CRIME & PUBLIC SAFETY

12/4 - Tea Party activist Greg Juster on "smart meters." They're designed to be able to help you control your energy consumption, your energy costs. But some worry that they may also facilitate an invasion of privacy and government eavesdropping.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

10/23 - Republican Congressional candidate Weston Wamp. At 24 years old, he's running for the same seat his father, Zach, held from 1995-2011. Weston will be 25 before the new congress is sworn in, making him elgible to run, but raising questions about whether he has enough life experience for the job. He'll be challenging a first-term Republican incumbent.

12/18 - Former Tennessee Republican Party chairwoman Robin Smith announcing her decision NOT to run for Tennessee's 3rd District congressional seat. She ran in 2010 and lost the primary to attorney Chuck Fleischmann, who eventually won the seat in

congress.

RACE RELATIONS

11/27 - Senior Pastor Ken Dugan and Executive Pastor Marty Thompson from Life Tree Cafe at the Northgate Campus of Dallas Bay Baptist Church on social issues from rediscovering Christmas to race relations to torture in our society.

12/25 - Father Joseph Shaute from Calhoun, Georgia, which hosts one of the biggest "Celeberation of the Virgin of Guadalupe" events in North America.

THE ECONOMY

- 10/2 Melvin Goodman from the Center for International Policy on balancing the federal budget. Says we have to include the military in the cutbacks.
- 10/9 Chattanooga Congressman Chuck Fleischmann outlines his jobs bill that would eliminate the capital gains tax for two years.
- 11/13 Bob Peterson from the National Remodelers Council and Teresa Grove from the local Homebuilders Association on the benefits of remodeling your home rather than moving to a new one.
