# DELTA VARIANT SPARKS CONVERSATION, VACINNE PUSH

The Lakes Region as well as surrounding parts of Southwest Missouri and Northwest Arkansas continue to be seen as a Hot Spot for the COVID-19 Spike in cases, especially with the highly contagious Delta Variant.

At Tuesday's Branson Board of Aldermen Meeting, resident Nate Horseman made a presentation and asked Branson Leaders to take a lead in encouraging vaccinations and other safety protocols. Horseman said many of the current board along with Mayor Larry Milton pushed and got the masked mandate removed and now the virus is surging in the area as the number of visitors increase. Milton responded saying the spike didn't begin until 30-45 days after the mandate was lifted and said other factors contributed to the spike. He went on to say that he and City Officials recognize that a surge is happening, and that people should take the precautions they think are necessary but restated that he does not believe mandating those precautions is the answer.

On Wednesday, the Branson Lakes Area Chamber of Commerce/CVB releases a statement supporting people that can get vaccinated and stating the importance of keeping both residents and visitors safe during their travels through the region. The Chamber also announces that they host a testing site for COVID-19 at their office every Friday.

### INITIAL APPROVAL GIVEN TO ALOCHOL CODE CHANGE

The City of Branson has given initial approval to a Change in the Alcohol Code.

The measure considered by the Board of Aldermen at last Tuesday's meeting would lift a city restriction and allow certain type of alcoholic beverages to be served in other businesses besides restaurants, resorts, and microbreweries.

The measure was suggested by Ward 1 Aldermen Clay Cooper after he was approached by an area businessperson about looking to revise it. During the discussion, City Attorney Chris Lebeck said that this measure would still not allow tavern type businesses in the city but would allow other businesses the opportunity to add serving alcohol to their primary services. Businesses wishing to do that would still have to go through both a state and city license application process in order to proceed.

The vote was 5-1 with Aldermen Ruth Denham voting against the measure. The Bill will be up for second approval at the next Branson Board of Aldermen meeting August 10.
