percent of total employment, ticked up to 2% from 1.7%. All regions of the country have experienced increased quits over the past year. Sectors seeing more voluntary terminations include professional and business services and the accommodation and food services industries. Quitting stats provide a glimpse into workers' willingness and ability to leave their jobs and find better employment elsewhere. Hiring continues to pick up. Last year was the best for American job growth since 1999.

Phoenix workers plan wage protests for 'tax day.' Phoenix workers are planning to walk off their jobs and stage demonstrations as part of a nationwide effort to protest low wages. Workers from half a dozen different industries in 200 cities across the U.S. are expected to hold rallies on April 15, also known as 'tax day.' Phoenix demonstrations are planned at four locations throughout the day.

Arizona's unemployment rate drops to 6 percent. Arizona's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for April was 6 percent, down two-tenths of a percentage point from March. The national unemployment rate dropped one-tenth of a percentage point to 5.4 percent in April. The state Department of Administration says Arizona's economy gained 2,200 non-farm jobs last month. Across Arizona's economy, seven of the 11 sectors added jobs and four reported losses in April. Analysts say Professional and Business Services added 3,300 jobs with Government adding 1,900 jobs and Construction 1,300 jobs last month.

**Immigration:** High levels of illegal immigration and crimes committed by unauthorized immigrants are among the key rationales cited by some supporters of a tough new immigration law in Arizona. According to our Governor, Jan Brewer; border violence and crime due to illegal immigration are critically important issues to the people of our state.

Court upholds findings of racial profiling by Arizona Sheriff Joe Arpaio The sheriff for metro Phoenix lost a bid to overturn a 2013 racial profiling ruling that blunted his signature immigration enforcement efforts and represents the thorniest legal troubles the defiant lawman has faced in

his 22-year career. The decision by the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals marks the latest in a long string of defeats for Sheriff Joe Arpaio in the case in which his officers were found to have racially profiled Latinos.

Arpaio and four aides face hearings on whether they should be held in contempt of court for violating a 2011 order by a judge who barred Arpaio's immigration patrols. The sheriff has acknowledged the violation and offered to make a donation a civil rights group to make amends for disobeying court orders.

Arpaio immigration unit tarnished by misconduct allegations. As frustrations mounted a decade ago over illegal immigration, Sheriff Joe Arpaio created an elite squad to crack down on smugglers and, in the process, became known across the country as a tough-talking lawman willing to step in where the federal government wouldn't. The fame helped the top law enforcer in Arizona's largest county attract a steady stream of endorsement requests from politicians and contributions for his own re-election campaigns. Now, however, the disbanded squad has turned into a worsening legal liability, the thorniest one that he has faced in his 22 years as Maricopa County sheriff. It has forced Arpaio to do something unexpected: tone down his normally unapologetic rhetoric. A judge will hold hearings over whether to hold the sheriff and the squad's leader in contempt of court for letting Arpaio's immigration patrols continue for about 18 months after he was ordered to stop them in a racial profiling case.

Sheriff Joe Arpaio's racial-profiling case to cost taxpayers \$50 million. As county officials in metro Phoenix work to enact a budget for the next fiscal year, they are confronted with a looming financial liability: the legal costs associated with Sheriff Joe Arpaio's racial-profiling case.

Taxpayers are already on the hook for an estimated \$45 million stemming from the racial-profiling lawsuit filed over Arpaio's signature immigration patrols -- and the cost is expected to grow by millions more in the coming years as the county works to resolve the 7-year-old case.

Crime/Drugs: Arizona crime statistics indicate a total downward trend in crime based on data from 10 years when violent crime was increasing and property crime was decreasing. The crime rate in Arizona for 2015 is expected to be lower than in 2010 when the state violent crime rate was higher than the national violent crime rate average by 31.73% and the state property crime rate was higher than the national property crime rate average by 80.08%.

Man found dead in Phoenix home, Nearly a dozen men are being questioned after a man was found dead in Phoenix. Phoenix police responded to a call about trouble at a residence. When officers arrived at the scene they found a 24-year-old man dead from an apparent gunshot wound, said Phoenix Police Sgt. Jonathan Howard. Howard said evidence indicates that someone shot into the home from outside. Detectives are on the scene interviewing the remaining occupants and trying to determine a motive for the shooting.

