The region's largest airport will now have a rail connection to the Metro area, the state, and the entire Northeast Corridor. At the regional level, it will create jobs, boost tax revenue, provide emergency transportation and reduce carbon. In eastern Loudoun County and the Dulles Corridor, new employers will establish operations. Existing employers will find that it easier to attract workers if their company has convenient access to the subway. This project should boost property tax and sales tax revenues. Metro's existing lines have done this for decades.
