

Radio Health Journal - Radio Health Journal is a one-half hour radio magazine produced by Media Tracks Communications that keeps tabs on the latest in the world of medicine- breakthroughs, what medical advances to look for, and eye-opening news. The show airs on Sunday morning at 5AM.

The Best Of Our Knowledge/Legislative Gazette –The Best Of Our Knowledge/Legislative Gazette is a one-half hour New York State (WAMC) produced discussion program focusing on education and New York State political issues. Issue- Health

Radio Health Journal 7/2/17 at 5:13AM (7 minutes)

Dr. Joel Salinas has mirror touch synesthesia, a condition involving cross-wiring in the brain. The result is that visual stimuli prompt a response in his touch system. He literally feels it when people experience pain. Salinas discusses how this strange condition works and how he is able to use it in diagnosis.

Radio Health Journal 7/9/17 at 5:13AM (7 minutes)

The sense of smell evokes powerful memories and makes food taste good, but it also has important functions in interpersonal relations and personal safety. Experts discuss the science behind it.

Radio Health Journal 7/16/17 at 5:13AM (7 minutes)

We often judge people by their smiles. However, dental care and medical care have always been separate in the US, creating a large population that doesn't receive dental care. These people often end up with extremely poor oral health and make up a surprisingly large proportion of ER visits. Experts discuss.

Radio Health Journal 7/23/17 at 5:13AM (8 minutes)

Children's medicine is more specialized than many people think. Pediatric practitioners and hospitals are set up to deal with the different biology of children. An expert explains.

Around nine million military veterans receive healthcare services from the Department of Veterans Affairs. An expert discusses her contention that the care the VA provides is much better than its perception.

Some agencies estimate that 50,000 children have been born in the US using donor eggs. But egg donation (or sale, as some insist) is not regulated, and while short-term risks are known, few donors have been followed for years. Long-term risks are not well understood. Experts discuss what we know... and what we don't.

Radio Health Journal 8/6/17 at 5:13AM (7 minutes)

New studies show that changing your weekday sleep schedule by sleeping in as little as an hour every weekend can have severe health impact. Experts discuss this social jetlag, why it occurs, and how people can avoid health concerns without avoiding staying out late.

Radio Health Journal 9/10/17 at 5:00AM (12 minutes)

Most forms of cancer have a built-in constituency of patients, loved ones, and concerned others. Lung cancer patients, instead, are often blamed for their own disease because of its frequent connection with smoking. Patients are often isolated, and research dollars lag behind other, less common cancer killers.

Just as people face an obesity crisis in the US, so do our pets, who have many of the same health consequences as overweight humans. Experts discuss why pet obesity is a problem and ways pet owners can keep their furry friends healthy.

The FDA has proposed mandating a significant cut in the nicotine content of cigarettes to encourage them to move to healthier forms of nicotine distribution, such as e-cigarettes. Experts explain how the plan might work and the science behind it.

A healthy diet is one of the best weapons against heart disease and its recurrence, yet new studies show cardiologists (as well as other physicians) are woefully deficient in nutritional knowledge. Experts discuss causes and outcomes of this lack of knowledge.

Issue – Public Safety

Radio Health Journal 7/9/17 at 5:00AM (13 minutes)

The cultural bias against obesity is often justified on health grounds. But, recent studies show that people classified in the "overweight" BMI category actually have less mortality than normal weight people. Experts discuss how culture drives our obsession with weight and what science really has to say about it.

Radio Health Journal 7/16/17 at 5:00AM (12 minutes)

Psychological or physical abuse by siblings is much more common than most people realize. It can leave severe psychological scars. However, parents often downplay it, calling it "normal sibling rivalry." Experts discuss the extent of the problem, warning signs of abuse, and how parents can act without involving family services officials and endangering the family.

Plugged Into Long Island 7/16/17 at 6-6:30AM (24 minutes)

Summary: Joe Rock meets Doreen Fiscina, the Account Manager for New York Blood Center. They discuss the blood shortage on Long Island and the importance of donating. The blood supply is currently below a 7-9 day level.

Radio Health Journal 7/30/17 at 5:00AM (13 minutes)

Auto accidents are the largest cause of post-traumatic stress disorder. About 25 percent of people injured in car crashes will suffer from it. Accident survivors and one of the world's foremost experts discuss variables that make PTSD worse and those that make recovery easier, as well as the essentials victims must carry out to recover.

Radio Health Journal 8/13/17 at 5:00AM (13 minutes)

Many local jurisdictions have criminalized activities of the homeless, such as sleeping on public streets or panhandling. While these laws make cities feel like they're doing something to ease public discomfort over the presence of the homeless, jail does nothing to address root causes of homelessness and may even make the situation worse. Experts discuss.

Even though death is part of life, few people prepare for it by collecting important documents and contact points that survivors will need to know. Two experts discuss organizing for the inevitable.

The Legislative Gazette 8/13/17 at 5:30-6am (25 minutes)

We'll take you to a workforce forum hosted by Congresswoman Elise Stefanik, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on a possible challenge to Governor Cuomo from actress Cynthia Nixon, and New York State Senate Leader Flanagan is praised for publicly admitting a substance abuse problem.

Plugged Into Long Island 8/27/17 at 6:30-7AM (24 minutes)

Summary: Joe Rock meets with representatives from the New York State Police. They discuss their current recruitment drive and the need for new recruits.

Radio Health Journal 8/27/17 at 5:00AM (9 minutes)

Medical errors are the third largest cause of death in the US, and mistakes in making diagnoses are the most frequent form of error. A noted expert discusses why mistakes happen, and what doctors and patients can do to make them less frequent.