TSA finds loaded gun in Phoenix-bound traveler's bag. The Transportation Security Administration says a Phoenix-bound passenger stopped at a security checkpoint at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport had a loaded handgun in his bag as well as extra ammunition. KOMO-TV reports the incident was the 15th time this year that Sea-Tac airport security has found a gun in carry-on luggage. The agency says when TSA agents searched the man's bag they found a loaded .380 Ruger handgun and another magazine with six rounds of ammunition. The TSA reminds passengers that guns, ammunition and realistic firearms replicas "are always prohibited in carry-on baggage."

Critics: Immigration law aimed to protect Sheriff Joe Arpaio's patrols Newly released emails reveal conversations between the main players who wrote Arizona's landmark law cracking down on immigration, including discussions about doing the bidding of Sheriff Joe Arpaio and language that critics say played on immigration stereotypes. The emails emerged in a court case in which civil rights groups are seeking to have the remaining parts of the law thrown out on the grounds that it is discriminatory. They alleged the law known as SB1070 was motivated by a desire to discriminate against Latinos and Mexicans. Lawyers challenging the law say it was aimed at protecting the contentious immigration crackdowns carried out by Arpaio.

Nine men caught stealing purses from Phoenix Saks Fifth Avenue. A group of men were caught on surveillance video allegedly stealing purses from a Saks Fifth Avenue over the weekend. Phoenix police said the incident happened at the Biltmore Fashion Park. Surveillance video shows nine black men enter the store and begin removing bags from shelves and tables. Seconds later, the group scatters and runs out of the store after they were confronted by a security guard. A tenth suspect was waiting outside the store in a blue Ford SUV. All of the suspects got away. Police said the license plate on the vehicle was fake.

MCSO Animal Crimes Unit investigating after 'aggressive' dogs locked inside wood box. Maricopa County detectives are investigating a report of dogs being confined to a wooden box in Mesa. According to MCSO, the dogs are alive and appear to be aggressive. Its animal crimes unit has been called out to investigate to see if any laws have been broken. The incident is at a home in Mesa. Some neighbors were seen spraying water on the box in an attempt to cool the animals off.

The FBI has released a surveillance photo of the man they say robbed a Bank of America in Ahwatukee. Investigators describe him as a white male, 40-50 years old, 6 feet tall, and unshaven. Police say the suspect entered the bank on South Desert Foothills Parkway and proceeded to the teller counter. Once at the counter, he pushed an elderly woman out of the way and removed a handgun which he pointed at the bank employees and customers while demanding money. Once he had cash in hand, he fled the bank to the east and has not been seen since. Phoenix Police Sgt. Jon Howard says what makes this robbery different than others is that the man showed a gun and used it to threaten customers and employees, rather than just flashing a weapon. Sgt. Howard says the suspect fits the profile of someone who would escalate in violence if he were to strike again

MCSO on scene of large marijuana bust in Phoenix. A seven-month investigation by the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office has led to the largest marijuana bust in Phoenix. An MCSO spokesperson said the operation involves multiple locations around the Valley. Eight people have been taken into custody and authorities are looking for at least eight others allegedly connected to the operation. MCSO said a majority of those involved are Vietnamese. Five-hundred marijuana plants were found and more than \$100,000 in equipment was located inside. "This is being manufactured locally. So you can see the irony the marijuana problem. Not only is it coming in from a foreign country, but they're making it here in the United States, illegally and distributing it in this Valley," said Sheriff Joe Arpaio.

Education: Arizona parents have more choices for educating their young children than ever before. Choice, quality education – that's what Valley residents have learned to expect from Phoenix area schools. The success of our students impacts us all. As other states and nations become more competitive and successful at producing highly skilled individuals, it's more critical than ever to expect more of our own education system and the results it delivers. This begins with making education a top priority for Arizona.

Barry Goldwater High School evacuated to check backpack in bathroom. Students and staff at a north Phoenix high school spent more about two hours in the stands of the school's football stadium while the Police Department's bomb squad was summoned to check out a suspicious backpack. Sgt. Trent Crump said the backpack found in a bathroom at Barry Goldwater High School was found to contain books. The school's principal sent a note to parents and guardians notifying them of the evacuation. The letter stated all students are safe and have been moved to the school's football field.

