I. Education/Schools/Youth

Greater Boston Eye on Education Special 2007, L 01/17/07 7:00pm, 60 min. A one-hour Eye on Education special - "Massachusetts vs. The World: Can We Compete?" Host Emily Rooney leads a discussion on whether Massachusetts schools are adequately preparing students for the global economy. What education reforms are needed?

Frontline: A Class Divided, N 02/27/07 9:00pm, 60 min.

the transportation crisis to a peak. On March 24, 1900, ground was broken for the Big Apple's subway; the Interborough Rapid Transit Line opened four years later, running more than 26 miles of underground track at the unheard of speed of 35 miles per hour. Soon thousands in the city were "doing the subway."

American Experience: Alaskan Pipeline, N 01/08/07, 9pm, 60 min. Bringing Alaskan oil to market required one of the greatest engineering feats of the 20th century. For more than three years, workers battled brutal Arctic weather to construct an 800-mile pipeline that would traverse three mountain ranges, 34 rivers and 800 streams, and that would withstand earthquakes and subzero temperatures. The men, machines and money the pipeline brought to Alaska would forever transform what had long been regarded America's last great wilderness.
