The \$500 million fund would pair venture capital funds with proceeds from competitive auctions of new tax credits to invest in New Jersey-based start-ups.

Krista Jenkins findings in New Jersey working adults, the theory would be that they would find a change in self-reported incidents in the workplace, however the results were opposite.

Description: New Jersey ranks higher than the national average for issues with bullying. Correspondent Dawn Stensland-Mendte talks to 11-year-old Nitori who has been the victim of bullying. Her family, four generations of women joined forces with the school to help prevent bullying. Her grandmother founded an organization called "Nurture To Love" a girl's empowerment nonprofit to help teach life skills and confidence. Under stricter laws in New Jersey, children can now report bullying anonymously.

The old policy which has taken place in 2009 and the updated policy which is the strongest sexual harassment and anti-discrimination policy that the state has had. The new policy does several things, it sets out very clear standards of what constitutes as sexual harassment, what constitutes as discrimination, it provides avenues for people to report these claims. It also allows the victim to privacy, once the claim is closed, they have a choice if they want it to be released or not. (Larry also discusses the case that just emerged with Katie Brennan working at the Governor's office.)

Effective October 29, 2018, the New Jersey Earned Sick Leave Law allows employees to accrue 1 hour of earned sick leave for every 30 hours worked, up to 40 hours each year. The law permits employers to create policies that provide additional leave time.

The Measles outbreaks are sickening dozens of people in Ocean County as well as Rockland County and Brooklyn, New York. The outbreaks have connections to people who either visited from or traveled to Israel. There are 30 confirmed cases in Ocean County, NJ.

The minimum wage will rise 25 cents to \$8.85 under a voterapproved New Jersey constitutional amendment that ties the wage to the rate of inflation.