Arizona State University Offers Full Freshman Online Curriculum. Arizona State University is teaming up with edX, a nonprofit platform for massive open online courses, to offer a full freshman-year curriculum to the public as it seeks to expand its student base and improve

college attendance and graduation rates. The program, Global Freshman Academy, will award up to a full year of academic credit to people who successfully complete eight web classes on general education subjects such as astronomy and Western civilization, designed and taught by Arizona State faculty. Students can take the classes for no fee, or—after passing final exams—pay up to \$200 per credit hour, or about \$4,800 for the full year of credit.

Judge: DREAMers can get in-state tuition in Arizona. A judge says young immigrants granted deferred deportation status by the Obama administration are eligible for in-state college tuition. The ruling from Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Arthur Anderson comes in a lawsuit filed by former Attorney General Tom Horne against the Maricopa County Community College District. Horne contended that so-called "dreamers" offered deferred action status were not legally present in the U.S and could not get state benefits because of a 2006 voter-enacted law known as Proposition 300. But Anderson says the federal government considers deferred action recipients.

Gov. Doug Ducey lays groundwork for major education overhaul. Gov. Doug Ducey laid the political groundwork for a major overhaul of the state's education system during a summit of business, education and political leaders from around the state. The Republican governor's highly choreographed event at the University of Phoenix Stadium included a Ducey-led panel discussion with education leaders who oversaw school overhauls in New Orleans and New York City. Ducey brought in former Louisiana schools chief Paul Pastorek and ex-New York City schools leader Joel Klein to talk about how they overhauled schools. Their thoughts mainly echoed what Ducey has laid out as his vision: more money in classrooms, funding following children and replicating excellent schools in other areas by using vacant school buildings.

Teacher fired, money gone after canceled senior trip. A long-awaited high school graduation trip has been canceled and a teacher has been fired because of it. Ninety students at the Arizona Agribusiness and Equine Center were supposed to be taking a trip to Six Flags Magic Mountain in California, but over the weekend they were told via email the trip was canceled. "We were all really angry. Our school is really small and this was gonna be the first senior trip at our school," said senior Sarah Garcia. Garcia says students spent 8 months raising the \$3,000 needed for the trip. In a letter to parents, school officials said the trip was canceled because it wasn't known about or approved in advance. However, the teacher who sponsored and helped organize the trip shared several receipts with ABC15 that he says prove the school knew exactly what was going on. "I believe they canceled it because when students are not on campus they are not getting money for seats that aren't filled. And I believe the root of it is them not getting their money," said Rolando Robles. Robles says that he when he went to school officials to complain about the canceled trip and resign, they fired him."

Allegations of cheating on AzMERIT tests prompt investigation of Phoenix elementary school. Allegations of cheating on standardized tests have prompted an investigation at a Phoenix elementary school. ABC15 Investigators have learned the investigation into cheating on the AzMERIT statewide achievement test at a local elementary school has been reported to state education officials. A spokesperson for the Isaac School District #5 confirms they are looking into allegations that answers were altered on standardized tests at the J.B. Sutton Elementary School in Phoenix.

Education Department seeking guidance on school funding cuts. PHOENIX - State education officials want formal legal advice on how to implement reductions in funding provided to schools with small enrollments. Charter schools complain that the cuts will be onerous, and the Arizona Capitol Times reports that the Education Department plans to ask the Attorney General's Office for a formal opinion on the reductions. The Legislature earlier this year approved a reduction in a school funding provision called the "small-school weight," and at the time the reduction in the upcoming fiscal year was estimated at \$6.5 million. However, the department has since estimated that the cuts will be close to \$15 million in the 2015-2016 fiscal year, followed by \$24 million and \$32 million in the next two fiscal years.

**Housing:** The good news for the 2015 housing industry is that the economy is accelerating, mortgage rates remain low, homes are still affordable and foreclosures and delinquencies are down, Pollack said. And there are signs the construction industry is ticking up, especially in apartments and office buildings, he said. But there is plenty of bad news still left: People still aren't moving into Arizona at historic levels, Pollack said. The state remains at 8th for new residents, down from 2nd place. Arizona is still feeling the effects of SB1070, which sent a message to people that Arizona isn't welcoming, he said. A series of other issues are dragging down the state's housing market, like higher-than-average unemployment, people with little equity or who have a foreclosure on their credit reports, and young people putting off starting a family or still living at home.

