WIYC Programs and Issues Third Quarter 2023 Report July 1, 2023, to September 30, 2023

WIYC is a COZI TV affiliated television station licensed to Troy, Alabama and serves the Black Belt and River Region of Central Alabama, including Montgomery, Alabama.

WIYC is owned by Montgomery, TV License Company, LLC and is the sister station to WCOV and WALE (low power television station). The ownership transfer to Montgomery, TV License Company, LLC from Woods Communications Corporation was completed in 2nd quarter.

Improvement of operational facilities continues to be in process to serve viewers with better over the air reception of an excellent quality signal. Already, a more powerful transmitter, antenna and a back-up operations system have been installed to improve reach and ensure technical ability to broadcast. WIYC's viewers are served by the continued operational improvements to the technical facility.

Serving the needs of our viewers, WIYC participates in the Emergency Alert System (EAS). Improvement is planned to implement other non-weather-related news breaking notifications.

Issues that are addressed with programming include:

- 1. **Personal Development**. Information provided educates viewers about various science topics and the practical and commercial implementation of science. Information is provided to increase understanding of the global community. Individual inspirational stories and exposure to opportunities are addressed.
- 2. **Professional Development**. Exposure to career and lifestyle alternatives are provided to enable awareness of a broad selection of choices.
- 3. **Education**. Program material shared results in increased viewer knowledge in areas including science, technology, environmental stewardship, healthy cooking, physical fitness, civics, and a variety of other training material presented in an entertaining and engaging manner.
- 4. **Resources**. Services available to address physical, mental, and social needs are communicated.
- 5. **Safety**. Safety includes physical safety, as well as security of health and family.

The COZI TV network broadcasts an American programming block called "The More You Know." This programming block meets federally mandated educational and informational programming guidelines. PSAs are also aired during these programs. Programs included are:

• Montgomery police have charged a suspect. In the murder of 66-year-old rickey Daniel. Daniel was found fatally shot in the 4200 block of Sussex drive on august 25th. After Crimestoppers issued a person of interest in the case. Authorities were able to locate and arrest Jalyn Greene. Greene is charged with capital murder. She is being held in the Montgomery County jail. Without bond.

9/1/23 - Crime Prevention and Law Enforcement

• The Autauga County Sheriff's Office has arrested one person in a dog fighting ring in Plantersville. Deputies uncovered the operation Friday morning. in the 1600 block of Vernon Sheppard Road. At least 30 dogs were seized. Investigators say they were mostly pit bulls, but there are other breeds as well. We've got animal cruelty as I know is a charge plus other charges pending multiple counts a total of about 35 dogs, we've been able to recover and 2 x 2 rescue out of Helena is taking the animals which is we're grateful for that. We're stepping in right now to take care medically to make sure all these animals get treated like they should be treated they will get medical care and evaluated and so far, we have not dealt with Any that are aggressive with humans The dogs are now in the care of Two-by-Two Animal Rescue in Helena. The Chilton County Sheriff's Office is assisting in the ongoing investigation.

9/4/23 – Community Events

• For many people, Labor Day just wouldn't be the same without barbecues and there were several places in the River Region where you could find it today. Prattville's Service League started their Labor Day Barbecue tradition back in 1952. The Prattville Service League Labor Day Barbecue is held every year to raise money that will be distributed to ten to twenty organizations in the River Region. This includes groups like the YMCA, sheriff's department, fire department, and the human society. This is the event's 70th year, and they had a variety of vendors so people could shop while they ate. There were also pony rides and bingo for the kids and local entertainment from different dance groups. In the past, the Prattville Service League's barbecue has raised more than eleven thousand dollars. we just want to thank everybody for coming out we weren't able to have it last year, we weren't able to have it the year of covid, so you know it's just means so much that as soon as we are back in that the community is back in it with us. 9/5/23 – Civic Affairs

