This week, we profiled a scientist who ignores health rules to test an experimental herpes vaccine on human subjects. Some say this is a reckless experiment – others insist it's the key to a breakthrough. In a second segment, we looked at America's shocking dependence on China for many life-saving medicines, and why one expert says it's the national security concern that no one's talking about.

In recognition of Oral Cancer Awareness Month, the Baptist Cancer Institute will provide free head and neck cancer screenings for the public on Thursday, April 26. Dr. Hilliary White of Baptist Health Care explained how the brief screening works. Dr. White said the screenings are important because often by the time people notice symptoms on their own, the cancer has gotten a head start.

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\*\*\*\*\* Jeaniene Church is your textbook grandmother. But now, at 59-years-old, Church is raising kids all over again. She told us her eldest son became addicted to prescribed opioids given to him in high school after a diving accident. For 20 years, his battle with addiction has hurt the family. Church had to put retirement aside and raise his two sons as her own. Grandparents are raising their grandchildren more than ever before and experts believe the opioid crisis is to blame. In Florida, nearly 160,000 grandparents are responsible for their grandchildren. According to Generations United, in the United States, for every one child in foster care there are 20 children being raised by relatives. There are even support groups for grandparents to connect with other grandparents in the same position. Church met Belinda Howard, who lives in Fort Walton Beach, through a Facebook group for grandparents raising grandchildren because of addiction. Howard is raising one of her grandchildren while her daughter finishes a prison sentence. She and her husband, David, are still working to make ends meet. The Howards say there needs to be more resources for people in their position. According to Generations United, relatives that take in grandchildren save taxpayers \$4 billion each year by keeping them out of foster care. The Howards said that is money that could provide financial relief for grandfamilies or treatment for addicts. In the last five years, there have been more than 300 opioid-related overdose deaths in Northwest Florida. It hit a peak in 2015 and has been slowly declining the last two years. Church said addiction has redefined the traditional family. She went from mother, to grandmother and then back to mother again. Church just launched a Facebook group for grandparents raising their grandchildren in northwest Florida. She hopes to start support groups here locally.

\*\*\*\*\* The opioid epidemic is killing more than 170 people every day in the United States, and there's no boundary or state line stopping it as it continues to increase in every region of the country. Recordings and documents show the alleged role big pharmaceutical companies may have played in the crisis. In a recent US Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee report, the allegations are eye-opening. Big pharmaceutical employees were allegedly caught on tape lying and putting lives at risk to sell highly addictive painkillers. INSYS is the company that makes the painkiller SUBSYS, a highly addictive fentanyl drug. It was created and approved for use for people suffering from stage four cancer. The Congressional report found an INSYS employee misled the insurance company to approve her prescription for the drug, and others are doing the same thing. A newly obtained Congressional report called "Fueling an Epidemic," has led to a nationwide crackdown on illegal prescriptions.

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\*11 Kratom is a plant-based supplement that some people call a natural painkiller. Others say it's a dangerous drug. Both sides agree: Kratom is powerful, and it doesn't show up on a routine drug screen. Right now, Kratom is banned in several states including Alabama. The FDA compares it to an opioid like substance, and they are pushing for a nationwide ban. Addiction professionals like Dustin Perry says more research is needed for doctors to determine if the herbal supplement is safe. We talked with locals who use Kratom in place of opioid pain pills and to get off street drugs. They report no health issues from using it. Last month, the F-D-A recalled some Kratom products after the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported a salmonella outbreak that sickened 132 people in 38 states including Florida. The federal ban would make Kratom a Schedule 1 controlled substance, meaning it would be illegal across the board, even for medicinal use.
