- Promoted *Old Soldiers, Saloons, and Community: The Unique of Phoebus, Virginia*, Tim Receveur's comprehensive historical book on the Phoebus section of Hampton
- Mr. Receveur's background in the U.S. Air Force and in the Applied Sciences division of the U.S. Department of State
- The book's inception as a collection of stories from the Phoebus locals of the restaurant that is now the home in which Mr. Receveur and his family now live, compiled through a web log ("blog") availability at the Hampton History Museum

- Phoebus's nickname of "Little Chicago", earned through its link to Chicago as the last stop on the Chesapeake & Ohio (C & O) railroad, and, to a lesser extent, its historical reputation in bootlegging activity
- Phoebus's first inhabitants, the Kecoughtan tribe, and their encounters with the English and Spanish
- The town's etymological history before officially being named for Harrison Phoebus, who ran a hotel out of Fort Monroe in the 1870s and convinced a railroad magnate from New York to extend his line down to the fort, bringing prosperity to the area
- Its distinction as home for the first official community for freed slaves
- The historic riots in Phoebus circa 1898 involving soldiers of the Spanish-American War
- Upcoming travels and books that Mr. Receveur has planned