The three-judge panel blocked the use of the state's newly drawn congressional map in next year's elections. Federal judges will now handle drawing new congressional lines for Alabama after lawmakers didn't create a second district where Black voters at least came close to comprising a majority as suggested by the court. Our Alabama legislature has been directed again to redraw our congressional map. Because the map that they submitted, which we knew was not going to work, did not work. I expected this from the beginning, from the onset. That the three-judge panel would tell the Alabama Legislature that this was incorrect. And that they would have to put a special master up to draw the new map. And the reason why you're doing that is because they have no faith that the legislature is going to do anything different from what it did this last time. This is a win for this fragile democracy. You know each time I think that things are near hopeless because we have a Republican majority, Trump majority in the legislature and our Supreme Court, but for this court which included two Trump appointees, to come to the conclusion that these three maps have to be redrawn by September the 25th. That is an amazing victory in this time of so much political conflict and controversy. This changes the complexion of next year's elections. And I think that the courts will come down with the lines pretty quickly because you've got to draw the lines. Wes Allen, the Secretary of State, has said I need them by October 1st. Alabama is expected to appeal the decision to the U.S. Supreme Court. The Alabama Republican Party issued this statement concerning the court's decision "While we respect the Court, we are disappointed in its decision, and we trust that the State will ultimately prevail in this litigation.

9/6/23 - Crime Prevention and Law Enforcement

• A traffic stop by ALEA troopers led to a chase that ended in a crash this morning. around 9:24 a.m. a chase involving a 2009 Ford F-150 pickup truck started on U.S. 331. near the Highland Home area in Crenshaw County. It began when the pickup driver fled the scene during a traffic stop, the truck eventually crashed on U.S. 331. near the 82-mile marker in Montgomery County. The driver and a passenger were both injured and taken to Baptist Medical Center for treatment.

9/7/23 – Public Safety

• Sheriff Mike Granthum says suspects have been identified in the case and investigators are in the process of obtaining warrants. They were just spraying bullets. They didn't care. They had no respect for human life whatsoever. Granthum says deputies responded to a shots fired call on the 800 block of Moody Circle at around 1:30 Wednesday morning and found a house and a car that were riddled with bullet holes. He says a mother, her 15-year-old daughter and her 5-year son were all inside the house asleep when someone drove by and opened fire on their home. We're looking at attempted, I mean, not only shooting-into-an-occupied-dwelling which is actually a

felony. But we're looking at attempted murder. Any time you pull a trigger, and you shoot a house up that many times, you have one intention. And that's to kill. Granthum says the woman and her 5-year-old were injured in the incident. They were taken to the Vaughan E-R where they were treated and then released. If you can't sleep in your own house and feel safe in your own house, there's something wrong with that. Granthum says the shooting may have been connected to the shooting death of a 23-year-old woman in Selma earlier this week. We do have some videos. We have recovered a vehicle from the scene. And we're in the process of gathering warrants on some people now. And we're going to bring these people to justice. In Dallas County, I'm GM, WCOV News at Nine. Thanks George. • Prattville hosted its annual 9-11 "honor and remembrance" ceremony at the city's Public Safety Building. City officials say the ceremony remembers the day of the attack and honors the lives of the fallen. Flags were set up to mimic the World Trade Center Twin Towers. Each flag represents a life that was lost as a result of the attack. "There are flags representing those who died on flights, there are flags representing those at the Pentagon. There are flags representing those in the World Trade Center. And then of course, the first responders who lost their lives as a result of sacrifice in rescue efforts." "I know I sat in front of my television for days and days watching and just seeing how the country just pulled together. And we were very strong at that point in time. And it was sad that all the people that gave their lives did, but I believe their lives were not in vain" Two thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven Americans died in the attack on that dark day.

9/12/23 – Community Events

A deaf mother of eight in West Alabama now has nothing and nowhere to go after a fire destroys her home. Reporter George McDonald has more on this. The fire left three adults and 10 children homeless and without transportation which means that they have no place to go and no way to get there. 43-year-old Savannah Tower of Selma is deaf and non-verbal. Three weeks ago, her house caught fire and burned to the ground. It's been a struggle for her and her family ever since. "It's hard already, just living. It gets even harder after you lose everything," Tower contacted us hoping we could tell her story and reach out to the community for the help her family needs. "She wants them to know that we really need their help. We need to get a home and some kind of vehicle. And help with getting the kids clothes and stuff for school." Erica Tower and her boyfriend and their two kids live with her mother as she works towards becoming a nurse. She knows how to sign, and she helps her mom take care of business. "Most of the time they don't listen to her because they think she don't know what's going on because she's hearing impaired." An attitude the Tower family hasn't let destroy their spirit like the fire destroyed their things. "We have worked so hard towards getting that house and that truck. • Autauga County Schools held its last of two budget hearings under new superintendent Lyman Woodfin. Stakeholders were able to share ideas and suggestions during the meeting. with feedback provided during the second budget hearing. With the last of the two budget hearings, an analysis will be made regarding where Autauga county schools are as a system. There have been a few challenges within this past year's fiscal year budget, but the superintendent is optimistic in hoping to turn things around, we face funding challenges there's no two ways around that but I don't want anybody in our community to feel like that we're not being good stewards of their funds because we were going to absolutely attack this school year as much as we possibly can to make sure that we are using our funds as well as we can the ending fund balance for this year's fiscal period is at \$29.2 million.

