		Officials at Liberty University told The Christian Post they have made efforts to ensure proper compliance with Title IX regulations following the school's unprecedented settlement with the federal government. The flagship Evangelical university in Lynchburg, Virginia, settled with the U.S. Department of Education, agreeing to pay \$14 million related to violations of the Clery Act that requires colleges and universities receiving federal funding to report data of campus crime and report threats to students. The fine is the largest levied under the Clery Act, which was enacted in 1990. The Education Department, which initially threatened a \$37.5 million fine, said it identified multiple cases in which oncampus crimes were misclassified or underreported. Federal officials also accused the university of failing to warn the community about gas leaks, bomb threats and individuals who have been credibly accused of repeated acts of sexual violence.
