WHIO REPORTS: This edition of WHIO Reports focused on the Grand Lake St. Mary's restoration in Mercer and Auglaize counties. 2010 was a difficult year for the lake and the Lake Improvement Association due to the problem of run off of phosphorous from farms that created algae. There have been improvements over the years due to water treatments and attempts to stop the run off. At its peak, the lake helped attribute to \$2 million a year for the local economy and 2,400 jobs. For 2014, the lake is in an optimistic state of health which is important as about 30% of tourism in the state is attributed to lakes. There are many activities and events to attract tourism to Grand Lake St. Mary's this summer including a 25% discount to the park surrounding the lake. WHIO REPORTS: This edition of WHIO Reports focused on the 1960's in Dayton's history and the civil rights movement and riots that occurred during that time. A former Dayton police officer and former President of NAACP wrote books recently on their experiences. Segregation in Dayton geographically, socially and economically was the norm and opportunities for employment and advancement for blacks were sparse. Riots and protests were a form of civil disobedience that was employed to display unhappiness with the status quo. The Watts riots in Los Angeles in 1965 set the standard for violence that took shape for the next 10 years that Dayton also participated in. Police officers patrolled the West Side of Dayton during a time when the city averaged 100 murders a year. On September 1, 1966, the murder of a black male standing outside by a white male kicked off rioting in the Dayton community.