9/15/23 – Crime Prevention and Law Enforcement

• Tallassee police say an 8-year-old child on a bicycle was hit by a vehicle this morning. it happened around 6:43 am near the intersection of oak heights road and powers avenue. the vehicle was heading westbound on oak heights road, approaching powers avenue as the child was crossing over oak heights. the child was life-flighted to children's hospital in Birmingham. for treatment of serious injuries. the driver stayed on the scene. no charges or citations were issued. details of the collision are being investigated.

9/18/23 – Educations and Development

• Montgomery hosted its College and Career Fair today at the Multiplex. MPS Seniors had exclusive access to attend the College and Career Fair from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. The College and Career Fair was open to the public starting at 3:00 to 7pm. We are hoping that kids come in this afternoon, and We are hoping that kids come in this afternoon I'm actually fine you know a variety of colleges and careers that don't necessarily require a college education. Originally, I'm from Birmingham but Living in Montgomery you really don't realize how small it is so I think being able to have all the schools come together and network and get the information out to the number of students that are here I think it's awesome. 9/19/23 - Volunteer Opportunities, Programs, and Efforts

• The Montgomery county commission designated September as hunger action. as part of that designation, the county commission presented a proclamation to the heart of Alabama food bank. Feeding America, the nation's largest domestic hunger-relief organization has organized the annual call to action. Heart of Alabama Food Bank is part of that network. Last year alone, it distributed 27 million pounds of food to those in need. across 35 counties. • People who lose their lives in a homicide are not the only victims. Grieving loved ones are murder victims too. The Dallas County community commemorated National Day of Remembrance for Murder Victims Day in Selma Monday. Four months after her 23-year-old son Joseph Goodwin was found murdered in Selma Roseta Shields is still trying to cope with the violent way he died. a gunshot wound to the chest, and he was burned up in his car. I mean, I'm still shocked behind it because I know that my child didn't bother anybody. He wasn't that type of person. Hearing that that happened to him, because he wasn't that type of person, it was like someone just stabbed you and just took your heart clean out your chest. I still don't feel good. What happened to him? Shields says Goodwin had worked as a welder and he was a good person.

She says the silence surrounding his murder investigation is making their whole family feel some kind of way. Like nobody doesn't, they aren't concerned. Like his life don't even matter. He matters. He was somebody. I heard nothing about it on the news or nothing. It like, to me it's like hush hush. Investigators identified 24-year-old Deonte Olds as a suspect in the case. And a warrant has been issued for his arrest on a charge of capital murder. Lt. Ray Blanks says U-S Marshals are searching for Olds right now. The US Marshals is a fugitive taskforce. Their duty every day is to track down wanted suspects all over this country. Once they apprehend him, no matter where he is at, we'll go get him. I just want justice. I just want justice. • It's been 20 years and I hope that no one ever have to experience what I have experienced in my life In the early morning hours of September 26, 2003-- 32-year-old Eric Nelams was shot and killed in his driveway. I still sometimes see flashbacks ****6 second silence***crying from seeing my son laying there on the ground with bullets in his head and I wasn't allowed to touch him or anything just stand there with a broken heart Under the cover of night the would be assailant fled without a trace but now investigators are uncovering information that Eric's family hopes will bring justice Someone took a son from her someone took a brother from someone took a father from their son and my children they still haven't dealt with it because he was more like a father figure to them so they all have this person that is missing from their life and it's hard to recover from that and it's difficult for me to fathom that no one knows anything a son, brother, father and military veteran gone leaving his loved ones to mourn what is lost It changed my life in that I didn't trust people as much. Because these people were in his life, life close to him. My heart is still broken, I just don't know. I must trust in the Lord to give me strength to go on. 9/28/23 – Public Safety

