Quarterly Issues/Programs List April 1, 2020 – June 30, 2020

Below is a list of some of the significant issues responded to, along with the most significant programming treatment of those issues for the period. This list is by no means exhaustive. The order in which the issues appear does not reflect any priority or significance.

Newscasts on KNEB-am air Monday through Friday at the following times and durations: 6:00 a.m., 4:00 in length; 7:00 a.m., 5:00; 8:00 a.m., 5:00; 11:35 a.m., 5:00; 12:35 p.m., 5:00; 4:00 p.m., 5:00; 5:40 p.m., 1:50.

News Extra, Monday through Friday between 7:50 a.m. and 8:00 a.m.: From May 1 through June 5, our News Extra program aired a COVID-19 daily update of 4:00 to 10:00 minutes in length Monday through Friday provided by Panhandle COVID Unified Command with the latest on case statistics, recommendations and guidance for protecting personal safety and that of others, as well as recommendations to businesses, governments and other entities seeking to protect their staff, customers and the general public. This continued as Governor Pete Ricketts relaxed restrictions in the Directed Health Measures, with public health officials discussing guidance for various business, non-profit and educational entities as they evolved. Following June 5, we resumed a more 'normal' round of coverage during the program. With still an occasional Panhandle COVID Unified Command update, we also covered topics including Monument Marathon planners needing sponsors, vendors and volunteers; Calibraska Arts Initiative returns, but online only; Scotts Bluff County Fair a 'go' with some modifications; United Way of Western Nebraska starts Stuff the Bus school supply drive early, but with monetary donations only; local Kiwanis Club celebrating 90th anniversary; Bands on Broadway starting back up; Fireworks shows will take place; Fire officials talking about safety during fire season; and the Lied Scottsbluff Library using 'bingo' for their summer reading program.