New shelter for homeless families opens in Mesa A new shelter to serve homeless families is open in Mesa. The La Mesita Family Homeless Shelter has 16 furnished one- and two-bedroom units to provide families with places to stay for up to 120 days. It also provides employment assistance, financial literacy classes, computer training, counseling and after-school programming. "What we're trying to provide now is a dignified approach to being homeless," said Torrie Taj with the center. "Being homeless is just one of the issues that they're facing. There are so many other things that we need to provide besides four walls and a roof." The city of Mesa was among numerous public, private and nonprofit organizations that helped provide funding for the family shelter operated by Mesa-based A New Leaf. An earlier phase in the project turned an old motel into 80 apartments to provide affordable housing. The third phase will include 30 additional housing units for the chronically homeless.

Phoenix housing program turning renters into homeowners. There are a lot of Valley families still struggling to pay the bills, but that doesn't mean they can't afford to buy a new home. The City of Phoenix's Scattered Sites Home Ownership Program is putting families on the path to home ownership. Phoenix Housing Supervisor Carmen Rentas said that by providing folks with a nice place to live, at a lesser price, it gives them a chance to save money that they can one day use to buy a house of their own. "We're talking about regular people like you and I, that work full time and have 40 hours and going to school to better educate themselves for their family and become self-sufficient," said Rentas. "They have careers but don't make enough income to buy on their own. The ultimate goal is for them to become homeowners." Rentas said that whenever someone in the program is ready to buy - they can purchase the home they are in, or another city owned house at 80-percent of its value. All they need is 1 percent of the purchase price. They will also receive a \$6,000 down payment allowance. To qualify for the program applicants need to be first time homebuyers and meet specific income requirements.

Zillow reports Phoenix home values, rental market rising faster than national average. Real estate website Zillow's May Real Estate Market Report is out and the Phoenix housing market is seeing a steady rise. Both home values and rents increased at a rate faster than the national average in Phoenix, according to Zillow's analysis. The Zillow Home Value Index, which shows estimated home values in an area, is increasing at a yearly rate of 4.6 percent in Phoenix, to \$202,500. And rents are going up even faster. The median rent in Phoenix is \$1,256 now, which represents a 5.6 percent increase since last year, Zillow reported. In Phoenix, the housing market should continue to grow 2.8 percent in the next year, according to Zillow's Home Value Forecast for May 2016.

A proposed ordinance to be considered by the City Council would allow the university and Culver City, California-based NantWorks to develop a 7-acre parcel on the Phoenix Biomedical Campus. According to a briefing paper submitted to the council, the project when complete would include lab space, offices, clinical facilities, academic institutes, manufacturing operations and other uses. **Valley doctors talk about Mental Health Awareness month and behavioral health in children.** May is Mental Health Awareness Month. Doctors Brad Bayless and Mark Salerno of Bayless Healthcare stopped by ABC15 Mornings to talk about behavioral health in children and the signs parents should look for. **AZ mental hospital oversight committee wants health department to re-open 2014 death investigation.** A state mental hospital oversight committee said it will ask health department officials to re-open an investigation into the death of a patient in 2014. Sharon Ashcroft, chair of the Arizona State Hospital Human Rights Committee, said they will vote on a motion to request the investigation at a meeting early next month. A female patient died on March 22, 2014. The death was one of three at the hospital in less than two years, including one that happened this month. Committee members said they have concerns about the accuracy of documentation released to them after the death. Members also said key facts were amended after they asked questions about the hospital's response. (6pm newscast on 5/22, 1:30 in length)

**Environmental regulators issue an ozone health watch for Phoenix.** A health watch is issued when ozone levels are expected to approach federal health standards. Ozone can irritate the lungs and aggravate existing health conditions such as asthma. Officials say people who are unusually sensitive to air quality should consider limiting their time outdoors. People are asked to fuel their vehicles after dark or during cooler hours and avoid waiting in long drive-thru lines. (11am newscast on 6/12, 1:00 in length)