• As the threat of a drought looms across Alabama, The Alabama Forestry Commission has issued a *statewide* Fire Alert. urging everyone to only burn items *outdoors* when permitted. Fires, even under great conditions, can be dangerous but become extremely difficult to control, like now, when the land is dry. Anyone hoping to burn things like leaves, fields, grassland, or woodland within the city limits may be subject to prosecution for committing a Class B misdemeanor. Those in country areas are also discouraged to burn as grounds are dry due to lack of rain. Fires can quickly get out of control and that puts a strain on resources. You have your volunteer fire departments, they're your first line of defense against wildfires so they can get extended running all over the place and then we come behind them if it exceeds their capabilities. This Fire Alert will remain in effect until rescinded by the State Forester.

That was treated through radiation, and she is NOW cancer free. C is helping me stay positive because when you go through cancer, I went through it three times and being positive is so true and you got to speak it and you got to think it and that's the key thing right there and I like. I thank WAKA I have never won anything before, so I am grateful I'm thankful. Our second Survivor Makeover winner is Ellaine Lowry of Montgomery. She was also diagnosed with breast cancer in 2007. Her mother died of breast cancer when Ellaine was 15. Ellaine had a rare type of cancer that only affects about 5-percent of patients. She also has a gene mutation that can lead to ovarian cancer. Ellaine thanks her family and God for making it through. WIYC broadcasts Public Service Announcements (PSAs) to inform and educate viewers. Raising public awareness of relevant issues is an important community service. Some of these PSAs are included in COZI programming. Other PSAs serving the local area are broadcast each day. Serving the community with reliable, relevant, and informational programming is an important goal and we are excited about the progress made so far!

ADPH Mpox: Mpox is a rare disease caused by infection with the Mpox virus. It is usually found in Central and West Africa and does not occur naturally in the United States. However, cases have recently been identified in the U.S. While the state of emergency for the 2022 outbreak has been declared over, people should continue to take measures to protect themselves, get vaccinated, and get tested when

needed. Those in high-risk situations should talk to their healthcare provider about treatment. Knowledge of how the Mpox virus spreads continues to evolve. Data suggest that gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men make up the majority of cases in the current Mpox outbreak. However, anyone, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, who has been in close personal contact with someone who has Mpox is at risk. Take steps to prevent getting Mpox. If you have any symptoms of Mpox, talk to a healthcare provider.

ALDOT – Covid-19 The Alabama Department of Labor is tasked with providing workers and employers with resources to help train and employ a skilled workforce. They also have resources to connect potential employees with employers across the state. In order to be assist people across the state, the DOL has opened Career Centers in numerous locations. During the COVID-19 pandemic, these centers have been closed to the public.

Adult Protective Services: AL DHR is launching a brand-new campaign aimed at protecting the elderly population in our state. There are two :30 TV spots and one :30 radio spot that give examples of elderly persons being abused or abandoned by family or care givers. The spots provide a 1-800 number where people can report suspected abuse.

ALDHR: Many of us are familiar with foster care for children in Alabama. But how many of us realize that there are adults who need a foster home as well? Through hardships or circumstances beyond their control, quite a few adults find themselves in need of a "helping hand." Some are elderly men and women whose families are unable or unavailable to care for them. Others may be elderly or disabled young adults living on their own and cannot care for themselves.

Are these adults any less deserving of our devotion and care simply because they are older? Absolutely not. Foster care for an elderly or young disabled adult not only warms their hearts and minds (as well as yours); it also allows them to remain a vital part of our community.

ALDOT Alabama Department of Transportation has two spots rotating starting July 2020 until further notice. One spot focuses on Railway Safety... "Never try to beat and train. It is a deadly game." The second spot focuses on making drivers aware of the consequences of littering along our roadways. The

new PEP campaign is designed to make Alabama drivers aware that tossing trash out of your window can result in a \$500 fine. The second infraction will cost \$1,000.

The Alabama Department of Veterans Affairs is working to provide resources to veterans and their friends and families to reduce this tragic number.

The Alabama Department of Veterans Affairs campaign is designed to encourage family and friends to be there for veterans suffering PTSD and depression, conditions which can lead to suicide. There is also messaging directed at veterans to encourage them to reach out for help.