Radio Health Journal 8/27/17 at 5:13AM (10 minutes)

Errors in medical labs can have life-threatening consequences. An expert explains that human error is impossible to completely eliminate, so labs are increasingly turning to DNA tracking to catch mistakes when they occur.

Analysts at the Central Intelligence Agency often rely on psychological techniques to predict the behavior and decisions of world leaders, and also of populations around the world. Experts, including an active CIA analyst, describe how they do it, and how other nations use these techniques as well.

The NY Immigration Coalition rallies in support of DACA in front of NY Republican Congressman Faso's office, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on state Assembly Republican Minority Kolb exploring a run for Governor, and at a recent Senate hearing, the state health commissioner is grilled over whether NY is doing enough to fight tick-borne illness.

Summary: Al Levine talks with guests from Nassau BOCES. The purpose of BOCES is to enhance public education and the opportunities available to students of all ages and abilities by providing access to innovative and cost-effective services. They offer approximately 100 different programs and services that change constantly in response to school district needs.

Issue- Economy/Economic Development

Governor Cuomo and other state politicians are wary of holding a constitutional convention, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on federal prosecutors calling for two upstate corruption trials for aides to Governor Cuomo, and we'll look at how ride hailing services have been doing upstate in NY's Hudson Valley.

911 is literally a lifeline for millions of Americans, but it's mostly based on old technology depending on landline phones to know where callers are. State Assembly Speaker Heastie tours North Country manufacturing plants that supply subway and bus cars to New York City, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on two potential challengers to Governor Andrew Cuomo, and U.S. Senate Minority Leader Schumer calls for the federal gov't to help in the battle against insect-borne disease.

Many of the nation's hospitals serving small towns and rural areas are in deep financial trouble because of a heavy reliance on underpaying Medicare and Medicaid programs. Plus, political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on a Quinnipiac poll on Governor Andrew Cuomo's performance.

Governor Cuomo announces a series of efforts to expand voter registration, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts about a new report on Governor Cuomo's top campaign contributors, and New York's DEC announces several fish advisories.

Governor Cuomo signed into law a measure that would create new penalties for people who make bomb threats against community centers, our political observer Alan Chartock shares his thoughts on growing pressure for a group of breakaway Democrats in the state senate to reunite with mainstream Democrats, and over 60 million dollars in grants will support drinking water and wastewater infrastructure projects across the state.

Summary: Joe Rock meets with guests from West Islip Breast Cancer Coalition to discuss the nonprofit group and their upcoming Clam Shucking Contest. WIBCC works to eradicate breast cancer and gynecological cancers. They provide support services and actively promote awareness through education, advocacy and outreach.

Plugged Into Long Island 7/30/17 at 6-6:30AM (29 minutes)

Summary: Sandy Brewster and guests discuss Almost Home Animal Rescue, a nonprofit organization that was formed by a group of dedicated volunteers. Their goal is to rescue and re-home unwanted and abandoned dogs and cats from private homes and municipal shelters, and place them into responsible homes.

Plugged Into Long Island 7/30/17 at 6:30-7AM (25 minutes)

Summary: Olivia Fonti speaks with Debbie and Brittany Lesch from The Angels of Long Island, a nonprofit organization that provides supplemental support to Long Islanders and working families who, usually through no fault of their own, find themselves going through a hardship. These hardships are often the result of the unexpected loss of a loved one, failing health and unexpected expenses, and other unforeseen personal tragedies.

Plugged Into Long Island 8/6/17 at 6-6:30AM (29 minutes)

Summary: Ted Lindner meets with Brianna Salinaro, a teenager from New York with Cerebral Palsy that is seeking to become the first female ever to compete in Taekwondo Paralympics. She discusses what it is like to live with Cerebral Palsy and tells her story of how she got involved in the sport and her road to the Paralympics.

Plugged Into Long Island 8/6/17 at 6:30-7AM (23 minutes)

Summary: Ted Lindner meets with representatives from JDRF. JDRF works every day to change the reality of diabetes for millions of people by funding research, advocating for government support of research and new therapies, ensuring new therapies come to market and connecting and engaging the T1D community.

Plugged Into Long Island 8/13/17 6-6:30AM (28 minutes)

Summary: Fingers and guests discuss BRAT, a non-for-profit that is dedicated to rescuing homeless, abandoned and abused animals in the Long Island area. They strive to give them a better life that they so desperately deserve. Since they started in 2008, they have saved over 500 dogs and cats.

Plugged Into Long Island 8/13/17 at 6:30-7AM (25 minutes)

Summary: Cooper and Anthony speak with David and Tito from Little Shelter Animal Rescue and Adoption Center, located in Huntington. Little Shelter is the first no-kill shelter in Suffolk County. They save animals and help find them permanent homes. They discuss Little Shelter's "Pet-A-Palooza" event happening on 8/19 and 8/20, where the public can come look at over 400 cats and 80-100 dogs and adopt and/or donate.

Plugged Into Long Island 8/20/17 at 6:30-7AM (22 minutes)

Summary: Ted Lindner and guests discuss Nassau County Veterans Service Agency and Nassau County 5K/10K Run for Veterans. The event is taking place on August 26th at Eisenhower Park in East Meadow. All funds raised will be used to support local veterans.

Summary: Al Levine and guests talk about the Michael Magro Foundation, a non-profit organization that helps pediatric cancer patients and their families at the Cancer Center for Kids at Winthrop Hospital.