**Women bit by bed bugs at Wild Horse Pass Hotel & Casino.** A Valley woman is demanding a Valley hotel take action after she claims she was seriously attacked by bed bugs. Michelle Potter posted her experience on Facebook, which didn't go over too well with managers at the Wild Horse Pass Hotel and Casino in Chandler. The posting is getting a lot of attention and Potter tells ABC15 several other guests are reporting similar situations. "I woke up about 3:30 in the morning itching," said Potter. She said when she went to the bathroom; she discovered bug bites over her body. Her daughter Nicole said she had the same issue. "I took the covers off and I had these huge welts all over my leg. Some were swelled to like a half dollar size and I was scared I didn't know what was going on." Potter took her daughter to the doctor where it was confirmed Nicole had been attacked by bed bugs. 14 brands of bottled water recalled due to possible E. Coli. An E. Coli scare has prompted a Canada-based bottled water producer to recall some of its products. Niagara Bottling LLC said the recall is purely out of an abundance of caution. There have been no signs of its product being contaminated or reports of consumers falling sick, it said. The family-owned company said the operator of a spring that supplies two of its plants failed to report evidence of E. Coli at the source. The bottler said it halted production, disinfected bottling lines and issued a voluntary recall. The recall affects water bottled from June 10 through 18 in two Pennsylvania plants only. Niagara has issued instructions to consumers on its website on how to properly read the date on bottle labels to determine if purchased water should be returned.

Child Abuse/Parenting: Arizona promotes healthy parenting among individuals and in communities raising children. Two reports set the stage for the daunting work facing the state task force charged with reinventing the state's child-welfare agency. They confirm in numbers and trend lines the continued issues confronting child safety in Arizona: an increasing number of reports of child abuse and neglect, a growing number of kids in foster care and a revolving door for a quarter of the children caught

Jerice Hunter trial: Arizona woman convicted of murder after young daughter. An Arizona mother was convicted of first-degree murder and child abuse in the death of her 5-year-old daughter, who prosecutors said was beaten, neglected and confined to a closet before being dumped in a trash bin in 2011. Authorities said 41-year-old Jerice Hunter kept her daughter Jhessye Shockley at the family's suburban Phoenix home and deprived her of food and water until she died. After the verdict, the jury determined that four aggravating circumstances related to the child abuse charge had been proven beyond a reasonable doubt. As a result, prosecutors said Hunter could face at least 35 years and up to life in prison when she is sentenced on June 5. The disappearance of Jhessye set off an intense search of landfills as officers picked through 9,500 tons of garbage over three months. Suspicion quickly turned to Hunter after it was learned she served four years in prison in California on child abuse charges and was released on parole in 2010.

Carlos Cruz, Rosemary Velazco arrested after 4-year-old daughter found 'lifeless,' malnourished. The parents of a 4-year-old Surprise girl have been arrested following the gruesome death of their daughter. The girl was found severely beaten and malnourished, weighing just 15 pounds, following a 911 call from the girl's uncle. According to the police report, paramedics were called to the home and found the child "completely unresponsive...with no signs of life." She was later declared dead at Del Webb Hospital. Parents Carlos T. Cruz, 28, and Rosemary Velazco, 36, now face child abuse charges, and pending an investigation, potential murder charges. A Surprise Police Department report says the girl's body had bruises and lacerations in various stages of healing, one-inch cuts to her forehead that exposed her skull, and potentially a broken knee

PCSO: Jason Murray faces abuse charges after hitting 10-month-old foster in the face. A father in Pinal County was arrested under suspicion of child abuse after allegedly striking his 10-month-old foster child. Deputies say Jason Murray hit the infant in the face while she was eating because she had spit some macaroni and cheese out and it landed on him, according to the Pinal County Sheriff's Office. He was booked into Jail on two counts of child abuse. PCSO said Murry called 911 on June 9 to report that the child had been hurt and needed medical attention at their Red Rock home.

"He was a big part of our future," said Coach Gary Lee. Lee said they attempted CPR, but Watson never regained consciousness. Lee said Watson was a skilled player and was very dedicated to his team. Students will hold a vigil at Cesar Chavez Park. An account has been set up to assist Amreil's family.
