## Section I. Issues

The stations have identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this guarter:

- **A. Water Quality** Clean and safe drinking water is a human right but pollution from sewage, farming and coal ash continues to be a significant hazard across West Alabama.
- **B. Voting Rights.** Alabama has long been at the center for minority voting rights. The fight over congressional redistricting in Alabama has sparked resurgence in the effort to promote equal ballot access, not only in Alabama, but in at least five other southern states.
- **C.** Israel-Hamas War. The war between Israel and Hamas has the potential to have major impact on the world, even here in Alabama.
- **D. Game Day security.** With more than 100,000 fans in town for UA home football weekends, security is an issue and the City of Tuscaloosa and UA have stepped up the program
- **E. Service for Disabled Children.** More young people with Autism, Downs Syndrome and other disabilities need help than ever before.
- F. Politics. The center of public policy and programs in Alabama is the legislature.
- **G.** Historically Black Colleges & Universities. HBCUs are a critical and integral part of leveling the playing field for minorities and Tuscaloosa is home to one of the oldest.
- **H. Congress.** The turmoil in congress impact everyone, in both parties and in all walks of life. Conducting congressional business is critical to every phase of our civic lives.
- **I. Healthcare.** The pandemic exacerbated already serious problems in the state's healthcare systems, problems that continue to plague hospitals.
- **J. Impactful Events.** 2023 included numerous events that had a direct impact on the lives and livelihoods of the people of West Alabama.
