

## WJDK 95.7 FM Quarterly Issues

July - September 2013

1. On July 18<sup>th</sup>, WJDK interviewed Jim Lutz from the Grundy County Emergency Management Agency to inform people about what steps to take for the summer heat.
2. On July 20<sup>th</sup>, WJDK interviewed Mike Boyle from the Grundy County Health Department on what tips residents should know to prevent getting West Nile Virus.
3. On August 2<sup>nd</sup>, WJDK reported that 20-year-old Ryan Johnson of Morris was released from jail because his DNA did not match the evidence from an alleged sexual assault that occurred on May 24<sup>th</sup>. Grundy County States Attorney Jason Helland said the case would be solved in a month.
4. On August 6<sup>th</sup>, WJDK reported that Barry Aldrich resigned from the Morris City Council due to personal issues. Mayor Dick Kopczick said a replacement had to be made in 60 days.
5. On August 12, WJDK reported that the August Cruise Night in Morris had a record 887 cars. We interviewed Herb Wyeth about parking problems at the event, and what was going to be done about the situation.
6. On August 14, WJDK interviewed the newest Grundy County Board member Douglas Boresi who filled the position of David Boggs. Boggs retired from the board to pursue other activities.
7. On August 21, WJDK informed the public of a school bus driver for the Morris Community Schools that dropped off 30 kids at Goodwill Park in Morris. The bus driver was released from his job, and the Morris Police Department started an investigation into the incident. WCSJ also interviewed local Superintendents to inform the public on what was being done to help prevent the incident from occurring again.
8. On August 21, WJDK reported that John Anthony from Plainfield was selected as the new State Representative of the 75<sup>th</sup> district to replace Pam Roth. He was officially sworn in on August 26<sup>th</sup>.
9. On August 27, WJDK reported the FBI was investigating a criminal damage to property incident to a Mink Farm in Grundy County.
10. On September 11, WJDK interviewed Marseille resident Kent Terry about how the flood recovery process is coming along in Marseilles. He reported half of the families had moved back into their homes and said volunteers were still needed.
